# MOTION PICTURE ACADEMY ENFORCES NEW STANDARDS OF CONDUCT TO ADDRESS SEXUAL HARASSMENT IN THE FILM AND ENTERTAINMENT INDUSTRY

The aftershock from a series of sexual harassment scandals has led the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences to implement new standards of conduct that all 8,500 members will be expected to uphold. The new standards enforce the "respect of human dignity, inclusion, and a supportive environment that fosters creativity." The new



expectations were created by an Academy task force and will be enforced by its board of governors.

# TOM SKERRITT'S HEYOU MEDIA HAS RAISED MORE CASH AND ADDED ENTERTAINMENT VETERANS TO ITS TEAM

Heyou Media, a local media startup, announced that Rudy Gadre, a former executive at Facebook and Amazon, is now an investor and member of the advisory board. Heyou also announced that Warren Etheredge, an entertainment industry veteran and screenwriting professor at the University of Washington, has joined the company as its vice president of curation and acquisitions.

# AS ARTS FUNDING CONTINUES TO BE IN QUESTION, LOCAL STUDENT SAYS NEA SONGWRITNG AWARD MADE A DIFFERENCE

Local student Angel Rodriquez recently won a

National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) \$25,000 college scholarship after taking first place in their new songwriting challenge, but these types of benefits are at risk in the continual battle for arts funding. Funding for similar arts programs, Rodriguez said, "should definitely not be dimmed down - the NEA being funded by the federal government gave me an opportunity, opened doors for me. I've been able to perform at the Gregory Awards, the Mayor's Arts Awards. It helped me get myself out there."
