

# City of Seattle 2017 State Legislative Bulletin

April 10, 2017 Number 13

The City of Seattle is committed to being a safe, vibrant, interconnected, and affordable city for all.

## **Week Overview**

As the Legislature approached the opposite house fiscal cutoff on April 4<sup>th</sup>, week 13 focused mainly on getting bills moved out of their respective fiscal committees. Any bill with a fiscal impact that is not deemed necessary to implement the budget (NTIB) had to pass out of its opposite house fiscal committee by April 4<sup>th</sup>. After the cutoff, the focus shifted to the floor activity with both the House and Senate being on the floor for the remainder of the week.

# **Priority Areas**

#### Revenue

The House revenue bill, <u>HB 2186</u>, received a public hearing in the House Finance Committee on April 3<sup>rd</sup>. Following the public hearing, it passed out of the House Finance Committee on April 4<sup>th</sup> on a party line vote. The bill now heads to the House floor for further consideration. As a reminder, the bill includes the following sources of new revenue:

- A 7% capital gains tax on earnings above \$25,000 for single filers and \$50,000 for joint filers (estimated to raise \$715 million in revenue during the biennium)
- Increasing an existing business and occupation tax on larger Washington State businesses, while exempting businesses with less than \$250,000 in gross revenue from paying the tax (estimated to provide \$1.2 billion in revenue during the biennium)
- Ending an exemption for online sales (estimated to bring in \$340.8 million over the biennium)
- Increasing the real estate taxes on sales of homes priced at \$1 million or more, while lowering taxes for homes priced under \$250,000. (estimated to raise about \$419.7 million during the biennium)
- \$206 million in assumed reversions
- \$96 million in budget-driven revenue, other legislation and other adjustments

# **House Capital Budget**

The House released its proposed capital budget on April 5<sup>th</sup> and held a public hearing on the proposal the following day. The bill moved out of the House Capital Budget Committee on April 7<sup>th</sup>. HB 1075 appropriates a total of \$4.15 billion. Of this amount, \$2.468 billion in bonds is appropriated for the 2017-19 fiscal biennium. \$2.451 billion requires passage of a new bond authorization bill (HB 1080) and \$16.8 million is from existing bond authority. A total of \$1.68 billion is appropriated from other funding.

Approximately \$105.3 million in bond capacity is reserved for a 2018 Supplemental Capital Budget.

HB 1075 also adjusts the 2015-17 Capital Budget by increasing \$8.9 million in bonds and new appropriations while reducing \$8.9 in bond re-appropriations and reducing \$90.4 million in other funds.

#### Education

A total of \$1.033 billion is appropriated for K-12 School Construction Assistance grants from the following sources: \$851.2 million from state general obligation bonds and \$179 million from the Common School Construction Account (CSCA). Funding at this level raises the square foot space allocation per elementary student from 90 square feet per student to 110 square feet per student.

- \$15 million is appropriated for grants for science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) grants for classroom and lab renovations or additions.
- \$15 million is appropriated for modernization grants for small, rural school districts with full-time equivalent student enrollments fewer than 1,000.
- \$15 million is appropriated for renovation of no more than 3 elementary schools in school districts with full-time equivalent student enrollments more than 45,000.
- \$13.3 million is provided for equipment or small repair and minor works grants to support career and technical education programs, ADA compliance, skill centers, and healthy kids and healthy schools. \$2 million of this amount is to provide funding to school districts for emergency repair grants to address unexpected and imminent health and safety hazards.

#### Early Learning

• \$15.5 million is provided for grants and loans to construct or modernize facilities to provide state funds to match private and other public funding to provide classroom space for eligible organizations, including school districts, that participate in the Early Achievers Program. Loans and grants will be awarded on a competitive basis to projects statewide.

