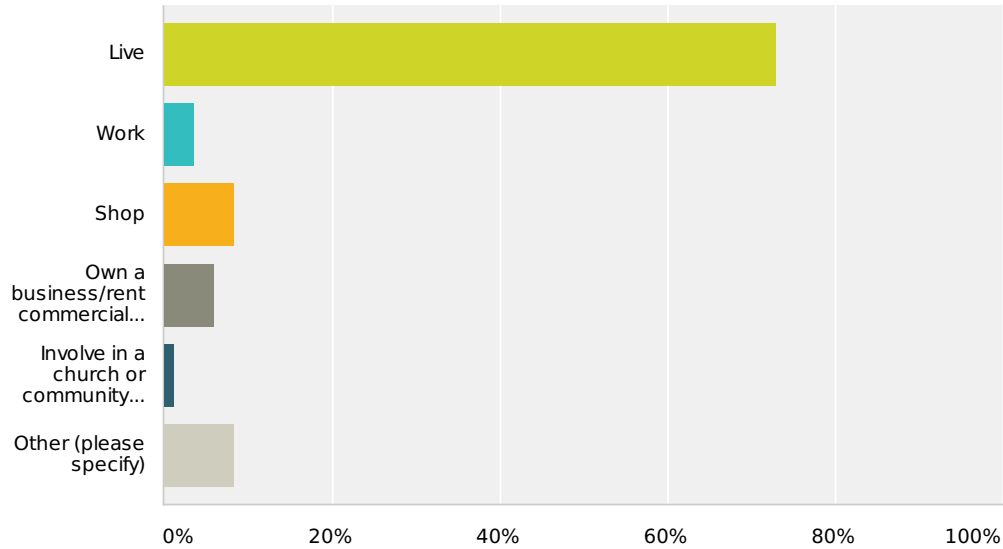


Q1 Which of the following describes your connection to the Central Area? Choose one answer that best applies to you.

