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Coordination with Seattle Public Utilities (SPU)





WAC Planning Requirements

- Requirements spelled out in WAC 246 290 100.
- Greater than 1,000 connections have requirement to do planning document every 6 years.
- WAC 246 290 100(3) provides DOH and utility flexibility as to scope and content of WSP.





Appropriate Level of Planning (ALOP)

- ALOP is a function of point-in-time assessment of a system's capacity determination.
- Assess technical, managerial and financial requirements.
- Incremental planning approach; allows focus of limited resources/energy to meet utility's most important issues.
- How DOH has always conducted business in NWRO.
- Starts with Pre-Plan meeting.

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Pre-Plan Meeting

Determination of WSP scope based on complexity of utility and identified needs in planning period.

- Discuss regulatory changes from DOH perspective.
- Start with Pre-Plan Agenda and WSP Content Checklist.





Focus of Review for SPU Wholesaler WSPs

- Municipal Water Law (MWL) and Local Government Consistency
- Demand Forecast
- Water Use Efficiency
- Supply Capacity
- Water Quality Sampling Plans
- Capital Improvement Program (CIP)





DOH Focus – MWL/Local Government Consistency

- Municipal Water Law (MWL) biggest recent change in regulatory structure that dictates what is in WSP.
- Purveyor must obtain local government consistency from local land use authority (i.e., cities and King County).
- Recommend purveyor invite County representative to pre-plan meeting (or separate meeting).
- Purveyor must receive regulatory approval from land use Authority and DOH.

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DOH Focus – Demand Forecast

- Three major components: current use, DSL and forecasted demands.
- Include historical data and clearly describe approach for forecasts.
- Look at 6 and 20 year forecast; consider other planning horizons.
- Show forecast with and without water use efficiency savings assumptions.

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DOH Focus – WUE Goal and Program

- Water Use Efficiency (WUE) is another MWL requirement.
- All part of SPU Regional Conservation Program. This is your minimum requirement. Describe what this means to you.
- Include information on additional program elements your utility has added on top of the regional program.
- SPU Regional Conservation Program requires your understanding and coordination with SPU.
 WI CAP required if DSL > 10%
- WLCAP required if DSL > 10%.

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DOH Focus – Supply Capacity

- Answer question is water supply available to meet forecasted demand?
- Clearly describe volumes allowed/available per SPU Contract.
- If you show a deficiency, provide solution in CIP.
- Red flag if deficiency identified and no solution provided.

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DOH Focus – WQ Sampling Plans

- Indicate if you are part of SPU regional monitoring plans.
- Identify the parameter you are sampling for and who responsible for collection (either utility or SPU staff).
- Focus on the following parameters:
 - Coliform
 - DBPs
 - Lead and Copper

Describe how results/information is shared and how notification is coordinated if necessary.

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DOH Focus - CIP

- Identify 6-yr and 20-yr Capital Improvement Program (CIP).
- Look to see if deficiencies identified in system analysis section are carried through to CIP.
- Supply if you need additional volume or connection to regional system, coordinate with SPU before submittal.
- Storage Conduct analysis; storage not typically allowed from regional system.

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DOH Review and Approval Process

- **3 hard copies preferred.**
- 90 day review period.
- Must include signed consistency checklists.
- Include review and comments by adjacent purveyors; better to do this early before submittal to DOH.
- King County adoption ordinance required.
- DOH sends approval letter after comments are adequately addressed and County ordinance is received (which may take months).

- Focus on our role/responsibility as wholesaler:
 - WUE Goal and Regional Water Conservation
 - Major Differences in Demand Forecast
 - Water Quality Sampling and Testing
 - Miscellaneous Contract & Water System Items
 - Contract Terms and Conditions
 - Transmission System and Storage
 - SPU Water Rights and Water Supply
 - Water Shortage Contingency Plan
 - Currency of Regional Water System Information



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Scope of SPU Review of WSPs

Seattle as water planning agency
 SPU as adjacent purveyor
 SPU as partner with wholesale customers



Scope of SPU Review of WSPs

COMMON COMMENTS

- Inconsistencies with WUE Goal
- Questionable assumptions for conservation savings in demand forecasts
- Outdated conservation measures
 Use of SPU storage as standby
 Outdated WSCP and WQ Monitoring Plans
