WHERE: Blessed Sacrament Church, 5050 8th Ave NE, Seattle, WA 98105, Parish Hall


WHEN: Wednesday, November 4, 2015, 6:30 – 8 PM

Per Seattle Municipal Code 11.16.317, when more than two contiguous blocks are being proposed to expand or reduce an RPZ, the Seattle Department of Transportation (SDOT) shall hold a public hearing where it will provide interested persons an opportunity to submit written and spoken comment into the public record.





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Restricted Parking Zone (RPZ) Public Hearing Notice

Roosevelt neighborhood residents have requested the City make more blocks eligible for RPZ 10. The map on the other side of this postcard highlights in blue the blocks being considered. SDOT is holding a public hearing on **November 4** to take your comments. The Seattle Municipal Code requires a public hearing if more than two blocks are added to any RPZ at one time. Residents on these blocks would be eligible for Zone 10 permits which are currently \$39 per vehicle per year. We would install Zone 10 signs on the solid blue lined blocks, limiting vehicles without Zone 10 permits to 2 hour parking Monday – Saturday, 7 AM – 6 PM. Residents on the blocks with blue dashed lines would be eligible for permits, but those blocks would not have signs. Zone 10 signs will not be installed adjacent to commercial properties.

What is an RPZ?

An RPZ eases parking congestion in residential neighborhoods, while also balancing the needs of all people to use the public right of way. RPZs help neighborhoods deal with parking congestion from traffic generators through signed time limits from which vehicles displaying a valid RPZ permit are exempt.

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