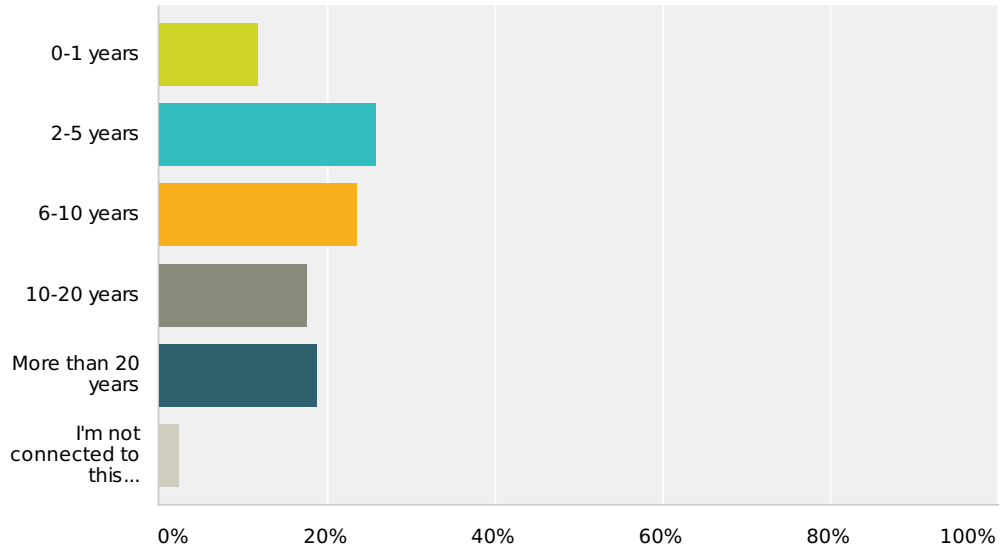

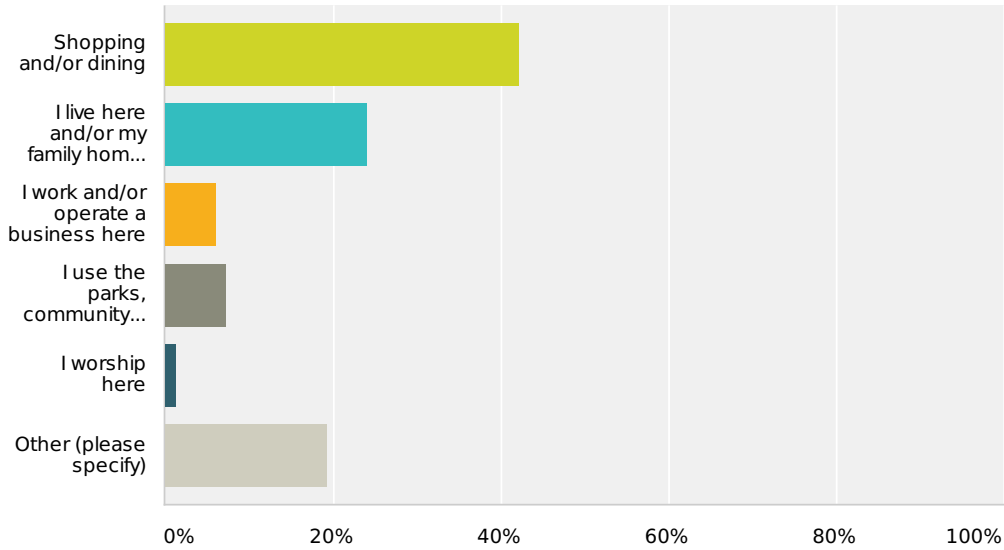

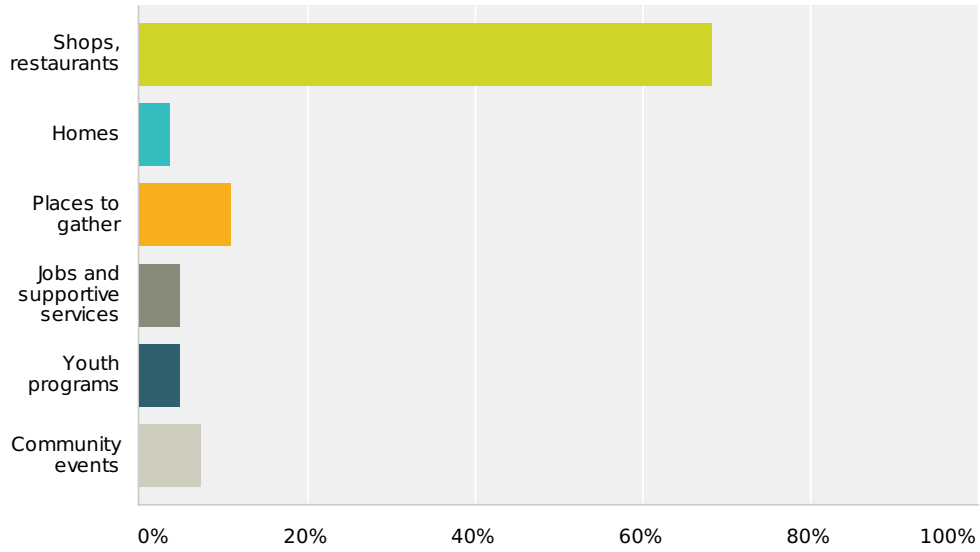

Q6 What would you most like to see more in these community cores?

