

The City of Seattle is committed to being a safe, vibrant, interconnected, and affordable city.

<u>Week Overview</u>

With the legislature set to end its regular 60-day session with no budget agreement in sight, Governor Inslee announced on Monday, March 7th that he intended to veto bills that had been previously delivered to his desk if lawmakers did not—at a minimum—agree on a budget framework by 10 pm on March 10th, the last day of the 2016 regular session. He said he wanted to incentivize negotiators to complete their work. At that time, the Governor had 37 bills awaiting his signature.

On Tuesday, March 8th the Senate passed the supplemental transportation budget, with the House following suit the next day. This is discussed in further detail below.

On Thursday, March 10th, both chambers ended the 2016 regular session Sine Die at approximately 9:00 pm without finalizing a budget or even a budget framework. At 10:00 pm Gov. Inslee released a list of 27 bills he had vetoed. The 10 bills the Governor did sign were significant to public health and safety, according to his office. Overall, 13 Democrat- and 14 Republican-sponsored bills were vetoed. Bills vetoed by the governor can be reintroduced during a special session to move back through the legislative process. The Legislature can also override a veto on a bill with a two-thirds vote in each chamber, in which case the bill becomes law. At a press conference at 10:30 pm Thursday, Governor Inslee called a special session for the purpose of finishing negotiations on the supplemental operating budget. During a special session, bills from the previous session revert to their highest status in their house of origin. All bills are technically alive during a special session, but the legislature usually only focuses on the budget and budget related bills.

Priority Areas

Budgets

New 2016 Supplemental Operating Budget Released by Senate

On Friday, March 11th, the Senate submitted a new supplemental operating budget proposal, <u>PSSB 6667</u>. The Senate proposal adds \$178 million for the 2015-2017 biennium budget adopted in 2015, which is an increase in spending from the last Senate proposal of \$144 million. The proposal also funds wildfire fighting and prevention costs at \$190 million using the state's budget stabilization account. The proposal was heard in Senate Ways and Means committee on Friday, March 11th. At a press conference that morning, House leaders stated that they would not be releasing their latest proposal publicly, as they did not wish to negotiate through the press.

According to some reports, the three major hurdles in the budget negotiations are 1) if and how the budget stabilization account (rainy day funds) should be used, 2) if funding levels should be set to be balanced over two or four years, and 3) whether pension accounts should be merged.

Transportation

Supplemental Transportation Budget

The Senate passed the negotiated <u>2016 supplemental transportation budget</u> on Tuesday, March 8th, by a 44-5 vote, and the House concurred on Wednesday, March 9th, by an 86-10 vote.

The supplemental transportation budget increases appropriations for the 2015-2017 biennium by \$476 million. Highlights from the supplemental transportation budget are:

- The joint transportation committee is directed to study the issues surrounding minority and women-owned business contracting related to the transportation sector. The study should identify any best practices adopted in other states that encourage participation by minority and women-owned businesses. The joint transportation committee, with direction from the executive committee, may form a legislative task force at the conclusion of the study to help to inform the legislature of any best practices identified from other states that encourage minority and women-owned businesses' participation in the transportation sector.
- \$750,000 to WSDOT for a grant program that makes awards for the following: (a) Support for nonprofit agencies, churches, and other entities to help provide outreach to populations underrepresented in the current apprenticeship programs; (b) pre- apprenticeship training; and (c) child care, transportation, and other supports that are needed to help women and minorities enter and succeed in apprenticeship. The department must report on grants that have been awarded and the amount of funds disbursed by December 1, 2016, and annually thereafter.
- \$1 million for safety improvements and operations relating to homeless encampments along I-5 between milepost 162 and milepost 165. WSDOT is directed to coordinate timing of the safety improvements with the City of Seattle and King County to ensure that a collaborative and comprehensive approach is taken to address emergency conditions in support of the city and county's transitional services.

• \$10 million in funding provided in last year's transportation package for the Northgate transit center pedestrian bridge was moved up two-biennia to 2017-2019 and 2019-2021. This means that the pedestrian bridge and Link Light Rail at Northgate will now open concurrently.

Safety Net and Housing

Preservation Tax Exemption

<u>SB 6239</u> (Sen. Fain-R) which provide a property tax exemption for the preservation of affordable housing, did not receive a vote prior to cutoff. The bill has been returned to the Senate Rules committee for further consideration. The City supports this legislation.

Tenant Protections

Sen. Mullet (D)'s <u>SB 6413</u> which would require a landlord to notify a prospective tenant if they will accept a comprehensive reusable tenant screen report prior to charging that prospective tenant for a background check or screening report, was given a unanimous vote of concurrence in the Senate on Wednesday, March 9th after being amended in the House. The bill has been delivered to the Governor. The City supports this legislation.

Certificate of Restoration of Opportunity

<u>HB 1553</u> (Rep. Walkinshaw-D) which would provide a certificate to former offenders reentering the workforce, was delivered to the Governor for his signature on Tuesday, March 8th. The legislation would prohibit state and local governments from disqualifying an applicant for a license, certificate or other qualification to engage in certain professions or business solely based on the applicant's criminal history. The City supports this legislation.

Youth Mental Health

Rep. Kagi's (D) bill <u>SHB 2439</u> increasing access to adequate and appropriate mental health services for children and youth, was returned to the House for a vote on concurrence on Tuesday, March 8th. The House, however, refused to concur and asked the Senate to recede from their amendments. On Thursday, March 10th the Senate did recede and the House passed the bill on a final vote of 86-11, and sent it to the Governor. The City supports this legislation.

