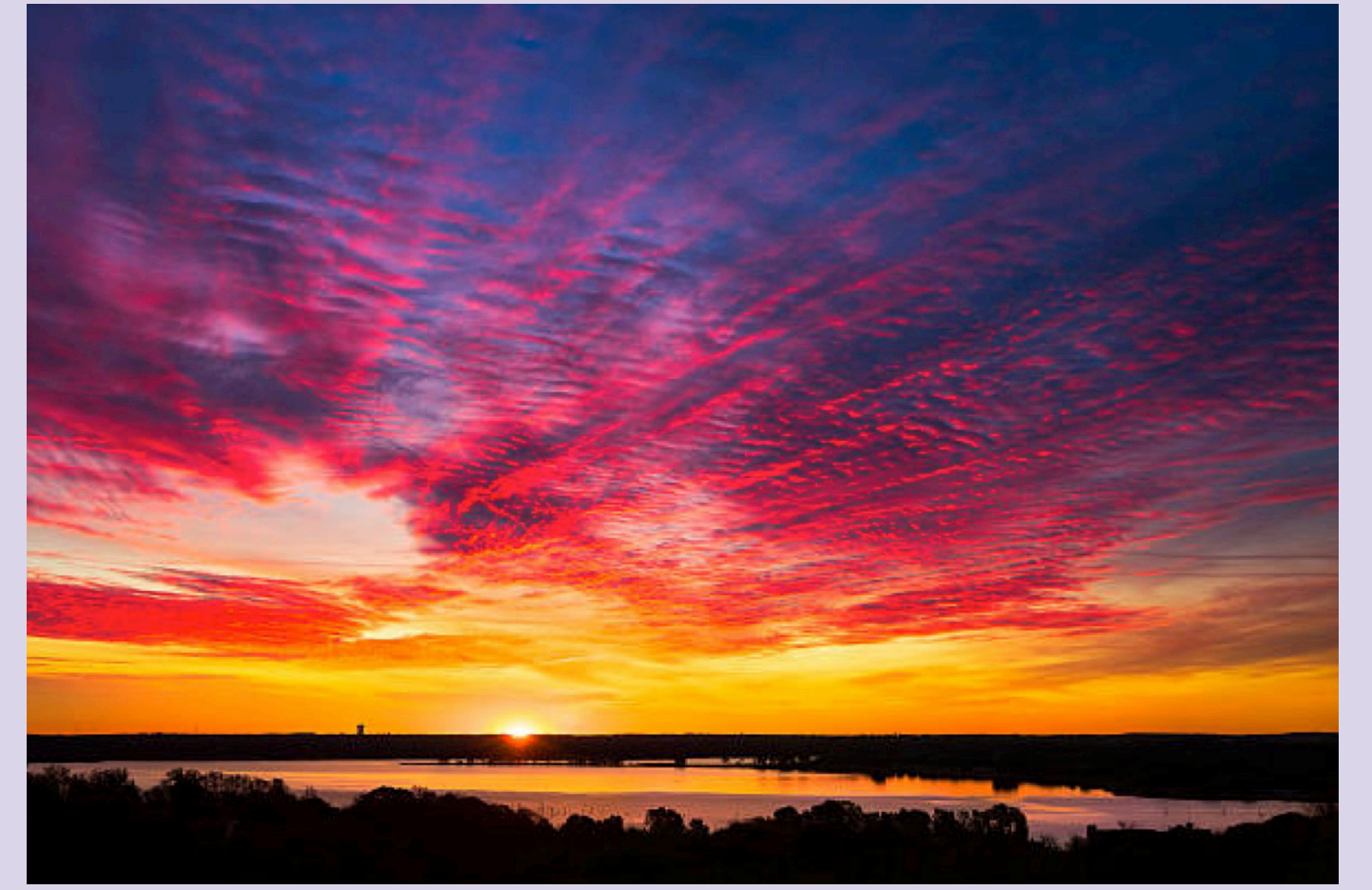

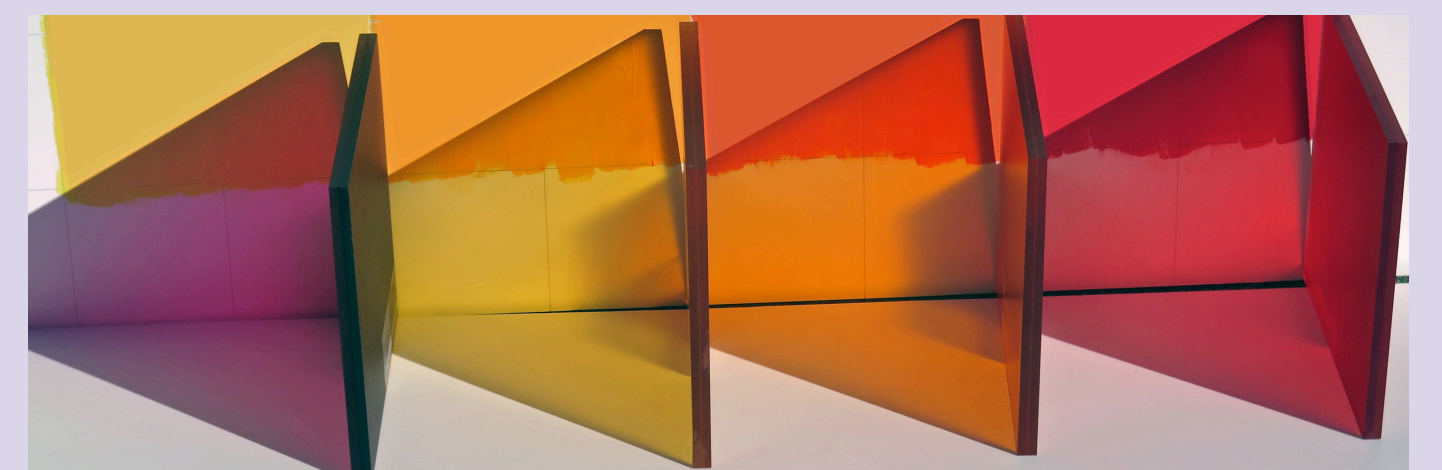
