#### **Welcome and Introductions**

• Representatives from each of the commissions outlined their respective commission's purpose and the work they do.

#### **Current State of Renter Protections**

- Commissioner Kate Rubin outlined some of the current Seattle renter protections:
  - Late fees are limited to \$10/month.
  - Landlords must give six months' notice of a rent increase.
  - o If you are on a year-long or six-month lease, the landlord cannot terminate your tenancy at the end of the lease unless they have a good reason.
  - Many tenants are protected from eviction during the winter.
  - o Families are protected from eviction during the school year.
  - o Tenants have a right to live with a family member or roommate.
  - o If you are the first to apply for an apartment and you meet the qualifications, the landlord cannot refuse to rent to you.
  - o If your landlord raises the rent more than 10% in a year and you move out, you are entitled to relocation assistance of 3x the monthly rent.

## Purpose of this listening session and instructions

- Commissioner Jessa Davis went over the purpose of the listening session:
  - To listen to and understand the experiences of Seattle renters
  - Identify challenges and gather ideas on what resources, support, and policies can help renters stay housed
  - The information collected will help guide recommendations for city policies and programs that better support renters

## **Public comment**

• Commissioner Jessa Davis facilitated the public comment portion of the meeting. She asked a few guiding questions:

- O What challenges are you facing as a renter?
- O What policies or resources would help you stay housed?
- o How can the City better support renters, especially those most at risk of displacement?
- About 15 people provided public comment or asked questions about renting in Seattle.
