

The City of Seattle is committed to being a safe, vibrant, interconnected, and affordable city.

Week Overview

The second week of the 2016 legislative session began with Martin Luther King Jr. Day, one of the busiest days for the legislature and legislative staff as many stakeholder groups and individuals take advantage of the Federal Holiday to come to Olympia as citizen lobbyists and voice their input on the many issues being debated.

The Senate held floor action on <u>E2SSB 6194</u> on Wednesday, which would re-enact and amend the charter schools initiative (I-1240) and addresses concerns by the Supreme Court over the funding structure in the initiative. The bill passed with a 27-20-2 vote with Republicans and two Democratic Senators supporting the bill, and the majority of Democrats opposing it. The bill now has been referred to the House Education committee.

Thursday was Washington Film Incentive Day, which brought filmmakers from around the state to the Capitol. As is becoming a tradition, the stakeholders created some of the more imaginative lobbying techniques, including numerous "zombie" sitings on campus, highlighting the successful series "Z Nation" which is filmed entirely in the Spokane area. More on the Film Incentive bill below.

Finally, on Thursday, the King County Superior Court struck down Tim Eyman's Initiative 1366, which narrowly passed during last November's election, as unconstitutional. I-1366 would have cut sales tax by 1% starting in April unless the Legislature put forward a public vote to amend the State's constitution to require a 2/3 majority on any vote to raise taxes. The sales tax cut could have had potentially severe consequences, costing an estimated \$8 billion through the middle of 2021. Eyman, who happened to be testifying in front of the Senate Government Operations & Security Committee at the time of the ruling, vowed to continue his fight and has already lined up multiple versions of potential initiatives that would require a supermajority to increase taxes.

Priority Areas

Safety Net and Housing

Affordable Housing Work Session

On Tuesday, January 19th, the House Community Development, Housing and Tribal Affairs committee held a work session on state affordable housing policy. The Department of Commerce discussed the Housing Trust Fund investments in affordable housing, the Housing Finance Commission presented on their programs and the communities they serve, the Low Income Housing Alliance discussed their housing and homelessness priorities, and the City of Seattle Office of Housing presented on the HALA process and recommendations.

Preservation Tax Exemption

Last week, <u>SB 6239</u>, (Sen. Fain-R) which provides a property tax exemption for the preservation of affordable housing, was heard in the Senate Human Services, Mental Health and Housing committee. Also, companion <u>HB 2544</u> (Rep. Frame-D) was heard in the House Community Development, Housing and Tribal Affairs committee, and is scheduled for executive session on Tuesday, January 26^{th} .

Unreinforced Masonry

Rep. Eric Pettigrew (D) introduced two bills on unreinforced masonry (<u>HB 2688/HB 2689</u>). <u>HB</u> 2688 allows cities to levy a regular property tax, in excess of current statutory limits, for up to 10 years to fund the rehabilitation of historic buildings. <u>HB 2689</u> creates a state historic building rehabilitation program in the Department of Commerce to provide loans for the safety and preservation of historic buildings. Both are scheduled for a hearing in the House Community Development, Housing and Tribal Affairs on Monday, January 25th. Barb Graff, director of the Seattle Office of Emergency Management will testify to the need for legislative action on this challenging issue.

Tenant Protections

Rep. Farrell (D) and Sen. Miloscia (R) reintroduced <u>HB 2015/SB 5377</u>, which allows cities to require landlords to provide up to 90 days' notice for large rent increases and modifies when relocation assistance is provided to low-income individuals who are forced to move due to demolition, change of use, or other substantial changes to the property. The bills have not been scheduled for a hearing.

Sen. Miloscia (R) and Rep. Ormsby (D) reintroduced <u>SB 5378/HB 1565</u>. The bill prohibits a person from discriminating against a tenant based on their source of income. <u>SB 5378</u> was heard in the Senate Human Services, Mental Health and Housing committee on January 21^{st} .

Mental Health & Homelessness

On Wednesday, January 20th, the House Early Learning and Human Services committee held a work session on children's mental health issues. Physicians and community providers discussed the challenges, evidenced-based practices, and services currently provided in communities across the state.

