It is with great pleasure that I submit my letter of interest and resume for the vacated District 4 (Northeast Seattle) Council position. As a long-time Seattle resident, currently living in Wallingford, and an urban planner with more than 20 years of experience, I am confident that my skills and experiences meet the criteria and requirements to be the caretaker for District 4.

I have a master's degree in community planning and design and have managed transportation and environmental projects in Seattle, the Puget Sound region, and across the U.S. Since 2013, it has been an honor and a privilege to serve on the Seattle Planning Commission. As stewards of the Comprehensive Plan, the Planning Commission advises and makes recommendations to the Mayor, City Council, and City departments on projects, policies, and legislation that affect how Seattle will grow. In this role, I have been immersed in land use and zoning, transportation, and housing policies, regulations, and planning projects throughout Seattle. I have participated in numerous community workshops, public forums, and events. The Commission also reviews and makes recommendations on the proposed amendments to the Comprehensive Plan through the annual amendment cycle. Additionally, the Planning Commission championed the inclusion of social equity strategies throughout the major Comprehensive Plan update (Seattle 2035) and has consistently championed family-sized housing and neighborhoods for all. Currently, the Commission is providing input on the Equitable Development Monitoring Program (Council Resolution 31522), specifically the heightened displacement risk indicators, and the Sound Transit West Seattle and Ballard Link Extensions Project (Chinatown/International District and Delridge stations).

As a board member and long-time leader of the American Planning Association (APA), a 40,000-member organization, I have participated in the development of our strategic plan and budget, policy guides, legislative and policy actions, and equity policies and practices. APA provides planning strategies, resources, and education for planners and communities facing challenges at the local, regional, and nation level. These challenges are quite like those facing Seattle as a result of exponential growth: an affordable housing crisis, aging infrastructure, traffic congestion, access to all the components of livability, and social equity and inclusion. As an APA leader, I also have led a membership group of 21 divisions (interest groups based upon population/demographics and/or practice areas – approximately 11,000 members); developed a handbook for Division Council leaders; fostered collaboration amongst

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components of the organization; supported original research on aging and livable communities, and immigration and migration; implemented a Divisions Council grant program for original research; mentored future urban planners; advised the Board of Directors; and am a founding member of the LGBTQ and Planning Division.

I understand some of the remaining work for the District 4 caretaker includes, yet is not limited to: MHA implementation; University District Urban Center rezoning; electric vehicle legislation; design guidelines; homelessness; Trees for All; and continued community outreach. As a planner with experience in land use, zoning, and transportation and versed in a collaborative approach to decision making and consensus building, I am willing and able to help carry out this work, represent District 4 interests, and serve the city of Seattle through the certification of the November election. It would be an honor and a privilege to further serve my city in this capacity.
