The City of Seattle is committed to being a safe, vibrant, interconnected, and affordable city.

Week Overview

Week five continued with many hearings as we get closer to the house of origin policy cutoff on February 17th. Bills must pass out of their respective policy committees by end of business that day. Bills that have a financial impact will need to be voted out of fiscal committees (e.g., House Finance, House Appropriations, House and Senate Transportation and Senate Ways & Means) by February 24th. Any bill deemed necessary to implement the budget (NTIB) can be exempt from these cut off deadlines. The upcoming week will have a heightened urgency as legislators work to move as much legislation as possible out of policy committees to make it through this first hurdle.

How the Legislature will address the Washington Supreme Court's *McCleary* Order continues to be a leading issue in Olympia this session. Now that both parties have released their basic education funding proposals, the two sides continue through the negotiation process. Experts continue to analyze and compare the Republican and Democrat education-funding proposals.

Priority Areas

Education

Education Funding Plan: <u>SSB 5607</u>, the Senate Republican's education funding plan, sponsored by Sen. Braun (R), passed off the Senate floor on February 1st, and had a public hearing in the House Appropriations Committee on February 6th. The House Democrats' education-funding plan, <u>SHB 1843</u>, sponsored by Rep. Sullivan (D), had a public hearing in the House Appropriations Committee on February 6th, and an executive session on February 9th.

Levy Cliff: SHB 1059, which would extend the current school district levy authority by one year, was passed out of the House on January 23rd, and received a public hearing in the Senate Ways and Means Committee on January 30th.

Outdoor Preschools: SB 5357, sponsored by Sen. Ranker (D), would establish a pilot program to license outdoor early learning and child care programs. SB 5357 passed out of the Senate Early Learning & K-12 Education Committee on February 6th, and is scheduled for public hearing in the Senate Ways and Means Committee on February 16th.

Public Safety

Death Penalty: Sen. Miloscia (R) and Rep. Orwall (D) have sponsored <u>SB 5354/HB 1935</u>, which abolishes the state's death penalty. <u>HB 1935</u> is scheduled for public hearing in the House Judiciary Committee on February 15th.

Use of Deadly Force: SB 5073/HB 1529 adopts recommendations approved by the state task force, which deletes the good faith and malice clauses in favor of a new standard that asks if a "reasonable officer" would use deadly force in the same circumstances. Both bills also contain policy aimed at funding new training techniques, like de-escalation practices, distribution of less-lethal weapons, and data collection on use of force incidents. Both bills are scheduled for executive session on February 16th.

Sexual Assault Forensic Exams: <u>HB 1109</u>, which creates a pilot project to create and train multidisciplinary community response teams, and creates a funding account using a fee levied on adult entertainment establishments, had a public hearing in the House Appropriations Committee on February 8th, after being voted out of the House Public Safety Committee on January 19th. In addition, <u>HB 1111</u>, which creates procedural improvements to the collection and processing of DNA, including allowing the WSP crime lab to process DNA collected on cases prosecuted under municipal ordinance, is scheduled for a public hearing in the House Appropriations Committee on February 15th, after an amended version of the legislation passed out of the House Public Safety Committee on February 2nd.

Human Trafficking: SB 5029, which protects victims by creating a protection order or no-contact order, is scheduled for executive session in the Senate Law and Justice Committee on February 16th. The House companion bill, HB 1079, was placed on second reading by the House Rules Committee. HB 1078/SB 5030, which extends the statute of limitations for human trafficking crimes from three to ten years, passed in the House unanimously on February 9th, and has been assigned to Senate Law and Justice. The Senate bill passed February 8th, and is assigned to the House Public Safety Committee.

Gun Responsibility: Attorney General Request legislation introduced by Rep. Jinkins (D) and Sen. Frockt (D), <u>HB 1387/SB 5444</u>, will require enhanced background checks for those wishing to purchase an assault weapon. This includes raising the age of purchase to 21, a search of local and federal criminal and mental health databases, and required safety training. The House bill is scheduled for executive action in the House Judiciary committee on February 16th. The Senate bill has not been scheduled for a hearing. In addition, <u>HB 1122/SB 5463</u>, dangerous access prevention, creates criminal liability if a child or anyone prohibited from possessing firearms accesses an unsecured firearm and uses it to hurt themselves or others. The House bill is scheduled for an executive session in the House Judiciary Committee on February 16th.

