



28 events, average of 165 attendees/event, with events that brought 600+ attendees




HOT SPOT program partnerships grow




Single Bench Design Process

Cut letters into bench





Iteration 2

Resolved Single Bench Design






Specifications: Max Qty. 30 Formed 1/8" steel panel, wrapping bench corner. Perforated or etched text. Return along front edge, 1/4" radius. Countersunk fasteners.