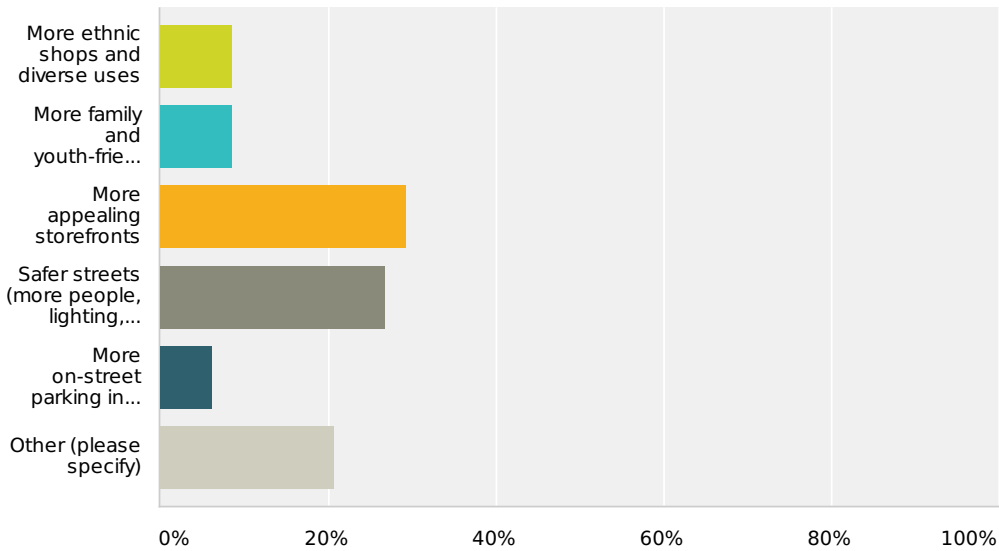

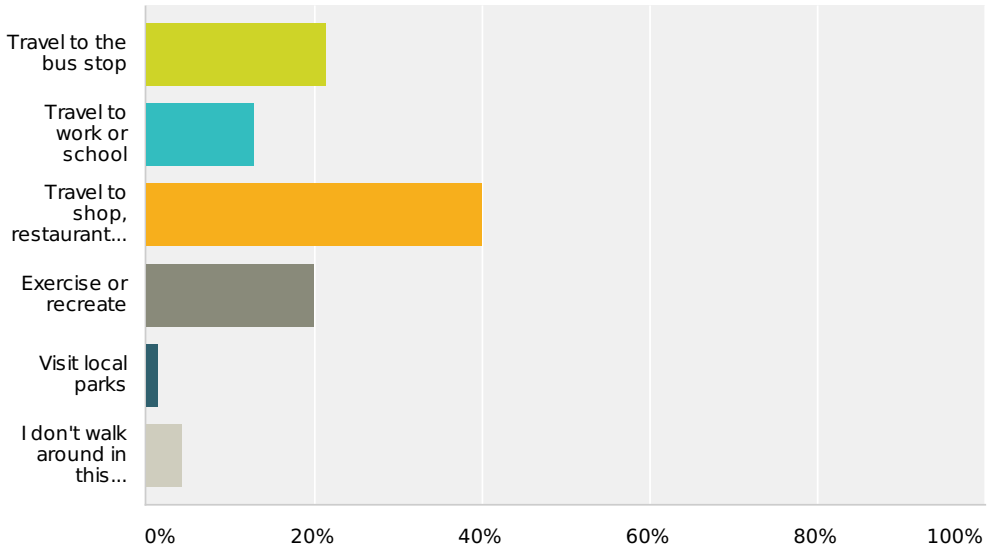

Q16 Do you most often walk in your neighborhood to:

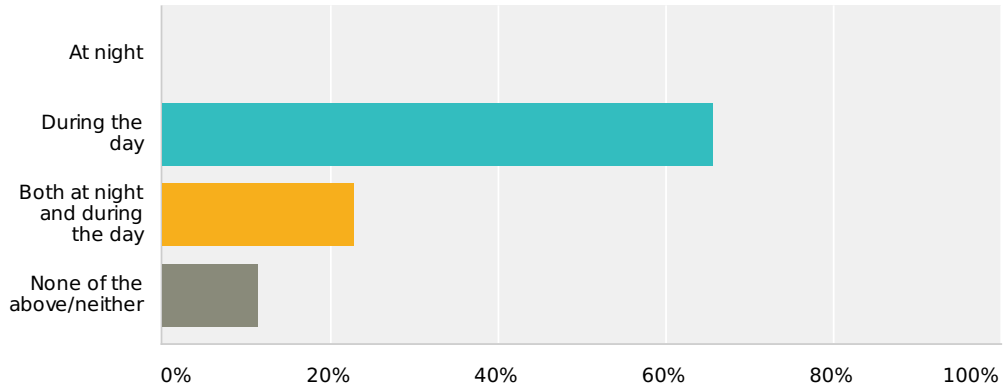

Q17 Do you feel safe walking around the community cores (Union, Cherry, and Jackson)?

