Since 2015, SIFF has partnered with 2018 Mayor's Film Award recipient Tracy Rector's Longhouse Media to celebrate indigenous film, stories, education, and media. 4th World Media Lab is a result of the partnership - a training program for emerging and mid-career Indigenous filmmakers, who, through intensive workshopping and



LGBTQ REPRESENTATION IN FILM DROPPED IN 2017

According to a study released by the advocacy organization GLAAD, LGBTQ representation in films from the seven biggest Hollywood studios fell significantly in 2017, from 18.4 percent to 12.8 percent. According to GLAAD, 20 percent of Americans aged 18 to 34 identify as LGBTQ, and the organization is calling on the industry to commit to hitting a target of 20 percent of major releases including LGBTQ characters by 2021, and 50 percent by 2024.