Law Enforcement and Victim Notification: Bipartisan-sponsored legislation (HB 1501) alerting victims and law enforcement when a prohibited gun buyer illegally tries to purchase a firearm, had a public hearing in the House Judiciary Committee on February 8th. The bill is scheduled for executive session on February 16th.

Police Citizenship: <u>HB 1182</u>, sponsored by Rep. Stokesbary (R), which addresses civil service qualifications for police officers, fire departments, and county sheriff departments by expanding who can apply for a position to include a lawful permanent resident, has been placed on second reading by the House Rules Committee. The companion bill, <u>SB 5389</u>, sponsored by Sen. Miloscia (R), has not been scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate.

Marijuana: SHB 1065, sponsored by Rep. Kirby (D), which would reduce the penalties for possession and transfer of marijuana products outside of the I-502 system in certain circumstances and authorize the noncommercial transfer (gift) of marijuana products in amounts equal to half of the current possession limits by a person 21 years of age or older to another person(s) 21 years of age or older, was passed out of the House Commerce and Gaming Committee on February 2nd. The bill was amended in committee to remove the requirement that marijuana concentrates must be purchased from a marijuana retailer and be accompanied by packaging showing that the marijuana concentrates were purchased from a marijuana retailer to be lawfully possessed or transferred. SHB1065 has been referred to the House Rules Committee.

<u>HB 1260</u>, sponsored by Rep. Fitzgibbon (D), would require a court to vacate misdemeanor marijuana possession convictions on request of a qualifying applicant. The bill received a public hearing in the House Public Safety Committee on January 23rd, and has not yet been scheduled for further action.

<u>HB 1712</u>, sponsored by Rep. Sawyer (D), would allow marijuana retailers to seek an endorsement from the Liquor Cannabis Board (LCB) to deliver marijuana products to those 21 years of age or older. The bill received a public hearing in the House Commerce and Gaming Committee on February 6th.

Ban the Box: HB 1298, sponsored by Rep. Ortiz-Self (D), would prohibit employers from asking about arrests or convictions before an applicant is determined otherwise qualified for a position. The bill passed out of the House Labor & Workplace Standards Committee on January 30th, and is now scheduled for public hearing in the House Appropriations Committee on February 16th. SB 5312, sponsored by Sen. Baumgartner (R), is a similar bill, but which includes preemption of local laws, passed out of the Senate Commerce, Labor & Sports Committee on February 1st, and was then passed to the Senate Rules Committee on February 6th.

Public Records: HB 1594, introduced by Rep. McBride (D), would require the Attorney General to establish a consultation program to assist local governments with best practices for managing public records requests; the agency to offer to participate in mediation with a requester to clarify a public records requestor to resolve any disagreement regarding disclosure; the Division of Archives and Records Management to conduct a feasibility to study for establishing a statewide internet portal for public records management; and authorizes a \$1 surcharge on county recorded documents for the State Archives local competitive grant program and local trainings on record

retention practice. The bill received a received a public hearing in the House State Government, Elections & Information Technology Committee on February 10th, and is scheduled for executive session on either February 14th, February 15th, or February 17th. Mary Perry with the Seattle Police Department testified in support of this bill.

HB 1595, introduced by Rep. McBride (D), which would allow agencies to charge a small fee for some public records requests and deny frequent automatically generated requests that interfere with the essential functions of the agency, received a public hearing in the House State Government, Elections & Information Technology Committee on February 10th, and is scheduled for executive session on either February 14th, February 15th, or February 17th. Mary Perry with the Seattle Police Department also testified in support of this bill.

Voting Rights Act: Sen. Hunt (D) and Rep. Gregerson (D) introduced the Washington Voting Rights Act, <u>SB 5267/HB 1800</u>. This policy would promote equal voting opportunity in certain political subdivisions by authorizing district-based elections, requiring redistricting and new elections in certain circumstances, and establishing a cause of action to redress lack of voter opportunity. The House bill received a public hearing in the House State Government, Elections, and Information Technology Committee February 8th, and is scheduled for executive session February 14th.

