

Reconnect West Seattle

A plan to:

- 1. Allow similar levels of travel across the Duwamish to those seen before the closure of the West Seattle High-Rise Bridge
- 2. Reduce the impact of environmental injustice in the Duwamish Valley
- Surveys and neighborhood ballots were open from July 10-31



Neighborhood Prioritization Process

- Uses a racial equity lens to prioritize those areas disproportionately impacted by the closure of the West Seattle High-Rise Bridge and corresponding detour routes:
 - Highland Park, Roxhill, S. Delridge, Riverview
 - South Park
 - Georgetown
 - SODO
- Neighborhoods prioritize projects that will cost less than \$100,000 and under 12 months to build
- Objective: identify, prioritize, and then implement actions and projects to improve safety and traffic outcomes in these specific areas



Neighborhood Prioritization Process

- Looking at prioritization holistically: looking at other factors besides online survey votes
- Prioritization helps determine which projects get done first
- Projects will be presented in three categories:
 - In progress
 - Can be done in 2020
 - Advancing to project development / 2021 implementation
- SDOT will be looking at the overlap between neighborhood lists with bike and freight lists
- Will need continued neighborhood input and discussion on projects' designs

Reconnect West Seattle- Timeline

- Between August 5 & 19: Analyze data and develop recommendations
- August 19: Share draft
 Reconnect West Seattle
 Implementation Plan with Task Force
- Neighborhood Check-Ins: Confirm priorities with community
 - Georgetown: August 11
 - SODO: August 13
 - South W Seattle: August 13
 - South Park: August 17

- September: Reconnect West Seattle implementation will commence, with focus on fast and easy projects first
- Beyond September: Ongoing discussions and additional project implementation

Reconnect Themes - Neighborhood Ballots Overall

- Paper ballots vs online ballots
 - Online ballot breakdown
 - 73% White
 - Majority above age 40
 - Paper ballots non-English speakers and POC
- Most people that filled out ballots live in the neighborhoods and learned about it through social media

- In the following order, most people are concerned about:
 - Traffic & Congestion
 - Pedestrian Safety & Accessibility
 - Speeding
 - Environmental Impacts & Pollution

- Community Liaisons conducted outreach in multiple forms:

 - door-to-door business outreach
 - face-to face meetings
- Ethnic Media ads (print and digital)

 - -Vietnamese, Spanish, Chinese, Khmer, Somali

Anna Tran, Vietnamese Community Outreach


- Outreach:
 - Engaged with South Park Senior Center
 - Spoke with residents/seniors
 - Attended virtual meetings with Buddhist Temple to get the word out
- Heard from Community
 - Lighting needed around bus shelters and on streets
 - Walking is difficult, sidewalks are unsafe, uneven- especially hard for wheelchairs
 - Afraid to take transit due to Covid-19; instead, many are asking volunteer drivers to take them to appointments, visit family, etc.
 - Buses don't come frequently enough; sometimes have to wait 30-45 min

Community Liaison Report back

Rocio Arriaga, Latino/a Community Outreach

- Outreach:
 - Talked with businesses and the South Park Merchant's Association
 - Spoke with residents on the streets
 - Held a meeting at a business (Club Natural) with clients and community members
- Heard from Community
 - Concerned about safety
 - Increase in traffic
 - Speeding on Cloverdale and 14th, would like radar speed signs
 - Would like to see colorful crosswalks on Dallas and 14th





Surveys by Identified Race






How Did You Hear About This Survey



What we've heard from your neighbors

- 8th Avenue Improvements: Add traffic calming devices near Cloverdale and Holden, reducing short-cut pathways, better light at 8th and Cloverdale, adjust timing of lights at Roxbury, create a new "Stay Healthy Street" on Sullivan between 8th and 14th, and work to slow traffic around the community center.
- 12th Avenue Improvements: Add traffic calming devices near Dallas Ave., install speed cameras near Thistle Street, all way stop at 12th and Dallas, add flashing crosswalks.
- Other ideas related to pollution and noise abatement: Add mature tree plantings to reduce noise impacts, create a rebate program for air purification system due to the severe increase in pollutants, or provide air purifiers to community members.

What we've heard from your neighbors

- **Safety:** Respondents reported an increase in speed since the closure of the West Seattle Bridge, and feeling less safe as a pedestrian or cyclist. Specifically, speed issues were mentioned along Rose, Thistle, Sullivan, Southern, Dallas. Interventions including speed bumps, humps, and speed signage were frequently suggested.
- **Lighting**: Respondents mentioned the need for extra lighting throughout the South Park neighborhood.
- Other ideas: Increase water taxi service, add sidewalks, more rapid ride bus service. There was concern that alternative forms of transportation, such as bikes or scooters, will actually clog up the streets and not be a functional part of the system.

What we heard from your neighbors

Quotes

- "When the city will understand that we need lighting and safety. This is racism."
- "I am a disabled person and I need more accessible for someone like me in a wheelchair. Please take us veterans into account and also that they respect pedestrians like me, more signs with light."
- "Route traffic over a wider area. Speed limits, monitoring on 99 as it transitions into neighborhood from the south. Clear signs that the community isn't a highway."



The unexpected closure of the West Seattle High-Rise Bridge has had major traffic and environmental impacts on the South Park neighborhood. To deal with rapidly changing community needs, we need your help to prioritize transportation projects that will be most helpful in the short term and in the long term. The list of potential projects was generated from ideas we have received from community, along with some of our own ideas, and projects from existing transportation and neighborhood plans. The list you'll see shows all identified potential projects that could be implemented quickly within a year and an estimated cost of \$100,000 or less per project.

After we receive your priorities, SDOT will work with the West Seattle Bridge Community Task Force to look at the ideas presented to us through the lens of budget restrictions, potential transportation-related conflict, equity, safety, mobility, sustainability, livability and community support. To be straightforward, the City'sresources and capacity are limited. We will make every attempt to honor the neighborhoods' feedback and suggestions; however, not all projects will be able to move forward. Once the plans are developed, we will hold a follow-up meeting with your neighborhood to discuss and create a plan for action.