#### Housing (\$106.4 million)

- \$24.4 million is for housing projects that provide supportive housing and case-management services for persons with chronic mental illness.
- \$10 million is for competitively awarded housing preservation grants.
- \$5 million is for people who have incomes at or below 90 percent of the annual median income and have been displaced by a natural disaster declared by the governor.
- \$10 million is provided for six specific housing projects.
- \$1 million is for the Department for the purpose of creating community owned capital assets.
- The remaining \$56 million are for competitive housing projects:
  - ➤ 10 percent for projects that benefit veterans;
  - ➤ 10 percent for projects that benefit homeownership;
  - > 5 percent for projects that benefit persons with developmental disabilities;
  - > 5 percent for projects that projects that quick move people from homelessness into secure housing; and
  - ➤ The remaining amounts for projects that benefit low-income populations in need of housing.

#### Human Services

In addition to the \$75.6 million provided for community-based mental health beds through the Department of Commerce:

- The Department of Social and Health Services is provided \$18.7 million for patient safety enhancements, preservation, and ward renovations at Eastern State Hospital and Western State Hospital. Additionally, \$21.7 million is provided for an acute mental health unit at Echo Glen and beds at the Child Study and Treatment center.
- The Department of Corrections is provided \$4.3 million for adding 128 beds for minimum custody female offenders with mental health diagnoses at Maple Lane.

#### Natural Resources

- \$280 million in water quality to competitively awarded loans and grants statewide under an integrated approach to water quality financing
- \$52.1 million is provided to the Department of Ecology to continue programs whose purpose is to use a wide range of methods to increase water supplies to meet the instream flow needs of fish and wildlife and the out-of-stream needs of agriculture and communities.
- \$111.4 million is provided for flood risk reduction and floodplain habitat restoration projects statewide
- \$10 million for Coordinated prevention grants

#### VW Settlement

Washington State will receive \$122.7 million as a result of a settlement with Volkswagen. The funds must be dedicated to reducing harmful nitrogen oxide emissions. The Department of Ecology is given spending authority of \$70 million for projects including:

• Commercial vehicle class four through eight transit buses

- Commercial vehicle class four through eight school and shuttle buses
- Commercial vehicle class eight local freight trucks and port drayage vehicles
- Commercial vehicle class four through seven local freight trucks
- Light duty, zero emission vehicle supply equipment
- Projects eligible under the Diesel Emission Reduction Act

#### Education

Education Funding Plans: <u>SSB 5607</u>, the Senate Republican's education funding plan, sponsored by Sen. Braun (R), passed off the Senate floor on February 1<sup>st</sup>, with a 25-24 vote. It then received a public hearing in the House Appropriations Committee on February 6<sup>th</sup>.

ESSB 5875, sponsored by Sen. Braun (R), was introduced alongside the Senate Republican proposed operating budget and modifies elements of SSB 5607. This updated plan adjusted the new State Local Effort Levy property tax from \$1.80/\$1,000 of assed value to \$1.55/\$1,000 of assed value, which would be a raise in property tax for Seattle residents. The bill passed out of the Senate on March 23<sup>rd</sup> with a 25-24 vote and has been referred to the House Appropriations Committee where it awaits action.

The House Democrats' education funding plan, <u>ESHB 1843</u>, is sponsored by Rep. Sullivan (D). This bill passed out of the House with a vote of 50-47 on February 22<sup>nd</sup>. It has been referred to the Senate Ways and Means Committee where it awaits further action.

With the release of the House proposed operating budget, Rep. Lytton (D) also released a new education plan bill. <u>HB 2185</u>, fulfilling the state's paramount duty for all children through equitable and responsive investments in the state's basic education program and reductions to local effort contributions, has not received legislative action, but is noted throughout the House proposed operating budget.

Sen. Mullet (D) introduced <u>SB 5825</u>, which is intended to be a middle-ground solution between the Democrat and Republican proposals. A proposed substitute received a public hearing in the Senate Way and Means Committee on February 27<sup>th</sup>.

*Levy Cliff:* ESB 5023, sponsored by Sen. Wellman (D), extends the current school district levy authority by one year. The bill was passed by the Senate on March 8<sup>th</sup>, with a 48-1 vote. The House took action the following day and passed ESB 5023 with an 87-10 vote. The Governor signed the bill on March 15<sup>th</sup>, and the effective date is July 23<sup>rd</sup>.

