We hope today you will:


- Learn about the project need and potential opportunities—by zone.

Public input received at this walking tour will help the project team define opportunities for six zones on the waterfront.

What will the Elliott Bay Seawall Project do?

The Elliott Bay Seawall Project has identified the following goals to guide project planning and design:

- Address critical public safety needs at the shoreline.
- Respect cultural, archeological, and historic resources.
- Provide enhanced habitat.
- Provide enhanced recreational opportunities.
- Minimize construction impacts.
- Consider long-term context for design of the Central Waterfront.
- Support fiscal responsibility.



For planning purposes, opportunities along the Elliott Bay Seawall Project will be considered in six different areas. This allows the project team to evaluate existing conditions and to consider opportunities and issues in the future design.

Zone #4 Park / Aquarium

Location: South edge of Waterfront Park to Pier 63 (Union St. to midway between Stewart St. and Virginia St.)

Zone #4 Characteristics:


- This zone is publicly owned and has been identified in previous waterfront planning efforts as having the potential to become a central focus of Seattle's grand public waterfront space (to be determined during subsequent Central Waterfront Project planning phase).
- Piers 62 and 63 are no longer used to host events due to deterioration of their structures and are slated for demolition.

Zone #4 Example Opportunities:

- It may be possible to create recreational opportunities, such as hand-carry boat launching and potentially SCUBA diving in beach touchpoints.
- A tribal canoe/kayak landing area for tribal ceremonies could be developed.
- The seawall could provide habitat/touchpoints in the vicinity of the Aquarium, creating an educational link between seawall system habitat elements and the conservation mission and educational mission of the Aquarium.

Zone #4 Potential Issues:

- Collaboration with the Aquarium and other stakeholder groups is necessary to coordinate with new development, which will likely occur after the seawall replacement is complete.
- Beach touchpoints need to be designed to prevent public access underneath pier structures.
