Sewer Capping

Utilities

Before you begin the actual demolition, you must coordinate with all utilities currently providing service to the property in order to schedule the shut off termination of services.

The following is a list of utilities you may need to contact.

Asbestos

Federal, State, and local regulations require that you remove all asbestos in a building prior to starting demolition. Please contact the Puget Sound Clean Air Agency at <u>www.pscleanair.org/asbestos</u> or at (206) 689-4058 for more information.

Lead Abatement Program

In 2010, the Environmental Protection Agency's Renovation, Repair, and Painting Rule went into effect. The rule requires contractors performing renovation, repair, or painting work that disturbs lead-based paint in homes, child-care facilities, and schools built before 1978 to be certified. Contractors must follow specific work practices to prevent lead contamination. For more information about the federal lead requirements, please visit <u>www.epa.gov/lead/pubs/renovation.htm</u>.

Waste Diversion Report

If your project is greater than 750 square feet, then you should also submit a waste diversion report to Seattle Public Utilities (SPU) within 60 days of the final inspection approval from DPD. The waste diversion plan and report do not have to match. The report should identify the actual materials produced from the project, their quantity, who the hauler was, and where the materials were taken for reuse, recycling, and disposal. Call Before You Dig

Calling before you dig ensures that any publicly owned underground lines will be marked, so that you can dig around them safely.