Aurora

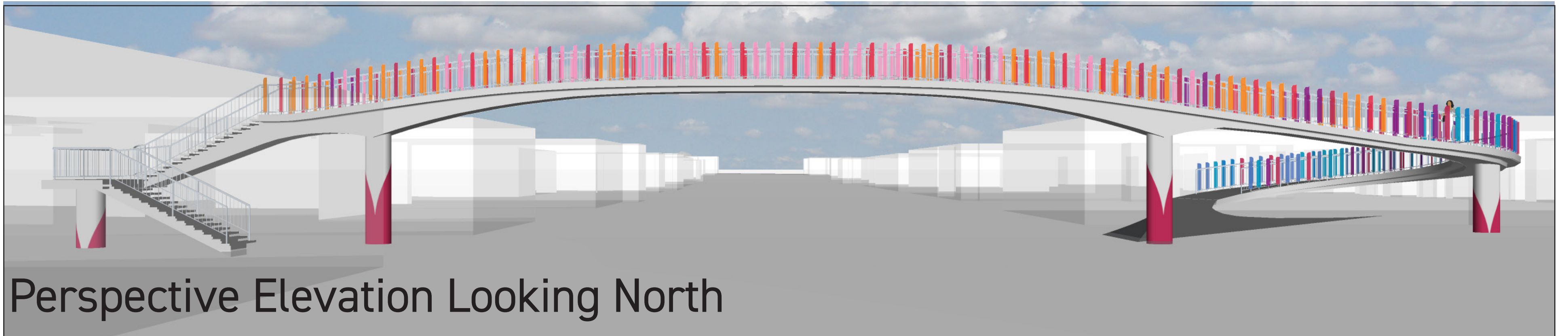
