


Here's what we've heard so far

Public Meeting 1 & 2


- Safety and Security
 Comments and concerns raised around homelessness in the park, improving lighting and views through the park, and making the park feel safer for everyone, remove parking on Nagle, opening the park as soon as possible.
- Park Programming
 Considerations around a dog park, uses for the Shelter House, turning the adjacent street into a pedestrian only street, creating a larger plaza, bringing in food trucks and vendors, looking at city-wide programs available in addition to opportunities at Cal Anderson Park.
- BIPOC / LGBTQIA+
 How do we center the needs of these communities and their concerns? Would a specific focus on the BIPOC and LGBTQIA+
 community exclude concerns of residents living near the park who may not identify similarly? Provide a safe space for BIPOC
 and LGBTQIA+ voices to be heard, balance focus on BIPOC and LGBTQIA+ with existing uses, programs, and events.
- Health and Human Services
 How will currently available services in the park be continued, or expanded to meet the growing needs of the Capitol Hill
 community, particularly to support those experiencing homelessness. Can the Shelter House support these services? Identify
 services available in the community with better signage and wayfinding.
- CHOP / CHAZ
 Develop strategies for public art, conversation circles, and garden programs, ideas for short term and long term
 improvements, community-driven opportunities, doesn't need to be limited to one installation and integration into overall park
 is important.
- Operations and Maintenance Repair or replace elements of the park that were damaged by the protests, maintain the park to a higher level of standard, address safety and security items related to maintenance, work with and be transparent with the community before significant activities, consider effect of police presence before action is taken.













Pre-COVID, how often did you generally visit the park?



When you go to Cal Anderson Park, what are the ages of the people you visit with?











Do you identify yourself as part of this community?












What is the best location for a community garden? Select up to 2 preferred options.




What is the best location for a community garden program?








What is the best location for a conversation corner? Select up to 3 preferred options

Random sampling of responses


- "Education activities like a learning garden, historic signage, public information for services, art exhibitions, large and small group areas, security and service patrols, restrooms"
- "Being able to use the park and feel safe in any capacity. The park was lovely before no need to 'reimagine it' just make it a park again."
- "Clean public restrooms, public fitness classes/open fitness events, park stewards who are members of the community and trained in conflict de-escalation and how to direct people to city and county services who are available to resolve conflicts in the park without police intervention (paid position)."
- "(1) Sweeping out the homeless encampments so that people can safely enjoy the park without fear of needles, feces, and the mentally unstable. (2) Increased police presence to protect from individuals who would harm bystanders or destroy property. (3) Additional protection for existing buildings to prevent contamination of Cap Hill's water supply from people who would break in."
- "Enforcement of leash laws, full calendar of activities using the park house and meadow during spring, summer, fall. Work with the 11th Ave church that provides a longtime lunch program, organize park clean-up days where residents can participate, sharps disposals at various parts of park."
- "Having a shelter house and garden are great beginnings projects/services to have. It's important to acknowledge all the users of the park. Not just the ones with secure housing. The garden and shelter house are perfect for getting to know people in the neighborhood. The city has abandoned those suffering from mental illnesses, drug addiction, and people experiencing homelessness. The shelter house has given me hope that when the city doesn't support exploited/vulnerable people the community will step up."
- "Summer movie nights. Cafe tables and chairs and games infrastructure, like found in Occidental and Westlake Parks (cornhole, ping pong, chess, etc.). Food and beverage sales kiosks (this is a common and very welcome feature in European parks)."