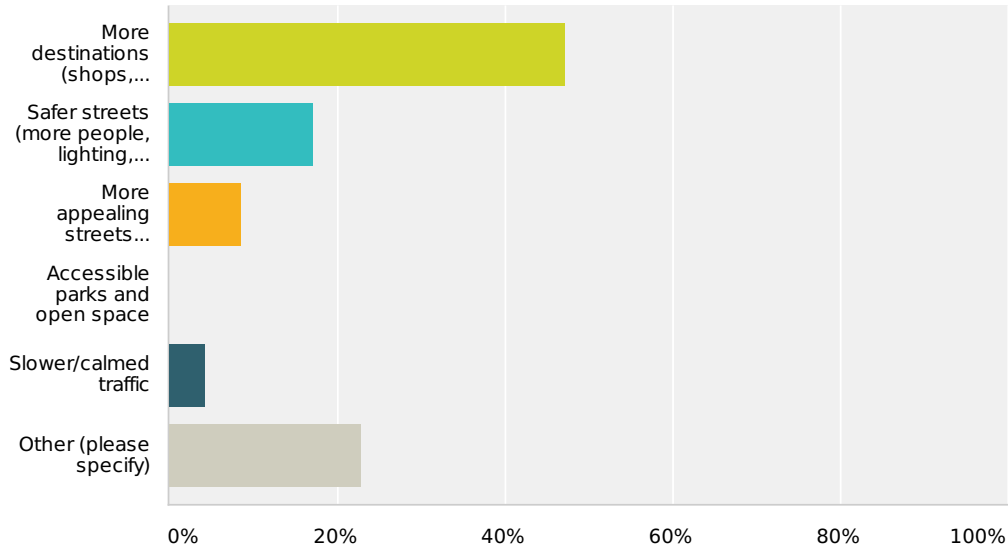

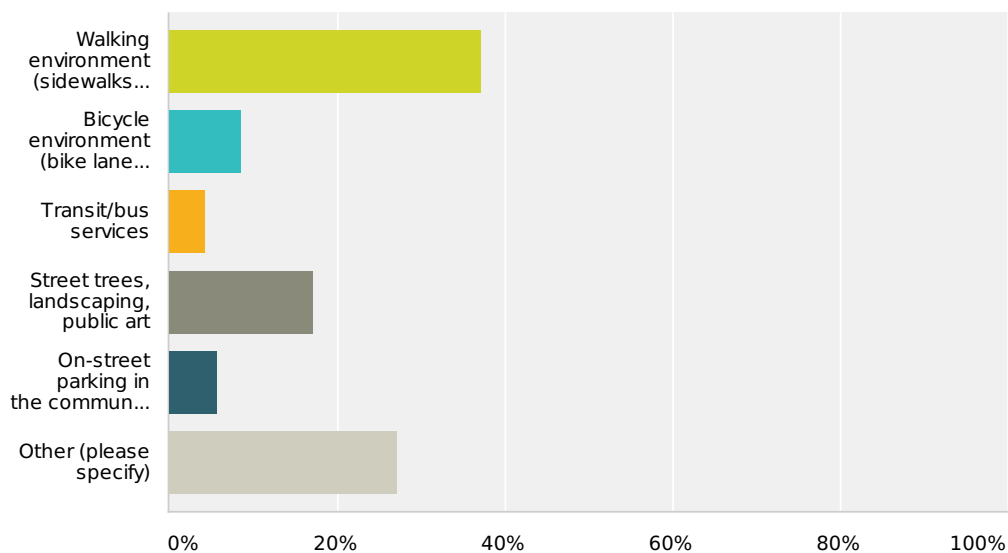

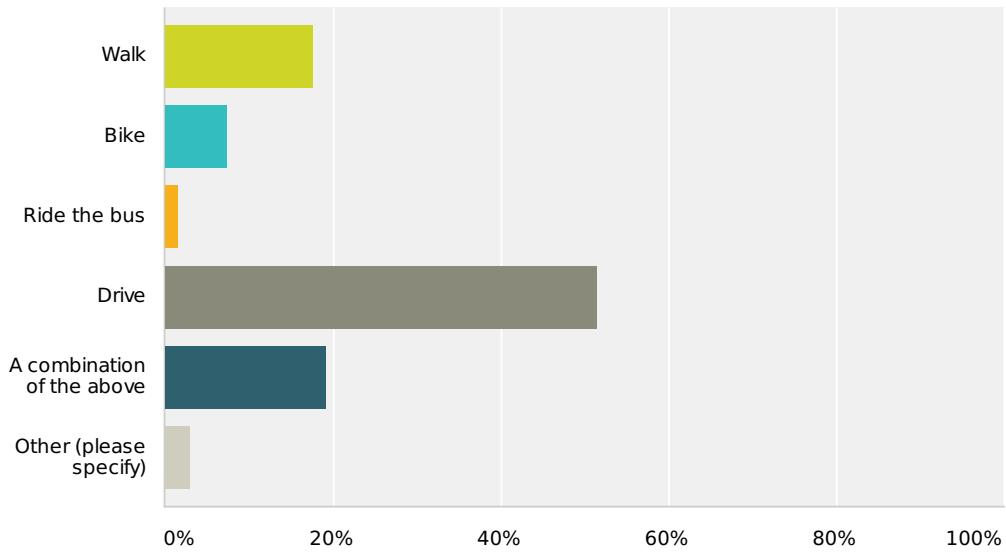