Accommodations during Pregnancy

ESSB 6149 (Sen. Keiser-D) will require employers of eight or more employees to provide reasonable accommodation in employment for pregnancy, childbirth, or pregnancy-related health conditions. The bill was the last bill the House considered prior to the 5:00 cutoff on Friday, March 4th. The bill passed with a 56-41 vote.

Public Safety and Government Operations

Police Body Cameras

Rep. Hansen's (D) <u>E2SHB 2362</u> which would create a system for requesting police body camera footage and making it available to the public, by setting parameters in the Public Records Act was delivered to the Governor after the House concurred on Senate amendments on Tuesday, March 8th. The vote was 57-39. The final version of the bill includes language allowing agencies to charge public records requesters a fee for redacting the footage necessary to comply with applicable disclosure exemptions. The City supports this legislation.

Pensions

<u>SB 6170</u> (Sen. Roach-R), was one of 27 bills vetoed by Governor Inslee in response to legislators' failure to reach a budget agreement. Several options remain for passing the bill in special session, including a veto override or moving a companion House bill forward from Rules. The prime sponsor also reintroduced the legislation as a new bill in the Senate. This bill will expand investment opportunities for the pension programs of the Cities of Seattle, Spokane, and Tacoma by exempting certain information from public records requests. The City supports this legislation.

Annexation

<u>SSB5864</u> (Sen. Nelson-D), which makes modifications to sales and use taxes to offset costs to the City of Seattle incurred during annexation of unincorporated areas, was signed into law by Governor Inslee on March 10th.

Post-incarceration Aid

Rep. Pettigrew's (D) <u>HB 2791</u>, which authorizes the creation of a statewide council to help address and promote successful reentry of offenders after incarceration back into the public, received a unanimous vote of concurrence in the House and was sent to the Governor on March 10th. The City supports this legislation.

Deadly Force

<u>HB 2908</u> (Rep. Ryu-D) relating to standards around the use of deadly force and creating a task force to look at community policing standards passed a House vote on concurrence unanimously on Thursday, March 10th. The bill will now head to the Governor's desk.

Business & Occupation Tax Task Force

<u>EHB 2959</u> (Rep. Lytton-D) establishing a task force led by the Department of Revenue to evaluate and recommend legislation and options to simplify the administration of local business taxes and licensing received a unanimous concurrence vote in the House on Tuesday, March 8th and was sent to the governor. While concerns remain with the bill, city advocates were able to pass an amendment which required the task force to produce a report, rather than legislation. With this amendment, the City took a neutral stance on the bill.

Statewide Rape Kit Tracking System

On Tuesday, March 8th the House concurred unanimously on amendments the Senate made to <u>SHB 2530</u> (Rep. Orwall-D), which sets up a statewide system to track all rape kits. The bill now awaits the Governor's signature. The City supports this legislation.

Sexual Assault Victim Rights

<u>SB 6151</u>, (Sen Litzow-R) allowing sexual assault victims to get a permanent protection order against attackers, was pulled from House Rules on Friday, March 4th but did not receive a floor vote. After being passed unanimously in the Senate, advocates expected a similar result in the House. However a last minute amendment, which would have required sexual assault victims to return to court every two years in cases where a judge determined that the victim's safety necessitated that the perpetrator surrender their firearms, effectively killed the bill.

Education

Charter Schools

On September 4, 2015, the Washington Supreme Court ruled the charter school law unconstitutional and declined to reconsider the ruling on November 19, 2015. The Court found that charter schools are not common schools because they are not subject to and under the complete control of the qualified voters of the school district. On Wednesday, March 9th, the House passed SB 6194 which reenacts and amends Initiative 1240 to designate charter schools as schools that are not common schools which operate separately from the common school system and funds charter schools from lottery proceeds. The Senate concurred to the House amendments on Thursday, March 11th and the bill is now headed to the Governor for his signature.

Student Homelessness

<u>HB 1682</u> (Rep. Fey-D) seeks to improve education outcomes for homeless students through increased in-school guidance supports, housing stability, and identification services. Having been amended in the Senate, the House voted to concur on the bill by an 80-16 vote. The bill now awaits the Governor's signature. The City supports this legislation.

Educational Opportunity Gap

On Thursday March 10th the House concurred on amendments to <u>4SHB 1541</u> (Rep. Santos-D), with a 59-38 vote and sent the bill to the Governor. The bill seeks to close the educational opportunity gap by, in part, developing language proficiency and instructional practices, requiring cultural competency training for school staff and changing disciplinary laws. The City supports this legislation.

Environment

Solar Incentives

<u>SHB 2346</u> (Rep. Morris - D) regarding the solar production incentive continues to be considered necessary to implement the budget and remains alive even though it has not received a committee vote in Senate Ways and Means. Issues still remain regarding a clause that would void the legislation should the Governor enact his Clean Air rule, and continued concern with the fiscal note and incentive rates. The City supports this legislation.

Hydro License Fee

<u>HB 1130</u> which extends the fee FERC license holders (including SCL) pay the Departments of Ecology and Fish & Wildlife to process Utilities' clean water permits required for FERC license was given a concurrence vote on Tuesday, March 8th and passed the House 80-16. The bill now awaits the Governor's signature. The City supports this legislation.

Looking Ahead

Governor Inslee has called a 30-day special session in order to complete work on the Operating and Capital budgets. As budget negotiations continue, the House is in "rolling recess" and the Senate is convening "pro forma", both of which essentially mean that members are at home in district subject to being called back when a budget deal is finalized. In addition to the budgets, all bills that were introduced in the 2016 session were re-activated and can be acted upon by the legislature should they wish.