<u>HB 2396</u> by Rep. McBride (D) provides access to primary care for the homeless. The legislation has raised some concerns by providers regarding who would be allowed to give consent for care of homeless youth. As a result, there is another bill being worked on to address this.

<u>HB 2439</u> by Rep. Kagi (D) establishes the children's mental health work group to review the barriers that exist in identifying and treating mental health issues in children with a particular focus on birth to age 5, and report to the Legislature by Dec. 1st, 2016. The bill was heard in the House Early Learning and Human Services committee on January 20th.

Consumer Finance

<u>HB 2505</u> by Rep. G. Hunt (R) requires a financial institution issuing a payroll card to provide access to automated teller machines that do not charge a fee for withdrawals from a payroll deposit account. The bill is scheduled for a hearing on Tuesday, January 26^{th} .

The Senate moved <u>SB 5222</u> to the Rules committee on January 19th. This bill would allow debt collection agencies to charge consumers a \$0.50 cent fee plus 3% of the payment amount fee for use of a credit card. Opponents of SB 5222 say the legislation would exacerbate consumers overall financial situation by allowing them to use a credit card and would add more fees to vulnerable populations with legal financial obligations. OIR will monitor whether the bill is brought to the House floor for debate.

Education

McCleary

Last week, <u>SB 6195</u> by Sen. Rivers (R), which provides a plan to comply with the McCleary ruling by establishing an education funding task force to continue to review data and make recommendations to the legislature on fully funding K-12, was heard in the Senate Early Learning and K-12 Education on January 18th. Rep. Lytton (D) has sponsored the companion bill <u>HB 2366</u>, which was heard on January 20th in the House Appropriations committee and is scheduled for executive session on January 21st.

School Levies

The Senate Early Learning and K-12 Education committee heard <u>SB 6183</u> on January 18th. The bill addresses local school levy authority by keeping school district levy lids at 28 percent until 2020. Beginning in 2021, school district levy lids would be reduced by 1 percent per year until 2024 when the lid would be set at 24 percent for non-grandfathered school districts. Grandfathered school districts would receive a 1 percent levy lid reduction per year for four years until 2024. Seattle Public Schools is a grandfathered district and their current levy rate is 36.97 percent.

Rep. Lytton (D) introduced <u>HB 2698</u>, which delays changes to the school district formula for calculating school districts' maximum maintenance and operation levy authority for one year. The bill was heard in the House Finance committee on January 20^{th} .

Student Homelessness

Rep. Fey (D) has reintroduced <u>E2SHB 1682</u> (companion bill <u>SB 5065</u>, sponsored by Sen. Frockt-D), which establishes a competitive grant program to award grants to school districts to pilot increased identification of homeless students and link homeless children with stable housing. The bill was heard in the House Appropriations committee on January 18th and is scheduled for executive session on January 25th.

Sen. Frockt (D) also introduced <u>SB 6298</u>, which provides a competitive grant system for highneed school districts to ensure homeless students continue attending the same schools, maintain housing stability, and improve academic achievement. The bill was heard in the Senate Early Learning and K-12 Education on January 21st.

<u>2SHB 1295</u> (companion bill <u>SB 5437</u>) by Rep. Zack Hudgins (D), which concerns breakfast after the bell programs, passed the House Education Committee on January 14th and the House Appropriations committee on January 21st.

Environment

Sen. Hobbs (D) introduced <u>SB 6306</u> which would institute a tax on carbon emissions in the State. The tax would be levied and imposed on the carbon content of fossil fuels extracted, manufactured, or introduced into this state, with some exceptions, at a rate equal to \$8 per metric ton of CO2. The revenues generated would be applied to storm water infrastructure, fish barrier removal projects, programs that advance renewable energy and energy conservation, and multi-modal and public transportation projects. The bill was heard in the Senate Energy, Environment and Telecommunications committee on January 21st.

Also on January 21st, the same committee voted on Sen. Ericksen's (R) <u>SB 6173</u>, which would prohibit the Department of Ecology from adopting new clean air rules with limits on greenhouse gas emissions without prior legislative direction. The bill passed on party lines, 5-3.

