
We provided testimony on the Pedestrian Master Plan, the Design Review Program Improvements proposal, and the Parks & Open Space Plan.

ONGOING WORK

Our 2018 work plan includes briefings, discussions, and research to help guide the City Council and Mayor on the following priority issues:

Mandatory Housing Affordability

The Commission will continue to support the intent of the City's Mandatory Housing Affordability (MHA) proposal and follow the project through the 2018 legislative process, attending City Council sponsored Open Houses and Public Hearings.

Industrial Lands Policy

Historically a strong proponent for the protection of Seattle's Industrial zoned lands, the Commission looks forward to reviewing any changes to the policies that may be proposed following the 2016/17 Task Force on Industrial lands.

ST3: West Seattle and Ballard **Link Extensions**

The Commission looks forward to informing the locally preferred alternative for the Seattle portion of ST3 throughout 2018 and into 2019.

Comprehensive Plan

As stewards of the Comprehensive Plan, the Commission reviews any amendments proposed to eth Plan. In addition, the Commission will take an active role in reviewing the development and finalization of equity and Plan indicators that will inform elected officials and City staff on the success of the growth strategy outlined in the 2035 Comprehensive Plan.

2017 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Letter: One Center City Near-Term Strategies

- Joint letter with the Seattle Design Commission
- Recommended reevaluating the timing of the Convention Center Expansion and moving buses to surface streets.
- Encouraged a short-term strategy that aligns with the overarching vision for One Center City, including the pedestrian experience of the public realm.
- Recommended enhancing connections to downtown's surrounding neighborhoods and to elevate safety for pedestrians and bicycles.

Letter & Testimony: Pedestrian Master Plan

Supported SDOT's approach to prioritize safe pedestrian access to schools and frequent transit stops, prioritized through a racial and social equity lens.

Letter: MHA **Implementation** Recommendations

Provided recommendations regarding zoning changes, urban village expansions, and related policies to reduce displacement and disparities in housing choice.

Email: Comments on the MHA DEIS

- Provided recommendations to inform the preferred alternative in the FEIS.
- Suggested additional displacement mitigation measures and measures to achieve a range of affordable housing types across the city and within each neighborhood.




