
Department Overview

Budget Overview

The Office of Intergovernmental Relations (OIR) is responsible for engaging with other jurisdictions and governmental entities to collaborate and advocate for outcomes that are in the interest of the City and region. OIR implements and manages lobbying contracts and ensures the City's lobbying resources align with the City's strategic advocacy priorities.

OIR was asked to reprioritize General Fund resources for other priorities within the City with a 2% reduction. The 2017 Adopted and 2018 Endorsed Budget includes this reduction, made to the department's human services advocacy contracts.

In order to increase the City's ability to respond to increased international opportunities, the Mayor's 2017-2018 Proposed Budget added one position to OIR to help elevate Seattle's international profile by increasing support of the City's existing and new international initiatives.

City Council Changes to the Proposed Budget

The City Council eliminated the position added to OIR to increase Seattle's international profile. The funding was reallocated to other Council priorities, including an increase for OIR of \$40,000 to advocate state and federal governments for minimum wage mitigation funds for human service providers.

Descriptions of Incremental Budget Changes

Baseline Changes

Citywide Adjustments for Standard Cost Changes - \$72,684

Citywide technical adjustments made in the initial planning phase reflect changes in the internal services costs, health care, retirement contribution rate, and updates to unemployment and industrial insurance charges. These adjustments reflect initial assumptions about these costs and inflators early in the budget process.

Proposed Changes

Elevate Seattle's International Profile - \$100,000/1.00 FTE

Council eliminated this proposal in the adopted budget. Refer to the Council Phase Changes section below. The proposed budget description follows:

As Seattle continues to grow as an international city, opportunities for the City to become involved in international issues are also growing. From trade and cultural exchange, to collaborating with local immigrant

community groups, increasing our international profile benefits Seattle's residents. To help develop these opportunities, the 2015 Adopted and 2016 Endorsed Budget added an international business development position to OIR to facilitate growth in international economic activity. This position and portfolio were transferred to the Office of Economic Development to align business development activities within one department.

The 2017-2018 Proposed Budget builds on the need for more capacity by including a Strategic Advisor 1 to facilitate and maintain existing and new international relationships and initiatives. This includes strengthening the Sister Cities program, increasing outreach to local international groups, and institutionalizing the Partner Cities program. Like with the Sister Cities program, the Partner Cities program seeks to build relationships between Seattle and foreign cities, but with the ability to move more nimbly toward opportunities.

Reduction to human services advocacy contracts - (\$53,500)

The Office of Intergovernmental Relations is reducing their overall budget by 2% in order for the City to reprioritize General Fund to other initiatives. This reduction will come out of the funding for human services advocacy contracts.

Council Changes

Advocacy for Minimum Wage Mitigation Funds for Human Service Providers - \$40,000

The Council added \$40,000 to support minimum wage mitigation funds for human service providers. OIR will use the ongoing funding to advocate for mitigation support at the state and federal governments.

Reallocating international affairs position funding - (\$100,000)/(1.00) FTE

The Mayor's 2017-2018 Proposed Budget included \$100,000 and a position to elevate Seattle's international profile. The City Council removed this adjustment and used the funding for other City Council priorities.
