The Elections Code requires the Commission, every other December, to publish a summary of all contributions received and expenditures made in connection with the November City elections. This report satisfies that Elections Code requirement.

This report, which can also be found on our web site at www.seattle.gov/elections, was compiled from the campaign finance disclosure reports that candidates and ballot issue committees were required to file. The data presented here is taken from all reports filed from May 1, 2002 through December 12, 2005 for the offices and issues that were on the ballot in the primary and general elections held in 2005. (Since the 2005 campaigns are not required to file final reports until May 10, 2006, we will issue a 2005 Final Election Report in June 2006.) The report also includes data for two ballot issue committees that elected not to place measures on the 2005 ballot, and one candidate who opted not to stand for election.

All campaign finance reports are available on the Internet as soon as they are filed with the Commission. If you'd like to know who is contributing to the candidates expected to be on the ballot in 2007, you can view reports and summary data at http://www.ci.seattle.wa.us/elections. You don't have to wait for the 2007 year-end report to get this information.

III. 2005 CITY OFFICE AND BALLOT ISSUE CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS

A. Total Contributions for Candidates and Committees on Ballot

Table 1 below lists the total amount of contributions received by each candidate committee from four categories: 1) contributions from the candidate; 2) miscellaneous receipts such as proceeds from t-shirt sales or transfers from a previous committee for the same office; 3) uncoded receipts that are small contributions of \$25 or less and are not itemized by campaigns; and 4) contributions from individuals and groups. This chart also reports the number of contributors, other than the candidate, to each campaign and the average contribution amount made by those contributors.

Because the City Attorney's race and the Ballot Issues did not have statistically significant amounts or numbers of contributors, we have generally not included them in the narrative portion of the report. Where appropriate, their charts are included.



C. Size Of Contributions

The following charts show the size of in-kind and monetary contributions campaigns received. These charts include candidate contributions to their own campaigns, transfers from a previous campaign, anonymous contributions, loans, and miscellaneous receipts such as receipts from campaigns low-cost fundraisers and bank interest. All of these categories are broken out separately on the charts. Loans from candidates to their own committees are categorized as candidate contributions, until repaid.

The contribution limit for candidate campaigns is \$650 per contributor, per election cycle, to each candidate. In the Mayoral races, 43% of contributions were between \$600 and \$650. Approximately 10% of contributions to Mayoral candidates were less than \$100. For City Council candidates, the largest percentage of contributions, 37%, were between \$100 and \$399. Only 31% of contributions were in excess of \$600. One tenth of the contributions to City Council races were in amounts less than \$100. In 2001, 18% of contributions to City Council races were in amounts less than \$100. See **Figures 20 and 22.**

In 2001, 12 Mayoral candidates raised \$1.7 million, while 15 candidates for four City Council seats raised \$622,362. In 2005, seven Mayoral candidates raised a total of \$557,910, while 12 City Council candidates tripled the amount raised in the 2001 election to \$1.8 million.









Candidates for City Council Position 4











Richard McIver (I) Size of Contributions - by Amount of Contributions





D. Size of Contributions by Number of Contributors

The following charts show the number of contributors in each dollar range. See Figures 40 through 44.

Ten percent of all the contributions to Mayoral, City Attorney and City Council races were in amounts of \$600 or more. This has not changed significantly since the contribution limit increased to \$650 in 2002. In 2001, 11% of contributors gave at the \$600 level, and in 2003 the number fell to 8%. However the total number of contributors has dropped from 15,000 in 2001 to just 12,693 in 2005.

Fourteen percent of the 2,623 contributors to Mayoral races, or 367 people, contributed at the maximum level. Of the approximately 10,000 contributors to City Council races, 904 people made contributions of \$600 or more.



E. Geographic Distribution Of Contributors

The following charts show the areas that contributors reported as either their home or business address. The areas inside the City limits include Capitol Hill/Madrona, Queen Anne/Magnolia, Downtown/Belltown, Greenlake/University District, West Seattle, Ballard/NW Seattle and Mt. Baker/Rainier Valley. The report also includes contributions from outside of the City and "Area Unknown." Receipts from the following sources are shown in designated categories: candidate contributions or loans to his or her own campaign, loans to ballot issues, miscellaneous receipts such as bank interest or receipts from a low cost fundraiser, transfers from a previous campaign, and anonymous contributions.

Two thirds of contributors to City races in 2005 came from addresses in four areas. Once again the largest source of contributors, 24%, was from outside Seattle. The other three areas in the top four were Downtown/Belltown (15%), Queen Anne/Magnolia (14%) and Capitol Hill/Madrona (13%). The remaining third (34%) of the contributors in 2005 were split evenly across the city. See **Figure 45**.



Area of Contributions




All City Attorney Campaigns - by Amount of Contributions



All Council Campaigns - by Amount of Contributions





Area of Contributions - by Amount of Contributions






Candidates for City Council Position 8







F. Type Of Contributors

The following charts show the type of contributors that gave to 2005 City campaigns. The graphs include categories for individual contributors, PACs (Continuing Political Committees), businesses, organizations not required to report as PACs, candidates, miscellaneous receipts, and uncoded contributors. The latter category, uncoded contributors, is typically made up of individuals who are contributors of \$100 or less, as well as all anonymous contributions.