*Outdoor Preschools:* SSB 5357, sponsored by Sen. Ranker (D), would establish a pilot program to license outdoor early learning and child care programs. The bill passed out of the Senate on February 28<sup>th</sup>, with a 44-5 vote and passed out of the House on April 7<sup>th</sup>, with a 74-23 vote.

## **Public Safety**

*Use of Deadly Force:* SSB 5073/HB 1529 adopts recommendations approved by the state task force, which deletes the good faith and malice clauses in favor of a new standard that asks if a "reasonable officer" would use deadly force in the same circumstances. Both bills also contain policy aimed at funding new training techniques, like de-escalation practices, distribution of less-lethal weapons, and data collection on use of force incidents. SSB 5073 received executive action on February 16<sup>th</sup>, in the Senate Law & Justice Committee where it was amended to add intent language that states it is necessary for law enforcement to build trust in the diverse communities they serve. Additional language was added that states if any provision of the act is held by a court to be invalid, the remainder of the act is incapable of accomplishing the legislative purpose and is also invalid. The bill is considered "Necessary to Implement the Budget" and is not subject to cut-offs.

Sexual Assault Forensic Exams: SHB 1109, establishes a pilot project to create and train multidisciplinary community response teams, as well as creates a funding account using a fee levied on adult entertainment establishments. The bill received executive action on March 29<sup>th</sup> in the Senate Law and Justice Committee, and has been referred to the Senate Way and Means Committee for further consideration.

*Human Trafficking:* SB 5029, which protects victims by creating a protection order or no-contact order, was not passed before the House of Origin cutoff. The House companion bill, HB 1079, passed the House unanimously on February 13<sup>th</sup>, and passed the Senate unanimously on April 5<sup>th</sup>. HB 1078/SB 5030, which extends the statute of limitations for human trafficking crimes from three to ten years, passed in the House unanimously on February 9<sup>th</sup>, and was referred to Senate Law and Justice Committee. The Senate bill also passed unanimously on February 8<sup>th</sup>, and passed out of the House unanimously on April 6<sup>th</sup>.

Law Enforcement and Victim Notification: Bipartisan-sponsored legislation (HB 1501) alerting victims and law enforcement when a prohibited gun buyer illegally tries to purchase a firearm, was passed by the House on March 3<sup>rd</sup> with an 84-13 vote. The bill has been placed on second reading by the Senate Rules Committee as of April 6<sup>th</sup>.

Sexual Assault Protection Orders: SSB 5256/SHB 1384 aligns protections for sexual assault survivors with those for victims of stalking and domestic violence. The House bill was passed off the floor on February 20<sup>th</sup>, with a 76-21 vote, and was referred to the Senate Law and Justice Committee. The Senate bill was moved out of the Senate on March 8<sup>th</sup> with a 43-6 vote and was moved out of the House on April 6<sup>th</sup> with a 75-22 vote.

*Police Citizenship:* HB 1182, sponsored by Rep. Stokesbary (R), addresses civil service qualifications for police officers, fire departments, and county sheriff departments, by expanding who can apply for a position to include lawful permanent residents. The bill received a public hearing on March 15<sup>th</sup> in the Senate Commerce, Labor and Sports Committee.

Ban the Box: <u>HB 1298</u>, sponsored by Rep. Ortiz-Self (D), would prohibit employers from asking about arrests or convictions before an applicant is determined otherwise qualified for a

position. The bill was passed on March 9<sup>th</sup> by the Senate Commerce, Labor and Sports Committee. SB 5312, sponsored by Sen. Baumgartner (R), is a similar bill, but includes preemption of local laws, was passed by the Senate on March 7<sup>th</sup> with a 25-24 vote. The Senate bill received a public hearing on March 21<sup>st</sup>, and executive action was taken on March 28<sup>th</sup>, in the House Labor and Workplace Standards Committee. The bill then received a public hearing on April 1<sup>st</sup> and executive action was taken on April 4<sup>th</sup> in the House Appropriations Committee. The bill has now been placed on second reading by the House Rules Committee.

