

Denny Park Sportscourt Proposal PLANNING/PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT PROCESS

January 2015

<u>Purpose</u>

The scope of the proposed project is to add a sportscourt to Denny Park. The sportscourt would mitigate for the loss of the existing basketball court on private property across the street from Denny Park. The existing court will be demolished when the site is redeveloped. The current basketball court is 84' x 50'; standard for high school age youth. The size and location of the future sportscourt in Denny Park has not yet been determined, although two potential site locations are the current temporary Off-Leash Area site and along the eastern edge of the park.

The outreach will be structured around two public meetings. The meetings should be at least six weeks apart. The primary areas of concern will likely be how the proposal would impact the park's trees and the overall design of Seattle's first park. Seattle Parks and Recreation would like to partner with Vulcan on the public involvement needed for this proposal and will assign a park planner to work with you.

1. Preparation for First Public meeting

- o <u>Before the first public meeting (four- six weeks)</u>
 - Hire landscape architect to prepare site analysis and potential options -likely a firm with experience with basketball courts and strong design skills. Work closely with Parks to develop options – including court size, locations and ADA access.
 - Meet personally with key stakeholders to discuss the project, field questions and strengthen good relationships. Learn about other potential issues, possible other important contacts. The list of potential issues and individuals includes:
 - Discussion of potential tree removal (For the play area project, we removed one diseased tree, one young tree and one healthy tree. We had considerable community conversation about this).
 - Mimi Sheridan worked on the play area project and is familiar with the park and the concept of adding activities.
 - o Jennifer Ott Friends of Seattle's Olmsted Parks
 - Potential and current basketball users
 - Leslie Parrot lives in the 2200 Westlake building and has two teenage boys (she was involved earlier and checks in periodically).
 - Talk with people playing in the current spot about where they live and why they come to this court.
 - This court is listed in a variety of "best places to play" websites. At these sites, people hook up to play drop-in games. This is a good way to contact players.
