Victor Steinbrueck Park

Certificate of Approval Amendment Request

November 29, 2023

Seattle Parks and Recreation (SPR) is in the process of making improvements at the park consistent with a Certificate of Approval (CoA) issued by the Pike Place Market Historic Commission on September 9, 2019. The CoA included the following provision:

This application does not authorize any change to the totem poles in Victor Steinbrueck Park. If the totem poles must be removed for their safety or restoration, they shall be installed before Victor Steinbrueck Park is reopened.

Construction is progressing and it is anticipated that the park could be reopened to the public in April 2024. SPR is requesting an amendment to the CoA to allow the permanent removal of the poles. SPR is proposing to install in their places two pieces fabricated/carved by members of the local Indigenous community that are representative of the local Tribes and local Tribal culture. These new pieces will be installed on the existing plinths using the existing attachment infrastructure. SPR is also requesting that the park be allowed to be reopened to the public while the new pieces are being carved/fabricated.

While the existing poles were designed by Victor Steinbrueck, with input from Marvin Oliver, the actual carving work was done on Bainbridge Island by James Bender and others as shown on the attached photos from the City of Seattle Archives. Mr. Bender is "[a] non-Native carver who was a student of Bill Holm and Duane Pasco. Bender is well respected for his carving skills, particularly in the context of replicating historic Northwest Coast art. He has completed a variety of commissions for public and private institutions as well as collectors throughout Europe and North America....Two of his totem poles can be found in the Victor Steinbrueck Park at Pike's Place Market in Seattle." Rather than showcase work by a non-Native carver who replicates historic Native art, we as a City should be promoting and displaying authentic art and culture that represents the local Tribes and is created by local Tribal artists.

While the City works through a legacy of cultural appropriation of Tribal art and culture, the improvements at Victor Steinbrueck Park provide an opportunity to recognize and showcase the local indigenous culture that continues to thrive. The Central Waterfront redevelopment has a public art plan that includes art from the local Tribal communities. Once the Central Waterfront project is completed, there will be a physical as well as visual connection between the park and the waterfront that didn't previously exist. The park, and particularly the existing attachment points for the poles provide an appropriate pedestal on which to showcase Coast Salish art and culture that is representative of the local Tribes and reminds us of those that were here before the area was "discovered".

Both the Muckleshoot and Suquamish Tribes have expressed their interest in each providing a piece that is representative of Coast Salish Tribes and culture. These pieces, once carved or fabricated, would be installed in place of the existing poles and serve as a prominent reminder of the City's commitment to honoring and respecting Tribal sovereignty and the local Tribes for generations to come.






At its meeting of August 28, 2019, the Pike Place Market Historical Commission approved the following:

Renovations to include complete removal of park features to allow replacement of waterproofing membrane over parking garage. New improvements to park design include public safety, seating, circulation, lighting, and inclusion of Coast Salish map, text and patterns in features of the park, as per the attached application submittal materials.

The following requirements were adopted as conditions of the Commission's approval:

The current metal features that are painted green items are to remain green.

This application does not authorize any change to the totem poles in Victor Steinbrueck Park. If the totem poles must be removed for their safety or restoration, they shall be reinstalled before Victor Steinbrueck Park is reopened.

The pavilion at the south end shall be installed before Victor Steinbrueck Park is reopens. The Coast Salish map, the storage closet and the bike racks on Western Avenue are approved subject to sufficient budget.

(This action is categorically exempt from SEPA by the provisions of WAC 197-11-800.)

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Work must occur exactly according to approved plans and specifications. Any changes other than those specified above will require the review and approval of the Commission prior to implementation. Any work done in non-compliance with this permit will be reported directly to the Compliance Division of the Seattle Department of Construction and Inspection. The Certificate is issued with the understanding that the applicant will obtain all other permits and approvals that may be required.

Work associated with this Certificate of Approval must commence within eighteen months from the date of the issuance of this Certificate unless the Pike Place Market Historical Commission determines that extenuating circumstances justify extension of the expiration date.