Public Records: <u>HB 1594</u>, introduced by Rep. McBride (D), would require the Attorney General to establish a consultation program to assist local governments with best practices for managing public records requests; the agency to offer to participate in mediation with a requester to clarify a public records request and to resolve any disagreement regarding disclosure; the Division of Archives and Records Management to conduct a feasibility study for establishing a statewide internet portal for public records management; and authorizes a \$1 surcharge on county recorded documents for the State Archives local competitive grant program and local trainings on record retention practice. The bill received a public hearing on March 15<sup>th</sup> and received executive action on March 29<sup>th</sup> in the Senate State Government Committee. The bill was referred to the Senate Ways and Means Committee and received a public hearing on March 31<sup>st</sup> and executive action on April 3<sup>rd</sup>. The bill has been placed on second reading by the Senate Rules Committee.

HB 1595, introduced by Rep. McBride (D), would allow agencies to charge a small fee for some public records requests and deny frequent automatically generated requests that interfere with the essential functions of the agency. The bill passed out of the House on March 3<sup>rd</sup> with a 75-22 vote and was later passed out of the Senate on April 7<sup>th</sup> with a 43-4 vote. The bill was amended in the Senate to require agencies to provide an estimate of the costs associated with fulfilling a records request. The House will now need to vote on the bill as it was amended in the Senate.

*Voting Rights Act:* Sen. Hunt (D) and Rep. Gregerson (D) introduced the Washington Voting Rights Act, <u>SB 5267/HB 1800</u>. This policy would promote equal voting opportunity in certain political subdivisions by authorizing district-based elections, requiring redistricting and new elections in certain circumstances, and establishing a cause of action to redress lack of voter opportunity. <u>HB 1800</u> was passed on February 27<sup>th</sup>, with a 51-46 vote, and received a public hearing on March 22<sup>nd</sup> in the Senate State Government Committee.

#### **General Government**

Property Tax: Rep. Lytton (D) and Sen. Pedersen (D) sponsored HB 1764/SB 5772, which replaces the 1% property tax revenue limits with a limit tied to population change and inflation. The House bill received a public hearing in the House Finance committee on February 10<sup>th</sup>, and executive action was taken on March 30<sup>th</sup>. It was referred to the Rules Committee on April 4<sup>th</sup>. The Senate bill received a public hearing on February 16<sup>th</sup>, in the Senate Local Government Committee, but no further action was taken. Both bills are considered "Necessary to Implement the Budget" and are not subject to cut-offs.

Lodging Excise Tax: Rep. Pettigrew (D) and Sen. Frockt (D) introduced <u>HB 2015/SB 5850</u>, which extends the lodging tax revenue to all lodging types regardless of the number of lodging units on the premises. The bill was passed out of the House Finance Committee on February 23<sup>rd</sup>, and referred to the House Rules Committee for further action. The Senate bill was not scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Ways and Means Committee.

Municipal Access to Credit Unions: Rep. Bergquist (D) and Sen. Angel (R) introduced <u>HB</u> 1209/SB 5396, which allows credit unions to accept public deposits over the maximum insured amount. SHB 1209 was passed by the House on February 16<sup>th</sup> with a 73-24 vote, and has been referred to the Senate Financial Institutions and Insurance Committee.

*5G Deployment:* HB 1921/SB 5711, which address issues related to the deployment of 5G small cells, received public hearings on February 8<sup>th</sup>, in the House Technology & Economic Development and the Senate Environment, Energy, and Telecommunications Committees, respectively. SB 5711 was placed on second reading on February 24<sup>th</sup>, but was not brought to the floor for a vote. Though the bill did not advance by cutoff, conversations regarding this bill and issue are ongoing.