General Government

Seattle Center: Rep. Fey (D) introduced <u>HB 1114</u>, which exempts the Seattle Center and Tacoma Dome from the leasehold excise tax (like most other similar facilities in the state). This bill received a public hearing on January 27th, but has not been scheduled for further action.

Property Tax: Rep. Lytton (D) and Sen. Pedersen (D) sponsored HB 1764/SB 5772, which replaces the 1% property tax revenue limits with a limit tied to population change and inflation. The House bill received a public hearing in the House Finance committee on February 10th, but has not been scheduled for further action. The Senate bill is scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Local Government Committee on February 16th.

Lodging Excise Tax: Rep. Pettigrew (D) introduced <u>HB 2015</u>, which extends the lodging tax revenue to all lodging types regardless of the number of lodging units on the premises. The bill has not been scheduled for a public hearing.

Weights and Measures: Rep. Pettigrew (D) sponsored <u>HB 1773</u>, which modifies the schedule of fees charged under the weights and measures statute, modifies the schedule of penalties assessed under the weights and measures statute, and directs the Department of Agriculture to adopt certain weights and measures standards. John Megow with the City Regulatory Compliance and Consumer Protection Office (in FAS) testified in support.

5G Deployment: <u>HB 1921/SB 5711</u>, which address issues related to the deployment of 5G small cells received public hearings on February 8th, in the House Technology & Economic Development and the Senate Environment, Energy, and Telecommunications Committees,

respectively. Steve Crume and Rose Feliciano (SCL) testified in opposition in the Senate. Angela Steel (SDOT) and Caron Cargill (OIR) testified in opposition in the House. The Senate passed SB 5711 out of Committee without any amendments.

Business Improvement Areas: <u>HB 1823</u>, sponsored by Rep. Pederson (D), would make clarifications to current law and streamline the process to establish a Business Improvement Area. HB 1823 received a public hearing on February 9th, in the House Local Government Committee where several people from the Office of Economic Development testified in favor of the legislation. The bill is scheduled for executive session on either February 15th or February 16th.

Unreinforced Masonry: <u>HB 1995</u>, sponsored by Rep. Pettigrew (D), would create the historic building rehabilitation financing pilot program in the Department of Commerce. The bill is scheduled for a public hearing in the House Community Development Committee on February 14th.

Electrical Customer Billing: SB 5624, sponsored by Sen. Hasegawa (D), requires an electric utility to disclose the amounts of federal, state, and local taxes collected and paid by the electric utility on billing statements sent to retail electric customers as well as provide written notice for any public hearing when changes in rates or charges will be considered or approved. This bill is scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Energy, Environment, and Telecommunications Committee on February 14th.

Business Licensing: <u>HB 2005</u>, sponsored by Rep. Lytton (D), seeks to simplify the administration of municipal general business licenses. The bill has been scheduled for a public hearing in the House Finance Committee on February 14th. <u>SB 5777</u>, sponsored by Sen. Brown (R), is a similar piece of legislation, and has been scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Commerce, Labor & Sports Committee on February 15th.

Repeal I-200: Rep. Santos (D) sponsored <u>HB 1158</u>, which repeals Initiative 200. In 1998, the voters approved Initiative 200 and it prohibits the state from discriminating against or granting preferential treatment to an individual or a group based on race, sex, color, ethnicity, or national origin in the operation of public employment, public education, or public contracting. The bill received a public hearing in the House Capital Budget Committee on February 10th, and Director Nancy Locke testified in support.

Environment

Electrification of Transportation: HB 1335 provides authority for Seattle City Light to offer incentives/rebates for the electrification of transportation. The bill, sponsored by Rep. Tarleton (D), received a public hearing on February 9th, in the House Technology & Economic Development Committee. A proposed amendment that would include public utility districts is also being considered.

Model Toxics Control Act: SB 5501/1663, which would impose a surtax on the possession of hazardous substances, received public hearings in both the Senate Energy, Environment & Telecommunications Committee and the House Finance Committee on February 7th.