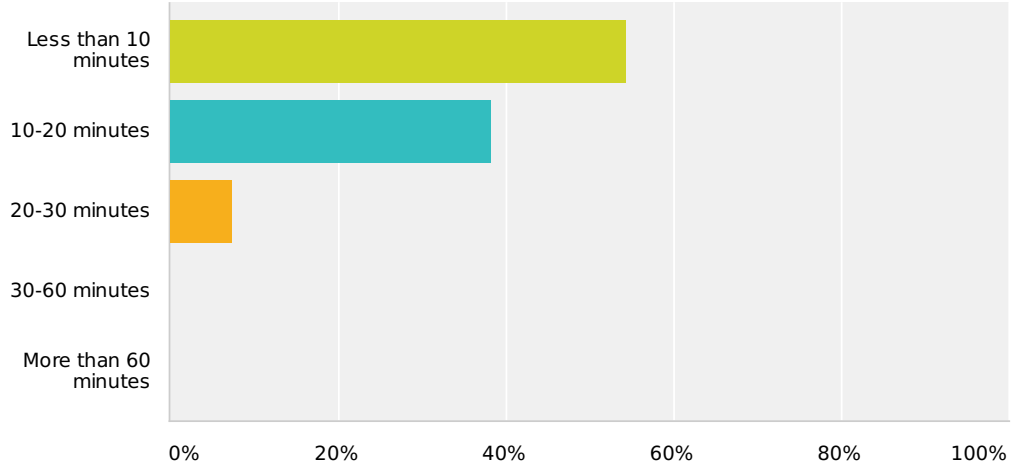

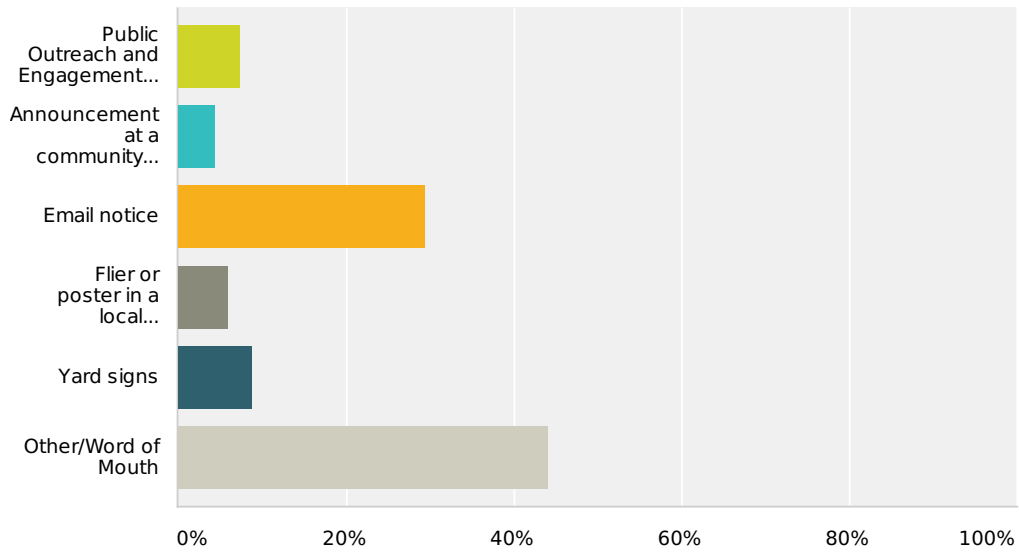

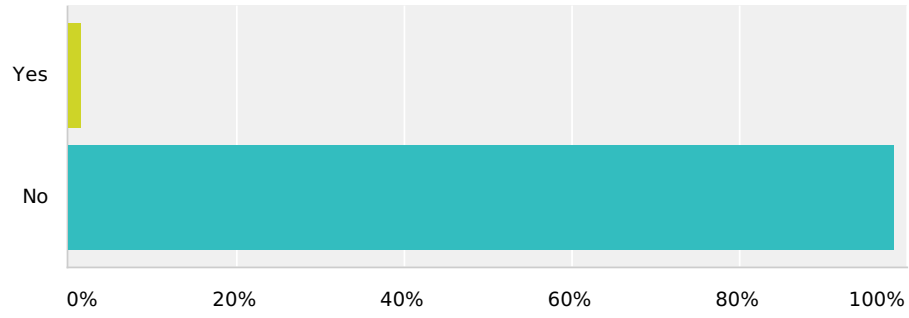

Q33 Are you of Hispanic origin?