Transportation

Sen. Fain (R) and Rep. Moscoso (D), respectively, introduced <u>SB 6314/HB 2590</u>, which allow King County to transfer ownership of a county road to a city or town if the road is within a city or town or abuts the boundary of a city or town on both sides. <u>HB 2590</u> is scheduled for a hearing in the House Local Government committee on January 27^{th} and executive session on January 28^{th} . <u>SB 6314</u> is scheduled for a hearing in the Senate Transportation committee on January 25^{th} .

Public Safety and Government Operations

Economic Development

Rep. Riccelli (D) is the sponsor of <u>HB 2542</u> which would extend and incrementally increase the amount of the Washington motion picture competitive program and extend the end date of the program. Currently this tax preference is scheduled to expire in 2017. Currently, Washington caps the tax preferences at 3.5 Million, while Oregon and British Columbia have much higher caps. This bill would extend the expiration date of the program until 2023, and gradually increase the amount that can be claimed through the program to \$10 million. This incentive is a key component in many television and films being produced in Seattle and across the state.

Marijuana

Tuesday saw hearings on four marijuana related bills in the House Commerce & Gaming committee, including <u>HB 2368</u> and <u>HB 2494</u> (Rep. Tarleton-D and Rep Hurst-D, respectively). HB 2368 would seek to align marijuana possession penalties more closely with alcohol possession penalties and HB 2494 establishes a temporary pilot program to allow delivery of marijuana solely in Seattle, which, among other benefits, would greatly help individuals with mobility issues access medication they may need.

Pensions

The Senate Government Operations and Security Committee passed Sen. Roach's (R) <u>SB 6170</u>, (companion <u>HB 2648</u>, Rep. Fey-D) which would expand investment opportunities for the Cities of Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane, bringing them in-line with the Washington State Investment Board and the UW Endowment fund. The vote was unanimous.

Body Cameras

The House Judiciary committee passed Rep. Hansen's (D) legislation on body cameras HB 2362, on January 20th, on an almost unanimous vote, with only one Republican voting opposed.

Gun Safety

The House Judiciary committee also held a hearing on five gun and gun safety bills on January 21st. They included Rep. Jinkins' (D) <u>HB 2461</u> on extreme risk protection orders, Rep. Kagi's (D) <u>HB 1747</u> regarding child access prevention, Rep. Walkinshaw's (D) <u>HB 2460</u> restoring local authority to regulate firearms in certain public places, Rep. Blake's (D) <u>HB 2481</u> concerning short-barreled rifles, and Rep. Senn's (D) <u>HB 2372</u> regarding disposition of seized and forfeited firearms. Assistant Chief Robert Merner and Sgt. Adrian Diaz travelled to Olympia and joined hundreds of survivors, families and public health experts to testify in favor of Extreme Risk Protection Orders and Child Access Prevention. Over 700 people signed in to testify at the hearing.

Looking Ahead

On Wednesday, January 27th at 1:30 pm, the Senate Commerce and Labor committee will hold a hearing on Sen. Ericksen's (R) <u>SB 6443</u>, which would repeal the State Human Rights Commissions rule requiring access to gender-segregated facilities based on gender identity and expression, and prohibit the HRC from making any future rules on that subject.

Rep. McBride's (D) bill, <u>HB 2576</u>, will be heard on Thursday, January 28th at 1:30 pm. The legislation allows public agencies to charge a fee in order to recover costs related to public records requests when those records are for the purpose of sale or resale. The legislation also creates a public records commission to administer the provisions of the Public Records Act.

Committee schedules are tight as cut-off for bills to move out of committee is just two weeks away. Committee chairs are scheduling executive sessions on bills at a robust pace and some floor action is beginning. This week could be critical in getting bills out of committee in time to be debated on the floor.

It is still anticipated that the Legislature will finish its work and sine die on schedule, March 10th. This goal was brought slightly more into focus with the ruling on I-1366, which eased some pressure on creating the supplemental budgets. An appeal to the Supreme Court, thought, still holds the key to getting out on time.
