Thursday Keynote: Van Jones

President and co-founder of Rebuild the Dream,
Jones is a Yale-educated attorney who has written
two New York Times best sellers: *The Green Collar Economy*, the
definitive book on green jobs, and *Rebuild the Dream*, a
roadmap for progressives in 2012 and beyond. In 2009, Jones
worked as the green jobs advisor to the Obama White House
where he helped run the inter-agency process that oversaw \$80
billion in green energy recovery spending.

Friday Keynote: Connie Rice

American civil rights activist and attorney, Rice is the co-founder of the Advancement Project. She is a national leader in urban police department reform and well-known for her work with the Los Angeles Police Department. Her acclaimed memoir, *Power Concedes Nothing*, covers her civil rights work in education, transportation, incarceration and public safety.

"Communicating about Race." powell's recent book Racing to