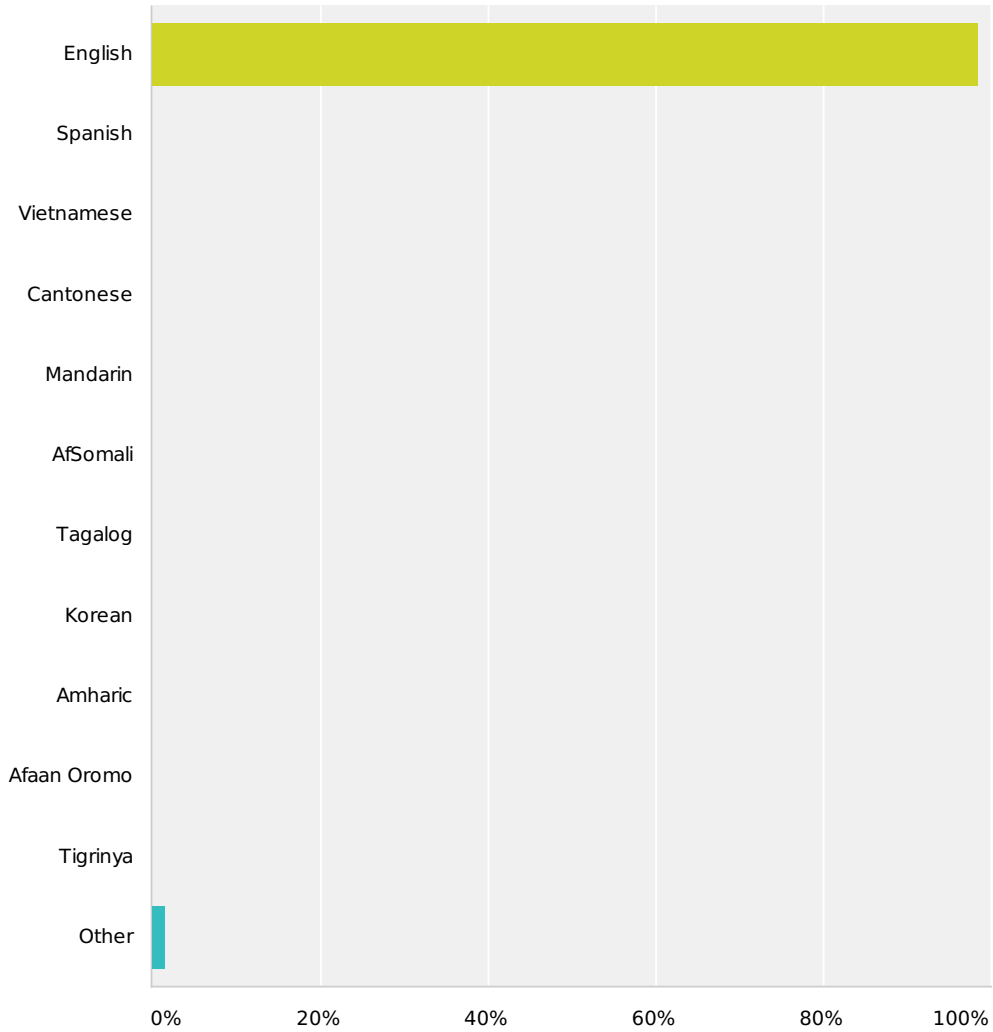

Q34 What is the primary language spoken in your home?