Business Licensing: EHB 2005, sponsored by Rep. Lytton (D), seeks to simplify the administration of municipal general business licenses. EHB 2005 was voted off the House floor on March 2<sup>nd</sup> with a 96-2. The bill received a public hearing on March 15<sup>th</sup> and executive action on an amended version of the bill on March 23<sup>rd</sup> in the Senate Commerce, Labor and Sports Committee. EHB 2005 received executive action on March 30<sup>th</sup> in the Senate Ways and Means committee and has been placed on second reading by the Senate Rules Committee. ESSB 5777, sponsored by Sen. Brown (R), is a similar piece of legislation that was passed off the Senate floor by a 44-0 vote. The bill received a public hearing on March 17<sup>th</sup> and executive action on March 30<sup>th</sup> in the House Finance Committee, and has been placed on second reading by the House Rules Committee.

*Internet User Privacy and Security*: <u>HB 2200</u>, sponsored by Rep. Hansen (D), would require broadband internet providers to provide notice and obtain consent for access to, use, and disclosure of certain customer information as well as provide notice of privacy policies and take reasonable data security measures. <u>HB 2200</u> has been scheduled for a public hearing and an executive session in the House Technology & Economic Development Committee on April 12<sup>th</sup>.

#### **Environment**

Solar Incentives: SHB 1048 which extends the solar production tax incentive and addresses the per utility tax credit limit, passed out of the House Technology & Economic Development Committee on March 1<sup>st</sup>, and received a public hearing in the House Finance Committee on March 10<sup>th</sup>. Because this bill is considered "Necessary to Implement the Budget," it is not subject to cut-offs and conversations are ongoing.

*Model Toxics Control Act:* SB 5501/HB 1663 would impose a surtax on the possession of hazardous substances. SB 5501 received a public hearing on February 7<sup>th</sup>, in the Senate Energy,

Environment and Telecommunications Committee, but did not move out of committee. <u>HB 1663</u> received a public hearing on February 7<sup>th</sup>, in the House Finance Committee, and passed out of committee on February 23<sup>rd</sup> after executive action. It has been referred to the House Rules Committee.

HB 2182, sponsored by Rep. Peterson (D), relates to providing a tiered tax on the possession of hazardous substances to provide for the current program's immediate needs and a more stable source of revenue in the future. The bill received a public hearing on April 4<sup>th</sup> and executive action on April 7<sup>th</sup> in the House Capital Budget Committee.

Carbon Pollution Tax: Sen. Braun (R) and Sen. Ranker (D) introduced <u>SB 5127</u>, by request of the Office of Financial Management, which would establish a carbon pollution tax and investment program to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, facilitate the transition to a clean energy economy, and invest in K-12 education. The bill did not receive a public hearing but was voted out of the Senate Ways and Means Committee on February 24<sup>th</sup>, and was placed on second reading on February 27<sup>th</sup>. The House companion bill, <u>HB 1555</u>, sponsored by Rep. Lytton (D) did not receive a public hearing.

SB 5385, sponsored by Sen. Hobbs (D), would impose a carbon tax equal to \$15 per metric ton of carbon dioxide on the carbon content of fossil fuels extracted, manufactured, or introduced into Washington; repeals any other state agency rule, policy, or standard that sets a greenhouse gas emissions standard, limit, cap, or charge; and directs the carbon tax revenue to be spent in specified amounts on storm water projects, fish barrier correction projects at state highways, renewable energy and energy efficiency programs, student transportation, and highway maintenance and preservation. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Environment, Energy & Telecommunications Committee on February 2<sup>nd</sup>, but did not receive an executive session.

HB 1646, sponsored by Rep. Fitzgibbon, seeks to promote an equitable clean energy economy by creating a carbon tax that allows investment in clean energy, clean air, healthy forests, and Washington's communities. The bill imposes an escalating tax on greenhouse gas emissions from fossil fuels and electricity beginning July 1, 2018 at a rate of \$15 per ton of carbon dioxide equivalent emissions and distributes revenue from the greenhouse gas tax to various new programs, including a fund used for certain workers who lose their jobs, a grant program for low-income individuals, and specified types of energy, water, and forest health projects. The bill received a public hearing on March 14<sup>th</sup> in the House Environment Committee. The Senate companion bill, SB 5509, sponsored by Sen. Carlyle (D), has not received any action.