Random sampling of responses

- "Since CHOP/CHAZ, nearly all activities for most residents and families of Capitol Hill have been stripped away. We need to providing housing for Seattle's homeless, but CAP is not the place."
- "Wonderful location which cannot currently be used by children and parents because of safety problems: shootings, rioting, vandalism nearby is out of control. Needs more police presence to feel safe again."
- "Much of what has been exposed on Capitol Hill has provoked needed change over the years. I'm not alarmed but I would also like to see dialogue, action and community listening projects."
- "Cal Anderson is a foundation for the neighborhood. The park is the pillar that supports Capital Hill."
- "Please honor the history, the community, and the children."
- "I miss the park and so does everyone else in the neighborhood. We would like it back. Thank you."
- "People living there is selective enforcement. Other "prohibited" activities are less tolerated. We should provide services (food, health care) near where we can provide housing [not the park]. I have to be always on my guard visiting/passing by now."
- "Cal Anderson was the park to go to in cap hill and it still is! I think people are intimidated when they are faced with houseless people. They would rather pretend they don't exist. But the work at the shelter house has united people and reduced stigma. I love that Cal Anderson has become a place to hang out with friends and make some new ones. Every time I go to a protest I see the same people at Cal Anderson and get to check up on them and talk about our weeks."

Random sampling of responses

- "If we come out of this experience without a renewed respect for unhoused community members and a resolution to integrate them, respectfully and with their own agency, into the neighborhood of Capitol Hill, then we have completely missed the point. We have a shot at a better world and making a neighborhood that is a better home to all of us."
- "When will we see more frameworks being proposed around the health and safety of park goers? What is being considered for the illegal inhabitants of the park who are trashing the city with no recourse? What is being done to protect local businesses from being vandalized?"
- "The city needs to better explain why CHOP/CHAZ is something to be memorialized. I support BLM but CHOP was an anarchist occupation that had little to do with BLM."
- "I think it's great you're looking at ways to expand the park to accommodate various needs. The neighborhood is only continuing to grow, so with more people and less space, this park is really important."
- "Restoring the cleanliness of the park is far more urgent and important than building 'conversation circles' or relocating the community garden. The park layout is not the problem."
- "I wish there was more input from local restaurants, local businesses, and local civic groups like the gay community groups were more represented."
- "Do you have any plans to address the homeless situation? Making a couple glossy new amenities will not solve the homeless issue, most probably worsening it; If it appears to passers-by that everything is fine and improving, the issues will lose their urgency and notability, and no change in the right direction will ever take place."

- 3. Repairing fountain artwork


Long Term

- 3. Expanded arts education programming in the park including the Shelter house













Short Term

- 3. Develop design criteria for garden program within Cal Anderson Park
- 4. Develop partnership to implement, operate and maintain a demonstration garden program at Cal Anderson Park

- 2. Identify other locations within the city to advance food security for the BIPOC community
















Demonstration Garden Location(s)











The Conversation Corner

Short Term

- 1. Establish a pilot conversation circle with movable tables and chairs at plaza by restroom & shelter house
- 2. Identify location for a pilot conversation circle along or near Pine street
 - Potential location at previously existing benches
 - Individual seating, oriented to support interaction
- 3. Engage SDOT in use of right-of-way
- 4. Explore the potential for festival streets at Nagle & 11th













The Conversation Corner

Long Term

- 1. Establish parklets along the park edge
- 2. Develop programming partners for future conversation circles
- 3. Renewing the function of Pine Street as a festival street











Health & Human Services

Short Term

- 1. Assess the needs for human services within the neighborhood
- 2. Map existing human services available
- 3. Identify partner organizations
- 4. Develop a schedule/program to support partner organizations
- Implement programs upon reopening of park

Long Term

1. Monitor, evaluate, and refine













Safety & Security

Short Term

- Arborist review & implementation of vegetation management prioritizing CPTED principles
- Condition assessment of existing lighting & immediate repairs
- 3. Consideration to close Nagle parking access and improve access to entrances
- 4. Identify additional partners for programming activation of the park
- 5. Formalize relationship with park community oversight groups











Safety & Security

Long Term

- 1. Implement the remaining recommendations of lighting and CPTED studies (enhance entrances, improve maintenance, increase programs and activation, etc.)
- 2. Funding for park concierge
- 3. Refine permitting process to support community-driven programs
- 4. Implementing recommendations from community oversight group