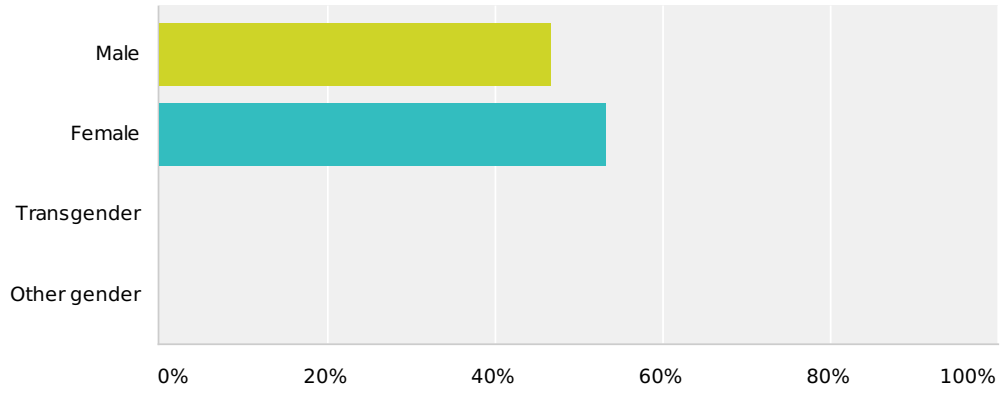

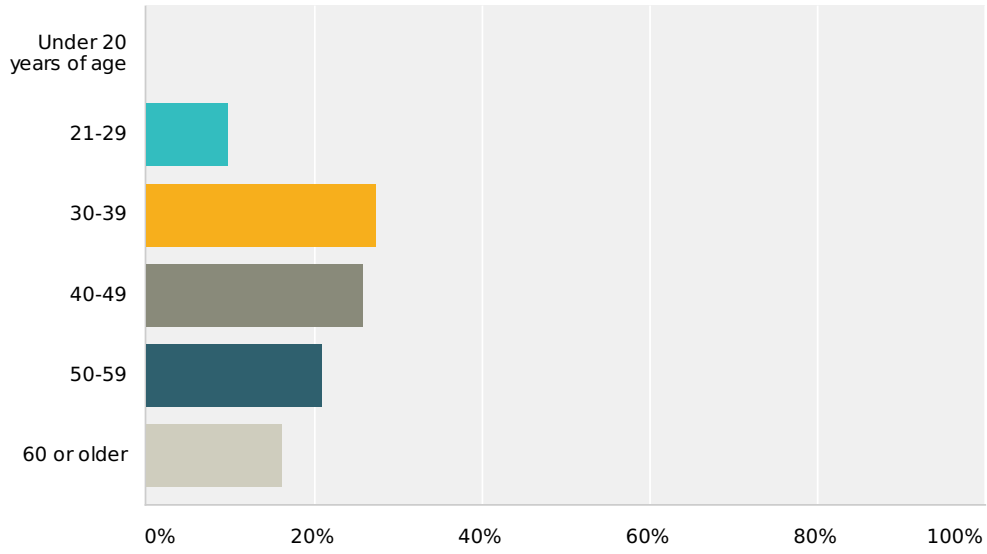