# **Homelessness & Housing**

Homelessness: HB 1570 deals with access to homeless housing and assistance, eliminates the sunset for the local homeless housing and assistance document recording fee, and allows cities or counties to charge and retain an additional surcharge for homeless housing and assistance. The legislation also changes the definition of private rental housing to include non-profit organizations. The bill was passed out of the House Appropriations Committee on February 24<sup>th</sup>

and placed on second reading by the House Rules Committee on April 5<sup>th</sup>. The bill is considered "Necessary to Implement the Budget" and is not subject to cut-offs.

In addition, Sen. Miloscia (R) introduced <u>SB 5864</u>, which aims to end homelessness by creating new procedures for reunifying homeless youth/minors with their families, requiring shelter space to be made available to all individuals, pre-empting local guidelines for encampments, and extending the document recording fee until 2022. The bill received a public hearing on March 16<sup>th,</sup> and executive action was taken on March 20<sup>th</sup> in the Senate Ways and Means Committee. Funding for the bill is provided in the Senate Republican operating budget, so this bill is considered "Necessary to Implement the Budget" and is not subject to cut-offs. The bill was placed on second reading by the Senate Rules Committee on March 29<sup>th</sup> and is awaiting further action.

In response to the Senate Republican budget, Sen. Nelson (D) introduced <u>SB 5911</u>, which provides \$160 million from the budget stabilization account for housing assistance, support services, and other purposes to address the state's homeless population.

*Youth Homelessness*: Rep. Slatter (D) and Sen. Zeiger (R) introduced Department of Commerce request legislation, <u>HB 1630/SB 5625</u>, which would allow unaccompanied minors aged 13-18 to consent to share personally identifying information under Washington's Homeless Management Information System (HMIS). The House bill was passed on March 3<sup>rd</sup>, with a 96-1 vote, and received a public hearing on March 22<sup>nd</sup> and executive action on March 28<sup>th</sup> in the Senate Human Services, Mental Health and Housing Committee. On March 29<sup>th</sup>, the Senate Rules Committee places the House bill on 2<sup>nd</sup> Reading and is awaiting further action.

Affordable Housing: HB 1797 was introduced by Rep. McBride (D) to address local option tools for affordable housing. The bill was amended in committee to provide a one-time sales tax remittance, REET 2 flexibility to be used for affordable housing development through 2022, and made changes to HB 2263 (2015). HB 1797 was placed on second reading by the House Rules Committee on April 5<sup>th</sup>. In addition, the omnibus bill SB 5254, introduced by Sen. Fain (R), makes changes to buildable lands, zoning in urban growth areas, affordable housing, and homelessness. SB 5254 was amended and executive action was taken on March 20<sup>th</sup> in the Senate Ways and Means Committee. The bill was placed on second reading by the Senate Rules Committee and is awaiting further action. Both bills are considered "Necessary to Implement the Budget" and are not subject to cut-offs.

#### **Safety Net**

Family & Medical Leave Insurance: <u>HB 1116</u>, implementing family and medical leave was passed out of the House Appropriations Committee on February 22<sup>nd</sup> and referred to the House Rules Committee. A title only bill, <u>SB 5829</u>, did advance and is expected to be the final Senate vehicle if/when a compromise is reached. Both bills are "Necessary to Implement the Budget" and are not subject to cut-offs.

Equal Pay: HB 1533 and HB 1506, addressing equal pay, were both passed out of the House Labor and Workplace Standards Committee on January 30<sup>th</sup>. HB 1533 has been referred to the Rules Committee as of February 2<sup>nd</sup> and awaits further action. HB 1506 was passed by the House on March 8<sup>th</sup> with a 61-36 vote, and executive action was taken on March 29<sup>th</sup> in the Senate Commerce, Labor and Sports Committee. It was passed to the Senate Rules Committee on the same day. Sen. Cleveland's (D) Equal Pay Act, SB 5140, and Sen. Fain's (R) bill on the same topic, SB 5344, were both heard in the Senate Commerce, Labor, and Sports Committee on February 1<sup>st</sup>, but did not advance. A title only bill cosponsored by Sen. Fain and Sen. Cleveland, could be the final vehicle if a Senate compromise can be reached.

