We are also seeing bills with many revisions come before committees – some of which have drastically change direction on the bill, either refine the language or make it more expansive. Next week, we will see increased executive action taken and committee agendas are full, not only with the bills being considered, but also with people wanting to testify.

Permits a city, town, or county to adopt additional residential energy code requirements as developed by the state building code council. Requires the state building code council to adopt certain optional efficiency appendices and include them in the state energy code for residential buildings.

Requires the local health jurisdiction, a jurisdictional health department, a combined city and county health department, or a health district to enforce this act.

Requires the state health care authority to take such actions as may be necessary to assure the receipt of federal financial participation under the medical assistance program and any other federal funding sources that are currently available or may become available in the future.

Declares that opioid use disorder is a public health crisis. Requires state agencies to: (1) Increase access to evidence-based opioid use disorder treatment services; (2) Promote coordination of services within the substance use disorder treatment and recovery support system; (3) Strengthen partnerships between opioid use disorder treatment providers and their allied community partners; (4) Expand the use of the state prescription drug monitoring program; and (5) Support comprehensive school and community-based substance use prevention services.

#### **HB 1518**

Establishes a mechanism for employers to reimburse the state for its costs of providing access to appropriate health care services to Washington workers. Under the bill, employers are required to quarterly report their employees and other requested information to HCA, who in turn determines which of the employees are under 65 and enrolled in the medical assistance program. The employer must then pay an assessment for each of those employees who are on medical assistance. The bill also puts in place protections against discrimination by the employer against the employees who are on medical assistance.

#### HB 1523 (SB 5526)

This bill requires the Washington Health Benefit Exchange to develop standardized health plans. The standardized plans must be designed to reduce deductibles, make more services available before the deductible, provide predictable cost sharing, maximize subsidies, limit adverse premium impacts, reduce barriers to maintaining and improving health, and encourage choice based on value, while limiting increases in health plan premium rates. The bill requires the HCA, in consultation with the Exchange, to contract with at least one health carrier to offer Silver and Gold standardized plans on the Exchange for plan years beginning 2021. The bill also requires HCA to develop a plan for premium subsidies for individuals purchasing coverage on the Washington Health Benefit Exchange.

Requires the office of the superintendent of public instruction: (1) In consultation with the department of health, to develop opioid-related overdose policy guidelines and training requirements for public schools and school districts; and (2) To develop and administer a grant program to provide funding to certain public schools and institutions of higher education to train personnel on the administration of the medication to respond to an overdose. Requires certain institutions of higher education to develop a plan for: (1) The maintenance and administration of the medication in and around a residence hall; and (2) The training of designated personnel to administer the medication to respond to an overdose.

This must include efforts to reinforce current governmental public health system capacity and implement service delivery models allowing for system stabilization and transformation. The bill also authorizes the OFM to only allocate funding to DOH if the department, after consultation with federally recognized Indian tribes, a state association representing local health jurisdictions, and the state board of health, jointly certify to the office that they are in agreement on the distribution and uses of state foundational public health services funding across the public health system.

Requires a hospital that does not perform the collection or have appropriate providers available to, beginning July 1, 2020: (1) Provide notice, within two hours of a request, to an individual who presents in the emergency department and requests a collection that the hospital does not perform the collection or does not have appropriate providers available; and (2) Coordinate care with the local community sexual assault agency and assist the patient in finding a facility with an appropriate provider available.

Concerning law enforcement.

(SB 5029)

Requires the criminal justice training commission, when developing curricula, to consider inclusion of alternatives to the use of physical or deadly force so that de-escalation tactics and less lethal alternatives are part of the decision-making process leading up to the consideration of deadly force. The bill passed the House 98-0 and the Senate 47-0 and was delivered to the Governor's desk on January 30.

HB 1073 (SSB 5061) Prohibits a person from knowingly or recklessly allowing, facilitating, aiding, or abetting the manufacture or assembly of an undetectable firearm or untraceable firearm. Prohibits a person from discharging, or menacing or threatening another person, in the commission or furtherance of a felony, with an undetectable firearm or untraceable firearm. Declares undetectable firearms and untraceable firearms as contraband and subjects them to seizure.

HB 1315 (SSB 5174) Prohibits an application for a concealed pistol license from being denied unless the person has not provided evidence of handgun proficiency, in the form and manner required by the Washington state patrol. Provides the requirements for when an applicant for a concealed pistol license must submit to a licensing authority. Requires the Washington state patrol to, by rule, establish minimum standards for handgun proficiency and develop a course to teach handgun proficiency and examinations to measure handgun proficiency. Authorizes the chief of the Washington state patrol to certify qualified handgun instructors.

**SB 5164** 

Authorizes the department of social and health services to establish a food assistance program for victims of human trafficking. Provides eligibility to victims of human trafficking for state family assistance programs, as provided in rule, who otherwise meet program eligibility requirements. Requires utilities that are traditionally responsible for providing electric service to customers and for understanding and engineering the electrical grid for safety and reliability to be engaged in the electrification of the transportation system. Creates the electric vehicle account.
