Community & Small Business Recovery \$23M

- \$7.5M Small Business Direct Financing and Grants
- \$1M Business Technical Assistance
- \$3M Commercial Affordability Tenant Improvements
- \$2M Downtown Recovery
- \$1.3M Workforce Retraining & Apprenticeships, Youth Employment Internships
- \$3M grants for arts/culture nonprofits and community orgs (Office of Arts & Culture)
- \$5.5M Neighborhood Economic Recovery

Neighborhood Economic Recovery

INTENDED RESULTS

- Neighborhoods and communities rebound from the impacts of COVID-19 and thrive.
- Entrepreneurs and small businesses can recover from the impacts of COVID-19, stabilize and grow their businesses.



Grants

- At least \$1.2 million available
- Minimum awards of \$10,000, Maximum \$100,000
- Contracts could start as early as November or December 2021
- Awards must be under contract by May 1, 2022
- Must be spent, billed and completed by December 15, 2023



Eligible Projects

Make a <u>direct link</u> from the impacts of the pandemic that **your neighborhood experienced TO** how **your project** supports your neighborhood **to recover** from those impacts.

Public & Commercial Space Activation

Examples: outdoor seating, retail/vendor markets, public art displays, music events, community events and commercial space popups

Digital Equity/Access

Examples:

neighborhood digital marketplaces for local small businesses, point of sale systems and support, helping businesses set up websites, social media, etc.











Communications -Not Marketing

Examples: websites, social media platforms, and contact databases to circulate community news and resources, and share information about local businesses and events to spur economic and social activity within a neighborhood



Physical Improvements -Beautification Examples: lighting, murals, façade to improve the quality of a neighborhoods physical space for the benefit of businesses, residents, and visitors

Physical Improvements - Cleaning

Examples: sidewalk cleaning, graffiti paint out, garbage pickup, etc. to bring the quality of a neighborhood's physical space back for the benefit of businesses, residents, and visitors









Community Safety

Examples: PPE delivery, vaccine popups, commercial block watches, CPTED support, shoplift-prevention training

Outreach and Technical Assistance

Examples: business outreach to share resources, technical assistance with business grants and COVID requirements, translation of materials, in language business support





Review Criteria

- Equity: Projects serving high COVID impacted neighborhoods and/or projects focusing support for BIPOC businesses and communities.
- Neighborhood Economic Recovery: Projects helping businesses and communities recover economically from COVID impacts and stimulating economic activity.
- Community Supported: Projects directed by and directly benefiting the community.

- Displacement Risk Index

- Business impact data




Second-highest quintile




Second-lowest quintile

Best Practices

- ✓ Community-based solutions for Neighborhood Economic Recovery
- Coordinate with your neighborhood partners to minimize duplication
- Leverage resources and expertise for your neighborhood
- Be prepared for documentation and reporting requirements for this federal funding

Federal Funding Requirements

Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (CLFRF) established under the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)

Uniform Administrative Requirements

- Internal controls over financial transactions (ie. financial policies and procedures)
- Track time and expenditures for this grant <u>separately</u> (not double charging time on different grants)
- Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (orgs receiving 750K+ in federal funds will need to be audited)

Davis Bacon Act applies

Cost Principles: Expenses not allowed

- Advertising and marketing
- Alcohol
- Entertainment
- Equipment and Capital expenditures over \$5,000 per unit

- 2. Read the Application Instructions
- 3. Read the FAQs
- 4. Write the answers to the application in a separate document.
- 5. Register in the online grant portal

Application Questions

COVID Impacts:

- Financial hardships your community and/or your organization faced resulting from COVID-19 pandemic and closure.
- What problem/issue are you trying to solve with your project?

Project Summary:

- How will your proposal address the impacts from COVID and contribute to the City's equitable recovery results:
 - □ Neighborhoods and communities rebound from the impacts of COVID-19 and thrive.
 - □ Entrepreneurs and small businesses can recover from the impacts of COVID-19, stabilize and grow their businesses.
- Clearly outline how you will center racial equity in support of Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC) business owners and/or BIPOC communities and how you will help businesses and communities recover economically from COVID impacts and stimulate neighborhood economic activity.



Application Questions

- Project Neighborhood
- Project Location (more specific than neighborhood)
- Community Supported

Describe how you and/or your organization is representative of and/or has a demonstrated history of being connected to the community your proposal seeks to serve. You can list other community-based organizations that are working on the project with you, list individuals in your group and their community affiliations and list examples of your work within this community.

• **Project Budget + Budget Narrative**

• **Documents:** OPTIONAL: You can attach documents that support your application such as more details about your organization, your COVID impacts, project plans, design plans, examples of your previous experience in the community, or support letters from community partners.




Continuing an Application
