temperature in the distribution system in April was 9.0 degrees Celsius, with a range of 5.3 to 12.8 °C. This is below normal for this time of year.

Taste and Odor

The taste and odor panel is meeting bi-weekly. Samples are rated on a scale from 1 to 9, with 1 representing the best and 9 representing the worst. The taste and odor flavor rating assessment (FRA) for the latest Cedar supply (Lake Youngs treated) sample was 2.0 with a slight chlorine taste. The Tolt supply result was 1.5.



Lake Youngs Status


The Lake Youngs algal biovolume is increasing, with the dominant species being Tabellaria. Cyclotella is also increasing, but still has low numbers (around 5 percent of total). The total coliform counts were below normal in Lake Youngs in April. The average Lake Youngs raw water total coliform count for April was 7 cfu/100mL, with a range of 0 to 39 cfu/100mL. The historical average for April is 362 cfu/100mL

Chlorine Residual and Coliform Data

There were no positive coliform samples from the purveyor service areas during April 2011. All systems remain in compliance. Average chlorine residual concentrations in the purveyor distribution systems ranged from 0.74 to 1.13 mg/L, with an overall average of 0.86 mg/L. The chlorine residual targets for the Tolt and Cedar Treatment Facilities are both 1.5 mg/L. The number of samples with chlorine less than 0.2 mg/L was 22 in April (out of 817 samples). Ten of the low chlorine samples were from purveyor areas (1.7 percent). The average water

RESIDENTIAL INDOOR Single Family and Multi-Family Toilet Rebates Increasing

We received 87 Single Family Toilet rebates for April 2011, compared to 55 for the month of March, with approximately 25-30 rebates received per week. A small article about the rebate program, in English, Spanish and Chinese, is being included in the May/June issue of Seattle Public Utilities' (SPU) bill insert. This article is also available to Saving Water Partnership (SWP) members to promote the program.

Ninety-nine toilets were replaced through the Multi-Family Toilet Rebate Program in April 2011 compared to 101 rebated during the same period last year when we also offered a "free toilet" as one of the program options. More applications appear to be coming in since April which is a good sign that the rebate-only option still appeals to property managers and owners.

WashWise Program

Winds Down

The Saving Water Partnership is no longer participating in the WashWise rebate program, although energy providers continue to pay the full rebates through the end of the year:

- All Seattle City Light customers will receive the normal rebate.
- Puget Sound Energy electricity customers with electrically-heated hot water will receive the normal rebate.
- Puget Sound Energy electricity customers with gas-heated hot water will not be eligible for WashWise rebates.

Customers who purchased machines up through March 31, 2011, will receive a rebate if they submit their application prior to July 1, 2011. The program wraps up all financial aspects on June 30, 2011 at which time an article will be made available about the success of this program. Leak Program Continues – Direct Mail Pilot Generates Interest

The SWP conducted a pilot direct mailing to residents of Water District 125 and south Seattle to test a ‘find and fix leaks’ message. The mail piece – titled “Money-Saving Leak Detection Kit” - included dye strips, a photo of a toilet tank with the working parts labeled, instructions for how to

find and repair toilet leaks, and directions to the web site, www.savingwater.org, where customers can view the “how to fix a leak” videos. The mailing was sent in March, directly after national Fix-A-Leak Week. SWP staff will conduct a survey of the customers that participated in the direct mail portion of the program. The information we gather from the survey will help us determine if direct mail is the direction we should pursue for more customer outreach and education. Staff has seen an increase in phone calls related to leaks since the brochures were mailed.
