

### SEATTLE MUSIC COMMISSIONER TIM LENNON AND LANGSTON LOOK TO SUPPORT BLACK CULTURE IN THE CENTRAL DISTRICT

The 102-year-old Langston Hughes Performing Arts Institute was originally a synagogue created to fill a need for the then 80-plus percent Black community in Seattle's Central District, and now non-profit LANGSTON and its Executive Director Tim Lennon look to support Black culture in today's 70 percent white community. Lennon is the first Executive Director of LANGSTON, a non-profit arts organization formed to reinvigorate the historic purpose of Langston Hughes Performing Arts Institute as a nexus for Black culture in a neighborhood undergoing rapid gentrification and displacement.



## CREW MEMBERS SPEAK OUT AGAINST DROWSY DRIVING RISK WHILE WORKING ON TV AND FILM SETS

Actors, actresses and crew members now are speaking on the record about the dangers of long hours and sleep deprivation and are asking the film and television industries to finally do something about it. Cast and crews often work on TV and film sets 14-plus hours a day, which can result in otherwise preventable accidents, including *Riverdale* actor KJ Apa's recent car crash. Many



professionals are now feeling empowered to speak out against the unsafe practice and lack of liability put on studios and networks.
