Why have Restricted Parking Zones (RPZs)?

Curbspace is a limited public resource

 Balance and prioritize competing needs



RPZ Program

- What are RPZs designed to do?
 - Limit long-term, commuter parking
 - Allow short-term parking for visitors
 - Support residential parking access



RPZ Program

- What are RPZs designed to do?
 - Limit long-term, commuter parking
 - Allow short-term parking for visitors
 - Support residential parking access
- RPZs do not:
 - Differentiate between types of residents
 - Guarantee or reserve anyone a parking space in the public right of way



How do RPZs work?

- Permits exempt residents from time limit
- Most other vehicles subject to 2hour time limit
- 4 decal permits per household
- 1 guest permit per household
- •\$65/permit for two years
- Income eligible permit available




Proposal

- Proposed new Zone 22 signed blocks, 2-hr limit for vehicles without Zone 22 permits from 7 AM 6 PM, Monday Friday
- Proposed new Zone 22 permit eligible households
- Current Zone 22 area
- Previously, but no longer proposed new Zone 34 area
- Current Zone 34 area
- Current Zone 33 area



Proposal

- Signs on one side of the block in proposed new Zone 22 area shown in pink
 - Balance use of the public right-of-way
- Standardize Zone 22 hours
 - 2-hr limit for vehicles without Zone 22 permits from 7 AM – 6 PM, Monday - Friday