Airport Environmental Impacts: SHB 1171, sponsored by Rep. Orwall (D), would direct for the completion of a study of certain environmental impacts, including ultrafine particulate emissions, associated with aircraft traffic in areas impacted by airport operations. HB 1171 received a public hearing in the House Environment Committee on January 24th and an executive session on February 9th, when a substitute version was voted out of Committee. The Senate companion bill, SB 5225, sponsored by Sen. Keiser (D), was referred to Senate Ways and Means Committee after it received executive action in the Senate Energy, Environment, and Telecommunications Committee on February 8th.

Medicine Stewardship: <u>HB 1047</u>, sponsored by Rep. Peterson (D), received a public hearing on January 24th, in the House Health Care and Wellness Committee and has been scheduled for an executive session on either February 15th or 17th. This bill would require drug manufacturers to operate a drug take-back program to collect and dispose of prescription and over-the-counter drugs from residential sources.

Paint Stewardship: HB 1376, sponsored by Rep. Peterson (D), received a public hearing on January 26th, and has been scheduled for executive action in the House Environment Committee on February 14th. HB 1376 would require producers of architectural paint to participate in a stewardship program for managing disposal of leftover paint.

Homelessness & Housing

Homelessness: HB 1570, deals with access to homeless housing and assistance, eliminates the sunset for the local homeless housing and assistance document recording fee, and increases the \$40 fee to \$90. The legislation also changes the definition of private rental housing to include non-profit organizations. The bill is scheduled for executive action on the House Community Development, Housing, and Tribal Affairs Committee on February 14th.

In addition, Sen. Miloscia (R) introduced <u>SB 5656</u>, which aims to end homelessness by creating new procedures for reunifying homeless youth/minors, requiring shelter space to be made available to all individuals, criminalizing unsheltered homelessness, pre-empting local guidelines for encampments, and extending the document recording fee until 2022. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Human Services, Mental Health and Housing Committee on February 8th, and is scheduled for executive action on February 15th. Lyset Cadena (OIR) testified on behalf of the City at the hearing, and continues to be involved in discussions with stakeholders and the prime sponsor on components of the bill.

Youth Homelessness: Rep. Slatter (D) and Sen. Zeiger (R) introduced Department of Commerce request legislation, <u>HB 1630/SB 5625</u>, which would allow unaccompanied minors aged 13-18 to consent to share personally identifying information under Washington's Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). The House bill was scheduled for executive action in the House

Early Learning and Human Services Committee on February 10th. The Senate bill is scheduled for a public hearing in the Human Services, Mental Health, and Housing Committee on February 13th.

Preservation Tax Exemption: Sen. Fain (R) introduced <u>SB 5182</u>, which provides a property tax exemption for the preservation of affordable housing. This legislation is one of the recommendations from the Seattle HALA report. Executive action was taken in the Senate Human Services, Mental Health, and Housing Committee on February 8th, and on February 10th the bill was referred to the Senate Ways and Means Committee.

Affordable Housing: HB 1797, was introduced by Rep. McBride (D) to address local option tools for affordable housing. The bill provides multiple tools such as REET 3, REET 1 and 2 flexibility, sales tax rebate, and changing provisions in HB 2263. The bill received public hearing in the House Community Development, Housing, and Tribal Affairs Committee on February 7th, and is scheduled for executive action on February 14th. In addition, the omnibus bill (SB 5254) that makes changes to buildable lands, zoning in urban growth areas, affordable housing, and homelessness, introduced by Sen. Fain (R) received a public hearing on January 26th, in the Senate Local Government Committee, with potential executive action on February 15th.

Tenant Protections: Sen. Frockt (D) and Rep. Riccelli (D) introduced <u>SB 5407/HB 1633</u>, which prohibits landlords from discrimination based on source of income. In addition, Sen. Cleveland (D) and Rep. Frame (D) introduced <u>SB 5408/HB 2040</u> which increases the notification requirements for terminating a residential rental agreement from 20 days to 30 days and provides additional notification of 60 days or more for terminating an agreement where a tenant has occupied a premise for two or more years. <u>SB 5408</u> was amended to remove the 60-day notice requirement and was placed on 2nd Reading by the Senate Rules Committee. <u>HB 1633</u> received a public hearing in the House Judiciary Committee on February 7th, and is scheduled for executive action on February 16th.

