12	partnerships across the City in order to provide Seattle communities with equitable access				
13	to government resources; and				
14	WHEREAS, a focus on equity is essential to any community involvement process in order to				
15	build relationships and improve outcomes, especially for under-represented and under-				
16	served communities, including, but not limited to, renters, immigrants and refugees,				
17	communities of color, people experiencing homelessness, LGBTQ persons, low-income				
18	households, youth, and seniors; and				
19	WHEREAS, Resolution 27709, adopted in 1987, Resolution 28115, adopted in 1989, and				
20	Resolution 28948, adopted in 1994, established a process for dividing Seattle into 13				
21	neighborhood District Council districts, each with a District Council comprised of local				
22	residents, business owners and other community members that provide representatives to				
23	the citywide City Neighborhood Council; and				
24	WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution 27709, Resolution 28115, and Resolution 28948, District				
25	Councils and the City Neighborhood Council receive dedicated staff support from the				
26	Department of Neighborhoods, review and provide input on City budget issues, and are				

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tasked with rating and ranking eligible applications for Neighborhood Matching Fund allocations; and

3	WHEREAS, as the composition of Seattle's population continues to change, the City needs to			
4	continually revisit, revise, and expand its public engagement efforts in order to ensure			
5	representatives from growing demographic groups have opportunities to participate in			
6	City decision-making processes that respond to their unique preferences and needs, and			
7	that barriers that discourage people from participating are eliminated; and			
8	WHEREAS, the public involvement programs and practices advanced by City departments			
9	should reflect Seattle's commitment to the Race and Social Justice Initiative, which			
10	focuses on ending structural racism and race-based inequities both within City			
11	government and across the community; and			
12	WHEREAS, as part of the City's 2016 Adopted Budget, the City Council requested that the			
13	Department of Neighborhoods develop a plan to provide more equitable community			
14	engagement, with a particular focus on Department of Neighborhoods staff resources			
15	assigned to support the District Council system; and			
16	WHEREAS, on July 13, 2016, Mayor Murray issued Executive Order 2016-06 directing the			
17	Department of Neighborhoods to prepare an ordinance that (1) creates a Seattle			
18	Community Involvement Commission, and (2) supports the implementation of more			
19	equitable public involvement techniques by amending Chapter 3.35 of the Seattle			
20	Municipal Code to end the practice of providing District Councils and the City			
21	Neighborhood Council with unique and prioritized access to City resources, thereby			
22	affording Department of Neighborhoods staff the capacity to assist and engage a broader			
23	range of community voices; NOW, THEREFORE,

11	Section 3. Section 3.35.050 of the Seattle Municipal Code, last amended by Ordinance			
12	117977, is amended as follows:			
13	3.35.050 Neighborhood Matching Subfund ((-))			
14	A. There is hereby established in the City Treasury, as a subfund of the General			
15	Fund, a Neighborhood Matching Subfund to be administered by the Director of the Department			
16	of Neighborhoods and into which shall be deposited whatever sums the City may receive or			
17	allocate from time to time or during the annual budget process ((for neighborhood planning and			
18	assistance purposes)).			
19	B. Disbursements from the Neighborhood Matching Subfund shall comply with			
20	all applicable provisions of the State Constitution, State law, City Charter, and ordinances of			
21	the City, and shall be made from appropriations authorized by the City Council by			
22	ordinance.			

