Topic

• High Risk Vehicle Stops

Summary

• The complainant alleged that officers engaged in threatening and improper behavior when they conducted a high-risk vehicle stop (HRVS) of a van with a license plate that had been reported stolen

Analysis

- The complainant was driving a van registered to a nonprofit organization for which she was volunteering. The named employees (NEs) were driving a patrol vehicle equipped with an Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR). The ALPR alerted the NEs to the van, which returned a years-old hit for a stolen license plate.
- The NEs conducted a HRVS. They ordered the occupants out of the van with their guns drawn in the low-ready position (pointed at the ground), handcuffed the driver and passenger, and backing officers searched the vehicle.
- OPA interviewed a Lieutenant in the Training Unit and the former Assistant Chief of the Patrol Operations Bureau, who confirmed the NEs actions were consistent with SPD training.
- Department training curriculum lacks any discussion about in what type(s) of a HRVS firearms should be drawn, or whether alternate tactics may be used by one or more officers conducting the stop without compromising officer safety.
- HRVS are reasonable suspicion detentions that significantly impose on a person's liberty, yet SPD does not have a policy that governs such tactics.
- OPA has issued two previous MARs on this topic: one in 2018 and another in 2020.

Recommendation(s)

- Create a policy under SPD Manual Title 6 governing HRVS to provide guidance on the requirements and limitations of such stops, including when it is appropriate for officers to conduct felony-level stops.
- Amplify HRVS training to provide examples of stops in which it may be unnecessary to draw firearms or where alternate tactics exist that ensure both officer and public safety.