Figure 66 shows that a total of 79% of contributions to City races came from individuals: 66% from coded individuals, 4% from the candidates to their own campaigns, and another 9% from uncoded individuals. The number of coded individual contributors in 2005 is an increase over the 51% reported in 2003. Changes to the Seattle Elections Code Administrative Rules that went into effect in 2001 may have contributed to this increase. In 2001, the Seattle Election Code Administrative Rules were changed to provide treasurers and campaigns with clarifying information on how to attribute contributions from non-individuals, e.g. sole-propietorships, partnerships, LLCs, etc.

Contributions coded "Business" rose from 5% in 2001 to 16% in 2003, and fell to 9% in 2005.

Figures 66 through 86 provide a breakdown of each campaign's contribution type.




All Mayoral Campaigns - by Amount of Contributions



All City Attorney Campaigns - by Amount of Contributions



All Ballot Issue Campaigns - by Amount of Contributions



Candidates for Mayor




Christal WoodType of Contributors - by Amount of Contributions

Greg Nickels (I)Type of Contributors - by Amount of Contributions







Type of Contributors - by Amount of Contributions



Type of Contributors - by Amount of Contributions









Jan Drago (I) Type of Contributors - by Amount of Contributions



Type of Contributors - by Amount of Contributions




Type of Contributors - by Amount of Contributions





Type of Contributors - by Amount of Contributions



Type of Contributors - by Amount of Contributions



All City Attorney Campaigns



All Council Campaigns



C. Types Of Expenditures

Each campaign is required to itemize and describe the campaign's expenditures of more than \$50. Commission staff then review the descriptions provided by the campaigns and code each expenditure into the following categories:

- Fundraising: Solicitation mailings, printing, postage, event costs and fundraising consulting
- Lit & Mail: Promotional literature, design, postage, printing, copying, lists, labels and consulting
- ◆ TV & Radio: Broadcast advertising production, time buys and consultants
- Staff/Consult: Staff wages, payroll taxes and general consulting fees
- ♦ Operations: Rent, office supplies, food, travel, phone, research, computer, office equipment
- Newspaper Ads: Ad design and buys
- Other Ads: Yard signs, internet, bus signs, t-shirts, bumper stickers, phone banks and automated phone calls
- Uncodable: Unitemized or insufficient information available to code appropriately
- Miscellaneous: Signature gathering, contributions to charities and other committees, transfers to new committee, fines & penalties

Voter contact continued to be the focus of campaign expenditures in 2005. Campaigns are relying less on written contact (i.e., literature, newspaper ads, etc.) than they have in past years, and more on electronic advertising (i.e., cable and broadcast television, radio, and automated phone calls). Candidates for City Council in 2001 spent virtually nothing on television and radio advertising, but in 2003, 6% of all City Council candidate expenditures went to television and radio. In 2005, 7% of all City Council candidate expenditures went to television and radio advertising. See **Figures 92 through 111**.

Candidates for mayor spent \$120,000 on television and radio, totaling 22% of the Mayoral candidates' total expenditures. In 2001, 36% of all Mayoral candidate expenditures went to electronic media. See **Figures 93, and 96 through 98.**





Figure 95 Figure 96

The amount spent on fundraising did not change significantly from 2001 to 2005, although Mayoral campaigns spent 25% on fundraising in 2005, up from 8% in 2001. See **Figures 93, and 96 through 98**. Council candidates spent approximately 6% on average on fundraising, although individual campaigns devoted anywhere from 3% to 39% to fundraising activities. See **Figures 95, and 100 through 111.**

Figures 92 through 111 show the differences in how 2005 City campaigns allocated their expenditures.




All Mayoral Campaigns



All City Attorney Campaigns



Candidates for City Attorney



Candidates for City Council Position 4













V. YEAR TO YEAR TRENDS

A. Total Contributions Received

Figure 112 shows the amount of money raised by mayoral campaigns over the last five regular election cycles. In 1989, no incumbent ran for Mayor. In 1993, incumbent Mayor Norm Rice ran for re-election and won. In 1997, the mayoral race did not include an incumbent. In 2001, incumbent Mayor Paul Schell ran and lost in the Primary, challenger Greg Nickels went on to win the General Election. Mayor Nickels ran for re-election in 2005.

Figure 113 compares the average amount of City Council contributions raised over the last five election cycles. In other words, in 2003, each Council Position (i.e. Position 1, 3, 5, 7, 9) generated on average \$390,000 in contributions. The amounts used in the graph are calculated by dividing the total contributions raised by all Council campaigns on the ballot by the number of positions appearing on the ballot that year.

Contributions for Council positions rose again in 2005. The average total contributions per position has gone from less than \$160,000 in 2001 to \$390,000 in 2003 and just over \$450,000 in 2005.





B. Average Contribution To Campaigns and Number of Contributors

The size of the average contribution to the Mayoral candidates did not increase significantly between 2001 and 2005. The average contribution size rose from \$185 in 2001 to just under \$200 in 2005. This is approximately a 9% increase in average contributions which correlates with the 9% increase in the contribution limit between the 2001 and 2005 election cycles.

The average contribution size for the 2005 Council campaigns was just under \$150, up from an average of \$120 in 2003. The number of contributors to 2005 Council campaigns fell to 10,000 from a high of almost 12,000 in 2003. In other words, average contributions were up by 25%, but the number of contributors was down 20%. The contribution limit was \$650 in both 2003 and 2005. See **Figures 116 and 117..**




City Attorney Campaigns





Council Campaigns





Council Campaigns