1 C. Funds appropriated from the Neighborhood Matching Subfund shall not lapse 2 and shall be carried over each year until fully expended, reallocated by administrative 3 action, or abandoned or reappropriated to other authorized activities. 4 D. There is hereby established in the Neighborhood Matching Subfund a new 5 account called the Neighborhood Participation Account into which shall be deposited any 6 cash proceeds provided as matching participation in furtherance of projects authorized by 7 the City Council as part of the Neighborhood Matching Subfund program. 8 E. Funds received and deposited in accordance with the provisions of subsection 9 3.35.050.D ((of this section)) are available for appropriation for uses contemplated by the 10 Neighborhood Matching Subfund Program. 11 Section 4. A new Chapter 3.62 is added to the Seattle Municipal Code as follows: 12 **CHAPTER 3.62 COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT COMMISSION** 13 3.62.010 Establishment 14 There is established a Community Involvement Commission to advise and make 15 recommendations to the Mayor and City Council on the development of plans, policies, 16 regulations, strategies, and community grant funding processes that advance equitable public 17 engagement and civic participation in ((the)) The City of Seattle. The Commission shall act in an 18 advisory capacity only. 19 3.62.020 Membership 20 A. The Commission is comprised of 16 members. Appointments shall be made to 21 ensure that varied community perspectives are represented. At least one position shall be held by 22 a representative from each of the seven City Council districts. If a member cannot be found from 23 a particular district, that seat will remain empty. Appointments shall be made, to the extent

possible, so that the Commission membership reflects the current demographics of the City,
 including consideration of historically underrepresented communities.

B. Members serve without compensation.

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3.62.030 Appointment and term

5 All positions are numbered one through 16. Individuals shall be appointed into A. 6 those numbered positions. Members in positions one through seven shall be appointed by a 7 majority vote of the Council, with each member representing the City Council district that 8 corresponds to their position number. Individuals in positions eight through 14 shall be appointed 9 by the Mayor, subject to confirmation by a majority vote of the Council. Position 14 shall be 10 filled by a young adult pursuant to the Get Engaged Program in Chapter 3.51. Members in 11 positions 15 and 16 shall be selected by the Commission subject to approval by the Mayor and 12 confirmation by a majority vote of the Council. All positions shall be filled as soon as practicable 13 after the Council and Mayor have authorized the creation of the Commission. Staff from the 14 Department of Neighborhoods may provide appointment recommendations to both the Mayor 15 and City Council.

16 Β. For the initial round of appointments, odd numbered positions will serve one-year 17 terms and even numbered positions will serve two-year terms. After the conclusion of the initial 18 terms, all subsequent terms of each position shall be for two years, with the exception of the 19 young adult position appointed pursuant to Chapter 3.51 who shall serve a one-year term. No 20 members shall serve more than two full consecutive terms. Any vacancy in an unexpired term 21 shall be filled in the same manner as the original appointment. A member whose term is ending 22 shall continue on an interim basis as a member with voting rights until such time as a successor 23 for that position has been appointed and confirmed by the City Council.

3 **3.62.060** Unexcused absences and removal

Any member may request an excused absence. For City Council appointed positions, the Council
may remove any member who is absent from three or more consecutive meetings without cause,
or otherwise for cause. For mayoral and Commission appointed positions, the Mayor may
remove any member who is absent from three or more consecutive meetings without cause, or
otherwise for cause. The Commission may recommend, by a majority vote, that the Mayor or
Council remove any member who is absent without excuse from three consecutive Commission

1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE relating to public outreach and engagement; creating a Community Involvement Commission to advise and make recommendations to the Mayor and City Council; amending Sections 3.35.010, 3.35.030, and 3.35.050 of the Seattle Municipal Code; and adding a new Chapter 3.62, consisting of Sections 3.62.010, 3.62.020, 3.62.030, 3.62.040, 3.62.050, and 3.62.060, to the Seattle Municipal Code.

Summary and background of the Legislation: On July 13, 2016, Mayor Murray issued Executive Order 2016-06, which directed City departments to implement new outreach and engagement practices that prioritize equity and reaffirm the City's commitment to inclusive participation. Executive Order 2016-06 also called for the creation of a new Community Involvement Commission and expressed the Mayor's intent to end the City's practice of providing District Councils and the City Neighborhood Council with prioritized access to City resources, thereby affording City staff the capacity to assist and engage a broader range of community Involvement Commission and (2) update the Department of Neighborhoods chapter (SMC 3.35) to better reflect the Department's current policies and practices as well as those advanced by the Mayor in Executive Order 2016-06 regarding dedicated City staff support for District Councils and the City Neighborhood Council.

2. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

This legislation creates, funds, or amends a CIP Project.

3. SUMMARY OF FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

X This legislation does not have direct financial implications.

4. OTHER IMPLICATIONS

- a) Does the legislation have indirect or long-term financial impacts to the City of Seattle that are not reflected in the above?
 No; existing City resources will be used to implement and fund the policy, program and staffing changes advanced by this ordinance.
- **b)** Is there financial cost or other impacts of not implementing the legislation? If this ordinance is not adopted, District Councils and the City Neighborhood Council

could continue to receive a higher level of City assistance (prioritized support from DON's team of Neighborhood District Coordinators, a distinct role in the review and ranking of Neighborhood Matching Fund grant applications) than all other community organizations located and working in Seattle neighborhoods. Additionally, a new Community Involvement Commission and other elements of the public engagement framework outlined in this legislation to foster ongoing participation by a broader range of community members would not be realized. These potential outcomes are inconsistent with the City of Seattle's responsibility, as a steward of public funds, to direct its limited staff and public engagement resources to programs and activities that are inclusive, effective, and accessible to all local residents and stakeholders that wish to participate, including representatives of underserved and underrepresented populations.

c) Does this legislation affect any departments besides the originating department?

The legislation will primarily impact DON, which will be responsible for staffing the Community Involvement Commission and leading the City's ongoing efforts to implement public outreach and engagement practices that are equitable, inclusive, and effective. However, through Executive Order 2016-06, the Mayor has directed all City departments to work with DON to develop community involvement plans and practices that are consistent with the policies and initiatives put forward in this ordinance and its accompanying resolution.

d) Is a public hearing required for this legislation?

A public hearing is not required for this specific piece of legislation; however, it will be transmitted to the City Council as part of the Mayor's 2017-2018 Proposed Budget and the City Council will host multiple public hearings on the Mayor's proposal as part of their review process.

- e) Does this legislation require landlords or sellers of real property to provide information regarding the property to a buyer or tenant? No.
- f) Is publication of notice with *The Daily Journal of Commerce* and/or *The Seattle Times* required for this legislation? No.
- **g) Does this legislation affect a piece of property?** No.
- h) Please describe any perceived implication for the principles of the Race and Social Justice Initiative. Does this legislation impact vulnerable or historically disadvantaged communities?

Consistent with Executive Order 2016-06, this ordinance would create a new Community Involvement Commission. The intent of this effort is to help engage a broader range of community members – including representatives from underserved and underrepresented populations – in City decision-making processes. Additionally, ending the City's practice of providing District Councils and the City Neighborhood Council with prioritized access to City resources will allow City staff to support a greater diversity of community organizations, including those that serve vulnerable and/or historically disadvantaged populations.

 If this legislation includes a new initiative or a major programmatic expansion: What are the long-term and measurable goals of the program? Please describe how this legislation would help achieve the program's desired goals. This ordinance is part of a larger effort to advance policy and program changes designed to make the City's community involvement practices more equitable and inclusive. Measurable outcomes tied to the passage of this ordinance include the formation of a new, citywide Community Involvement Commission. Appointments to the Commission are expected to come before the City Council's Affordable Housing, Neighborhoods and Finance Committee in early 2017.

j) Other Issues:

To meet its business needs, DON's 2017-2018 budget proposal reallocates 2.0 FTE Neighborhood District Coordinator positions that previously provided staff support to District Councils to 2.0 FTE Strategic Advisor 1 positions. The reallocation would be budget-neutral; however, the funding source for the two positions would shift from General Fund support within DON to funding provided by the Seattle Department of Transportation (SDOT). Both Strategic Advisor 1 positions would work closely with staff from SDOT and the Office of Economic Development to help address the impacts of complex, large-scale infrastructure improvement projects on local communities.

This ordinance was transmitted to the City Council together with a companion resolution.