In addition, Sen. Angel (R) introduced <u>SB 5569</u>, which pre-empts a city, town, or county, from enacting, maintaining, or enforcing ordinances related to source of income discrimination or political ideology. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Law and Justice Committee on February 8th, and Loren Othon from the City of Seattle Office of Civil Rights testified against the bill.

Safety Net

Family & Medical Leave Insurance: <u>HB 1116</u>, implementing family and medical leave was heard in the House Appropriations Committee on February 9th. The Senate companion bill (<u>SB 5032</u>) was heard on January 30th, in the Senate Commerce, Labor and Sports Committee. A Republican-sponsored bill related to paid family leave, <u>SB 5149</u>, was also heard in this same committee on January 30th.

Equal Pay: Sen. Cleveland's (D) Equal Pay Act, <u>SB 5140</u>, and a Sen. Fain (R) bill on the same topic, <u>SB 5344</u>, were both heard in the Senate Commerce, Labor, and Sports Committee on February 1st. In the House, <u>HB 1533</u> and <u>HB 1506</u>, addressing equal pay, were both passed out of the House Labor and Workplace Standards Committee on January 30th. <u>HB 1533</u> was referred to the Rules Committee. <u>HB 1506</u> was referred to the House Appropriations Committee and is scheduled for public hearing on February 16th.

Safe Injection Sites: Sen. Miloscia (R) and Rep. Stokesbary (R) sponsored <u>SB 5223/HB 1761</u> to block cities and counties in Washington State from hosting safe injection sites. The Senate bill was passed out of the Health Care Committee without recommendation to the State Government Committee and is scheduled for a public hearing on February 15th. The House bill has not been scheduled for a public hearing.

Right to Work: Sen. Baumgartner (R) introduced <u>SB 5692</u>, which would ban employers and unions in the state from agreeing to union-security clauses in collective bargaining contracts. The bill had a public hearing in the Senate Commerce, Labor, and Sports Committee on February 8th.

Transportation

REAL ID: Rep. Clibborn (D) and Sen. King (R) introduced legislation aimed at facilitating compliance with the federal REAL ID act (HB 1041/SB 5008). The bills would modify drivers' licenses and identification card design and fees. SB 5008 was placed on second reading by the Senate Rules Committee.

Distracted Driving: HB 1371/SB 5289, legislation to prevent drivers from holding a smartphone, tablet, or communication device while driving or using a mounted device that requires more than a tap, have been scheduled for hearings this week. HB 1371 received a public hearing in the House Transportation Committee on February 9th, and is scheduled for executive action on February 15th. SB 5289 received a public hearing on February 7th, in the Senate Transportation Committee and is scheduled for executive action on February 13th.

Transportation Network Companies: Sen. King (R) introduced legislation to create a statewide regulatory framework for transportation network companies (<u>SB 5620</u>). Our City departments have had great negotiations with the transportation network companies, and these discussions will help shape the statewide regulation framework. <u>SB 5620</u> received a public hearing in Senate Transportation on February 8th.

Oil Safety Transportation: Sen. Carlyle (D) introduced legislation (SB 5462) to require facilities to update their oil spill and contingency plans, and require railroads to meet financial responsibility requirements. This bill was heard in the Senate Energy, Environment and Telecommunications Committee on February 2nd. A similar bill in the House sponsored by Rep. Farrell (D), HB 1611, had a public hearing February 6th, in the House Environment Committee and is scheduled for executive action on February 14th.

Looking Ahead

The first round of cut off dates, Policy Committee Cutoff and Fiscal Committee Cutoff, are set for February 17th and February 24th. The House of Origin Cutoff is on March 8th.

As a reminder, the second Councilmember Lobby Day is currently slated for Thursday, March 23rd. Council offices should please contact Jasmin Weaver to confirm their attendance.
