Weekly Overview

Week five of the 105-day 2019 session began with a snow day and in as long as veterans of the legislative process can recall, the Washington State Capitol Campus closed as a result of the weather on Monday. With legislators, staff, and lobbyists stranded at home amid snow and power outages, all committees were canceled Monday and legislative staff were instructed to stay home. This loss of a day forced many committees to have to reschedule bills into very packed schedules later in the week and could ultimately cause bills to die in committee simply due to lack of time.

We are now closing in on the first major cutoff date of February 22nd. This is the date by which a bill must pass out of its house of origin policy committee in order to remain alive. There are exceptions, such as fiscal bill and matters necessary to implement the budget (NTIB). It is also worth noting that while not common, any bill can come back to life under certain circumstances.

<u>SSB</u> <u>5705</u> (HB 1927)	Rep. Slatter's WSOS expansion bill was heard before the House College & Workforce Development Committee on Tuesday, February 12 th . Due to the snow, the in-person testimony was a bit lighter than the Senate hearing. WSOS and WSOS scholar submitted written testimony. Councilmember Kate Burke of Spokane testified in favor of the bill along with a brief introduction from the City of Seattle's state team. At the hearing, an issue was raised by the Association of Community & Migrant Health Centers regarding the underlying WA State Opportunity Scholarship program, more specifically, the newly created, but not yet up and running graduate program under WSOS. Per Chair Hansen's interest, there is an additional amendment coming which again, speaks to a consequence of the 2018 WSOS bill. This amendment would allow students eligible for WSOS to also receive a College Bound award – this change would better serve this population of students with financial support in furthering their education goals. Chair Hansen is taking the lead on these two House amendments and they are currently being drafted.

The Governor-requested opioid bills (<u>HB 1331/SB 5380</u>) focus on treatment and recovery, pregnant and parenting women, opioid overdose reversal medication, and people with opioid use disorder involved in the criminal justice system. OPR staff have prepared a <u>table comparing</u> the proposed legislation from 2018 that did not ultimately pass compared to HB 1331. A substitute of the House version was passed out of the Health Care & Wellness committee on February 8th. The substitute bill was jointly proposed by Reps Cody and Schmick. A summary of the substitute bill compared to the original can be found on the first page <u>here</u>. The Senate also passed a substitute version out of Health & Long Term Care on February 8th. The substitute bill was proposed by Sen Cleveland and closely mirrors the substitute bill passed in House Health.

Foundational public health servs H HCWDPS Robinson

HB 1518

Addresses the governmental public health system which is comprised of the department of health, state board of health, local health jurisdictions, sovereign tribal nations, and Indian health programs. Requires funding for the governmental public health system to be restructured to support foundational public health services, and in restructuring, there must be efforts to reinforce current governmental public health system capacity and implement service delivery models allowing for system stabilization and transformation.

Employer health care funding

Establishes the taxpayer health care fairness act regarding: (1) A comprehensive approach to providing appropriate health care for all citizens that involves participation by employers; (2) The failure of certain employers, with adequate resources, to offer affordable access to health care services to their employees; and (3) The establishment of a mechanism to reimburse the state for its costs of providing access to appropriate health care services to workers. Declares that the legislature is neutral on whether employers choose to provide access to affordable health care coverage for their employees or pay an assessment to reimburse the state's costs for health care services for their employees.

SHB 1523 Requires the Washington Health Benefit Exchange to develop standardized health plans. The standardized plans must be designed to reduce deductibles, make more services available before the deductible, provide predictable cost sharing, maximize subsidies, limit adverse premium impacts, reduce barriers to maintaining and improving health, and encourage choice based on value, while limiting increases in health plan premium rates.

Provides for a safety net fee for certain ambulance transports to be used to augment funding from other sources, thereby supporting additional payments to ambulance transport providers for
Medicaid services. Requires the state health care authority to establish the manner and format for ambulance transport providers to report required data. Imposes a quality assurance fee for each ambulance transport provided by each ambulance transport provider subject to the fee. Provides for termination and repeal, under the sunset act, of the authorization for ambulance transport quality assurance fees. Creates the ambulance transport fund.

Vaccine preventable diseases

HB 1638Declares that proof of disease immunity through documentation of laboratory evidence of antibody
titer or a health care provider's attestation of a child's history of a disease sufficient to provide

immunity against that disease constitutes proof of immunization for that specific disease. Prohibits a philosophical or personal objection from being used to exempt a child from the measles, mumps, and rubella vaccine.

Personal belief exemptions allow parents to opt out of vaccinating their children against one or more of the vaccines required for school and child care entry for personal/philosophical reasons. The bill had a hearing in House Health Care & Wellness on February 8th and is scheduled for executive session on February 15th. DOH, Rep Harris (the sponsor of the legislation), and other stakeholders held a <u>press conference</u> after the hearing to discuss the legislation, the current measles outbreak, and other issues relating to vaccines.
