Weekly Overview

Week five of the 105-day 2019 session began with a snow day and in as long as veterans of the legislative process can recall, the Washington State Capitol Campus closed as a result of the weather on Monday. With legislators, staff, and lobbyists stranded at home amid snow and power outages, all committees were canceled Monday and legislative staff were instructed to stay home. This loss of a day forced many committees to have to reschedule bills into very packed schedules later in the week and could ultimately cause bills to die in committee simply due to lack of time.

We are now closing in on the first major cutoff date of February 22nd. This is the date by which a bill must pass out of its house of origin policy committee in order to remain alive. There are exceptions, such as fiscal bill and matters necessary to implement the budget (NTIB). It is also worth noting that while not common, any bill can come back to life under certain circumstances.

SHB 1257 (SSB 5293)

Increases energy efficiency and the use of renewable fuels that reduce the amount of greenhouse gas emissions in the state and provides a public utility tax credit against the taxes owing by utilities for the incentives provided for the implementation by eligible building owners of energy efficiency and renewable energy measures. Permits a city, town, or county to adopt additional residential energy code requirements as developed by the state building code council. Requires the state building code council to adopt certain optional efficiency appendices and include them in the state energy code for residential buildings.

Transportation electrification

Provides clear legislative authority for all utilities, public and private, to be able to offer incentive programs and services in electrification of transportation for its customers and rate payers. This bill will finally provide the clear authority language municipal and publicly-owned utilities have needed Page 4 of 17 to be able to offer incentive programs in the electrification of transportation for its customers, including advertising programs to promote the utility's service, incentives or rebates.

SHB 1512

This bill is Seattle City Light's top priority and passed out of the House Environment & Energy Committee on February 14th on a party line vote. The bill now goes to the Appropriations Committee as the UTC has indicated that there will be a \$95,000 cost associated with rulemaking.

SSB 5223 (HB 1862)

Modifies certain net metering of electricity provisions. Increases the minimum threshold for the cumulative generating capacity that a utility must make available for net metering systems. Requires unused kilowatt-hour credits to be used to assist qualified low-income residential customers of the electric utility in paying their electric bills. Requires the amount of kilowatt-hours of electricity consumed for the most recent twelve-month period to appear on customer billing statements. Requires the state building code council, in consultation with the department of commerce and local governments, to conduct a study of the state building code and adopt changes necessary to encourage greater use of renewable energy systems. Requires the department of commerce to convene a work group to identify issues and laws associated with the future of net metering. Provides a June 30, 2021, expiration date for the work group.

Opioid use disorder

SHB 1331 (SSB 5380) Declares that opioid use disorder is a public health crisis. Requires state agencies to: (1) Increase access to evidence-based opioid use disorder treatment services; (2) Promote coordination of services within the substance use disorder treatment and recovery support system; (3) Strengthen partnerships between opioid use disorder treatment providers and their allied community partners; (4) Expand the use of the state prescription drug monitoring program; and (5) Support comprehensive school and community-based substance use prevention services.

The Governor-requested opioid bills (HB 1331/SB 5380) focus on treatment and recovery, pregnant and parenting women, opioid overdose reversal medication, and people with opioid use disorder involved in the criminal justice system. OPR staff have prepared a table comparing the proposed legislation from 2018 that did not ultimately pass compared to HB 1331. A substitute of the House version was passed out of the Health Care & Wellness committee on February 8th. The substitute bill was jointly proposed by Reps Cody and Schmick. A summary of the substitute bill compared to the original can be found on the first page here. The Senate also passed a substitute version out of Health & Long Term Care on February 8th. The substitute bill was proposed by Sen Cleveland and closely mirrors the substitute bill passed in House Health.

Foundational public health servs

SHB 1497 (SB 5732) Addresses the governmental public health system which is comprised of the department of health, state board of health, local health jurisdictions, sovereign tribal nations, and Indian health programs. Requires funding for the governmental public health system to be restructured to support foundational public health services, and in restructuring, there must be efforts to reinforce current governmental public health system capacity and implement service delivery models allowing for system stabilization and transformation.

SHB 1523 (SB 5526) Requires the Washington Health Benefit Exchange to develop standardized health plans. The standardized plans must be designed to reduce deductibles, make more services available before the deductible, provide predictable cost sharing, maximize subsidies, limit adverse premium impacts, reduce barriers to maintaining and improving health, and encourage choice based on value, while limiting increases in health plan premium rates.

HB 1553 (SB 5517) Provides for a safety net fee for certain ambulance transports to be used to augment funding from other sources, thereby supporting additional payments to ambulance transport providers for Medicaid services. Requires the state health care authority to establish the manner and format for ambulance transport providers to report required data. Imposes a quality assurance fee for each ambulance transport provided by each ambulance transport provider subject to the fee. Provides for termination and repeal, under the sunset act, of the authorization for ambulance transport quality assurance fees. Creates the ambulance transport fund.

Declares that proof of disease immunity through documentation of laboratory evidence of antibody titer or a health care provider's attestation of a child's history of a disease sufficient to provide

immunity against that disease constitutes proof of immunization for that specific disease. Prohibits a philosophical or personal objection from being used to exempt a child from the measles, mumps, and rubella vaccine.

Personal belief exemptions allow parents to opt out of vaccinating their children against one or more of the vaccines required for school and child care entry for personal/philosophical reasons. The bill had a hearing in House Health Care & Wellness on February 8th and is scheduled for executive session on February 15th. DOH, Rep Harris (the sponsor of the legislation), and other stakeholders held a <u>press conference</u> after the hearing to discuss the legislation, the current measles outbreak, and other issues relating to vaccines.
