


We're working to redesign Delridge Way SW to balance the needs of everyone who uses the corridor, whether they're on a bus, in a car, walking, or riding a bike.

- Crosswalk improvements
- Protected bike lanes and neighborhood greenway connections
- Signal upgrades
- Paving, water and sewer pipe upgrades
- Spot parking and bike lane removal,
- Public art










TRANSIT DETAILS

WHAT WE HEARD & HOW IT IS REFLECTED IN THIS DESIGN

Delridge Way SW: 10% Design

Fix potholes and bad pavement

We're planning to pave between the West Seattle Bridge and Sylvan Way SW and to make minor repairs in the rest of the corridor

Make buses faster and more frequent

We're adding bus only lanes and bus signals to keep buses on time and out of traffic







Reduce speeding and create a neighborhood feel

We're adding about 2 miles of landscaped median islands and new public art





We value the bus as a neighborhood connector

We've worked with Metro to have RapidRide stations about 1/3 mile apart instead of 1/2 mile apart

We want safer and more accessible options for people biking

We've added a southbound protected bike lane and are making new connections to adjacent neighborhood greenways





















PUBLIC ART
