2020 Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA)

I. Introduction

The City of Seattle Human Services Department (HSD) is pleased to issue its 2020 Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) related to the following investments:

- 1. Older Adult Health Promotion**
- 2. Re-entry/Re-rooting Indigenous Community Healing**
- 3. Food Bank Services: Georgetown, South Park, Delridge Neighborhoods**
- 4. Supporting Youth and Young Adults for Success**

This notice provides an overview of HSD's impending funding opportunities for 2020 with a brief description of the service areas for each opportunity, anticipated funding amounts, release dates, and contract start dates. Once finalized, HSD will issue detailed funding opportunities for each investment.

HSD invests in services that connect people with resources and solutions in times of need so we can all live, learn, work, and take part in strong, healthy communities. Guided by HSD's Theory of Change, funding opportunities will include both population level and racial disparity data, and will outline the desired results of the investment. In 2018, HSD began including gender equity data and identifying related results in the Theory of Change.

HSD emphasizes the importance of equity by engaging with traditionally marginalized communities, such as communities of color, limited English speakers, LGBTQ, persons with disabilities, seniors, and low-income individuals and families. HSD recognizes reducing racial and social disparities may require organizations to collaborate and develop a shared strategy to serve our diverse population. HSD is particularly interested in partnerships that are co-designed and formalized through subcontract arrangements. Partnerships should reflect an equitable division of funding, a focus on strengthening the capacity of partners, a commitment to collecting and using data, and the leveraging of investments by other public or private organizations committed to the project. Any application outlining a partnership will require partner agency signature and may require a memorandum of understanding between agencies.

This notice also links to resources to help potential applicants learn more about HSD's investment priorities and standard application requirements. Each funding opportunity, when released, will provide additional detailed information specific to the funding opportunities in the table below.

In the event of budget additions through Mayoral or City Council budget appropriations, HSD may elect to modify existing contracts until such contracts require a new funding process, or HSD may develop a new funding

opportunity to expend the additional funds. HSD recommends parties interested in applying for HSD funds review the Department’s [Funding Opportunities Webpage](#) regularly.

Food bank services also include but are not limited to: home delivery of food, meal programs, weekend hunger or backpack programs, nutrition education, and social services navigation assistance at food programs (e.g. Community Connectors, or similar strategies, to assist individuals and families to attain self-sufficiency.)</p> <p><i>*The \$111,686 funding amount in 2020 is for a 6-month contract starting in July. <p>Supporting Youth and Young Adults for Success</p> <p>This investment combines two, previously published opportunities known as “Youth Development” and “Youth and Young Adult Employment.”</p> <p>The Supporting Youth and Young Adults for Success investment aims to build protective factors for young people between 14 – 24 years old living in Seattle. The RFP will invest in two strategies (1) Supportive Services (e.g. enhancing youth and young adults’ strengths and skills, promoting leadership, and connecting with cultures and communities) and (2) pre-employment activities that build pathways for future career opportunities.</p>	March 2020	\$3,850,290	January 2021	Request for Proposal
