

Why the Elliott Bay Seawall Project?

- The Elliott Bay seawall was built between 1916 and 1934 and has deteriorated significantly since it was constructed.
- The seawall was not designed for earthquakes and could fail in a moderate to large earthquake.
- Failure of the seawall could also be caused by wind driven storm waves or the erosive tidal forces of Elliott Bay.
- The seawall supports major utilities, Alaskan Way and SR 99, the ferry terminal, and rail lines.



What is scoping?

“Scoping” is the first official, public step in an environmental process under National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and the Washington State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA) regulations.

Agencies, affected tribes, and members of the public are invited to comment on the breadth of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS).

You may comment on alternatives, mitigation measures, probable significant adverse impacts, and any other issues or concerns related to the seawall.

Comments received during scoping will help define elements of the project.