Community Health Engagement Centers/Safe Injection Sites: Sen. Miloscia (R) and Rep. Stokesbary (R) sponsored <u>SB 5223/HB 1761</u> to block cities and counties in Washington State from hosting community health engagement centers/safe injection sites. The House bill was never scheduled for a public hearing. The Senate bill was passed on March 2<sup>nd</sup>, with a 26-23 vote, and was referred to the House Health Care and Wellness Committee.

Affordable Care Act: HB 1523, which requires health plans to cover preventive services with no cost sharing, was passed by the House on March 1<sup>st</sup> with a 70-28 vote. This bill puts in state statute that preventive services required to be covered through law, regulation, guidance, or court cases as of December 31, 2016, must continue to be covered by health plans in Washington with no cost sharing. The bill received a public hearing on March 14<sup>th</sup> in the Senate Health Care Committee.

# **Transportation**

*REAL ID:* Rep. Clibborn (D) and Sen. King (R) introduced legislation aimed at facilitating compliance with the federal REAL ID act (HB 1041/SB 5008). These bills would modify drivers' licenses and identification card design and fees. SB 5008 was passed by the Senate on February 28<sup>th</sup>, with a 45-4 vote, and received a public hearing on March 22<sup>nd</sup> and executive action on April 4<sup>th</sup> in the House Transportation Committee. It has been placed on second reading by the House Rules Committee as of April 6<sup>th</sup>.

Distracted Driving: HB 1371/SB 5289, legislation to prevent drivers from holding a smartphone, tablet, or communication device while driving, or using a mounted device that requires more than a tap. The Senate bill was passed on March 6<sup>th</sup>, with a 36-13 vote, and received a public hearing on March 23<sup>rd</sup> and executive action on April 4<sup>th</sup> in the House Transportation Committee. It has been placed on second reading by the House Rules Committee as of April 7<sup>th</sup>. HB 1371 was amended by the House and passed on March 7<sup>th</sup>, with a 52-45 vote. The bill received a public hearing on March 28<sup>th</sup>, executive action on March 29<sup>th</sup> in the Senate Transportation Committee, and has been placed on second reading by the Senate Rules Committee as of April 4th.

Oil Safety Transportation: Rep. Farrell (D) introduced <u>HB 1611</u>, which changes regulatory programs covering the overland and overwater transportation of oil, including requiring rule-making by the Board of Pilotage Commissioners to require tug escorts for oil-laden vessels in

Puget Sound, and requiring updates to oil refinery spill prevention and contingency plans to address the handling of crude oil for export. The bill received a public hearing on February 23<sup>rd</sup>, in the House Finance Committee, and executive action was taken on March 30<sup>th</sup>. It now awaits action by the House Rule Committee.

*Transportation Network Companies*: Sen. King (R) introduced legislation to create a statewide regulatory framework for transportation network companies (SB 5620). Our City departments have had productive negotiations with the transportation network companies, and these discussions will help shape the statewide regulation framework. The bill was amended on the floor by the Senate and passed on March 7<sup>th</sup> with a 34-15 vote. The amended bill provides consumer protection provisions and a 6-month suspension of a TNC's permit if they attempt to deceive or manipulate authorities. Our departments still have concerns with certain provisions of this bill and will continue to work with the proponents to try and reach agreement. SB 5620 received a public hearing on March 14<sup>th</sup> in the House Labor and Workplace Standards Committee.

# **Looking Ahead**

There are two week remaining for the 2017 regular session. The opposite house floor cutoff is on April 12<sup>th</sup>. Any bill that does not pass off the floor by 5:00PM on April 12<sup>th</sup> will be considered dead unless it has been deemed NTIB. As a reminder, the last day of the regular session is April 23<sup>rd</sup>. However, it is anticipated by most that agreement will not be reached on the budget by this date, and we will likely see the Legislature go into one or more special sessions.