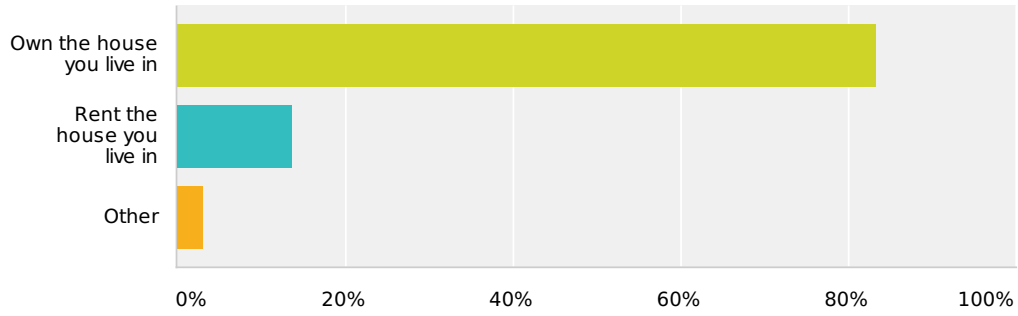

Q37 Where you live currently, do you:

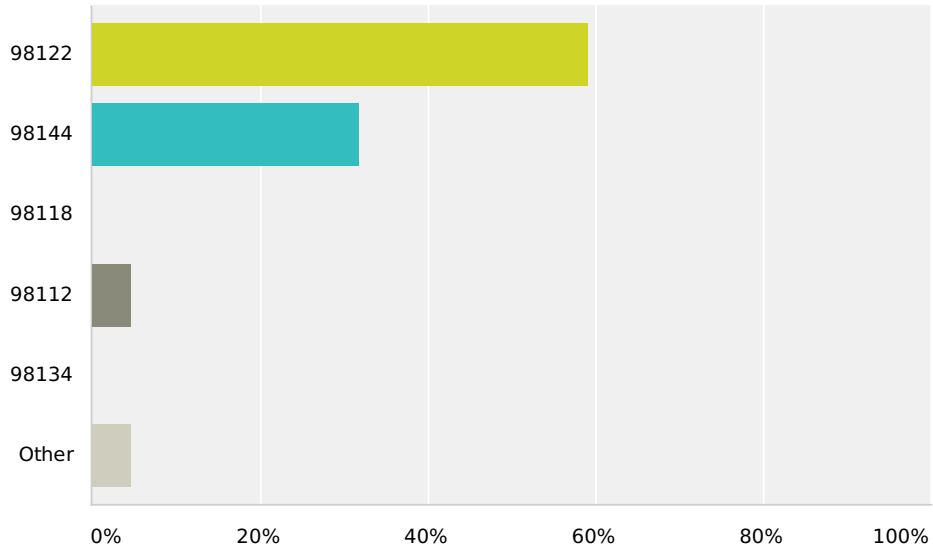
