Subject: Permit for Cell Tower next to Elementary School

Hello,

On Friday, Seattle City Light issued a permit to T-Mobile to build a new 70-foot tall utility pole with three communications towers on top. The project is directly across the street (within 100 feet) of an elementary school.

We have significant concerns about this project. Namely, notice as required by the Seattle Municipal Code was not provided. All residents/businesses within 300 feet of the proposed project are suppose to receive formal written notice. We can't find one that did. The Department of Construction and Inspections claims that they were sent (they provided a list of addresses) and that everyone threw them away without looking at them. But again, we can't find one person that received a notice.

Please see our Change.org petition (with over 375 signatures). No one in the community had the opportunity to comment about the project, because they did not know about it until it was too late.
