Out of the Archives

Providing access to records is a big part of what we do here at SMA. Our holdings are available to all, both city staff and the public at large. Although we continue to work to make an increasing amount of material available online via exhibits and digital collections on our website, visits to the archives are always welcome!

In April we were visited by students from Boise State University, who were in Seattle doing field research on how Seattle has redeveloped former industrial sites. Committee records, constituent correspondence, photos, and maps from the early 1900s to the 2000s were helpful resources and kept the students busy and engaged for much of the day.

We also recently welcomed eighth graders in a summer school leadership class at Seattle Prep. The students enjoyed getting a behind-the-scenes tour of



the archives, from the research room to the records vault.

In June, SMA archivists traveled to Seattle City Light's Skagit Valley Hydroelectric Project in the Skagit Valley to tour the site and learn more about how it continues to serve the City of Seattle since it began delivering power in 1924. City Light has continually offered seasonal tours of the project since the early part of the 20th century. After processing thousands of photos and other material documenting the planning, construction, and operation of the

project, we were thrilled to see it in person!

We also took the opportunity to visit the neighboring "City Light town" of Newhalem, begun in 1918 as a construction camp for workers building the Skagit Project. Exhibits at Newhalem's Gorge Inn and Gorge Powerhouse examine the history and impact of the project, and feature photos and information from SMA's holdings.

Newly Processed Collections

Several series of apprenticeship records from Seattle City Light are now processed and available for research. They cover different types of apprenticeship programs and functions within SCL, such as apprentice selection, training and safety, and standards and guidelines. The separate record series include: Apprenticeship Program Records (1215-01), Joint Apprenticeship Advisory Committee Records, 1971-2003 (1215-03); Joint Labor Management Committee Minutes, 1995-2001 (1215-04); **Electrical Crafts Apprenticeship Committee** Records, 1956-2005 (1215-05); Laborers **Apprenticeship Advisory Board Minutes**, 1999-2003 (1215-06), and the Hydroelectric Maintenance Machinist Committee Records, 1982-2007 (1215-07). Also included are Equal Rights Opportunity Program Records, 1977-2000 (1215-02) covering SCL's efforts to actively recruit women and minorities

in response to the Federal 1972 Equal Rights Opportunity Act.

Among other recently processed records are those from the Office of Film and Music (2101-03), containing communications and plans of action regarding the film and music industry in Seattle, mostly dating from the 1990s through the 2000s. In addition, records from three groups created under Mayor Nickels' administration to combat the effects of climate change are now available for research: Green Building

Task Force Records (<u>9525-</u> <u>01</u>); Green Ribbon Commission on Climate Protection Records (<u>9527-01</u>), and Urban Sustainability Advisory Panel Records (<u>7905-01</u>).



For researchers interested in early city records, also newly processed is a **City Forms** Scrapbook (1800-16) containing a wide-ranging selection of blank forms demonstrating activities of different departments and agencies within the City of Seattle, circa 1890. These include licenses for the sale of liquor and cigarettes, pet licenses, oaths of office, library card applications, listings of meals provided to city jail prisoners, contract bids, and a handwritten roll call for City Council meetings (seen here).

New Film on the Central District



A new documentary on Seattle's Central District features photos and video footage held at SMA.

The film *On the Brink* reaches into stories of the Central District to chronicle its recent history and ongoing transformation. The film includes the community's struggle to hold onto its cultural and financial center in the midst of the ripping apart of its social fabric.

UW Foster School of Business Professor partnered with filmmaker Steven Fong to produce a story told through interviews and supported by music and archival footage. Shulman made extensive use of SMA footage and stills in the film. Included are interviews with Esther Mumford and Homer Harris (Seattle Channel Record Series 3902-01) and stills of councilmembers, parks, and community events.

Recently processed photos

Recently processed photographs include items from the **Clerk Files photograph collection (1802-OP**). Clerk Files are documents that have been filed with the Office of the City Clerk since 1891. These files are items that may have been acted upon by the City Council or were filed due to legal requirements or City business practices. Some types of files include affidavits, agreements, audits, contracts, annual reports, petitions and policies.

Often these files have photographs associated with them; once the photographs are cataloged and available online they can be cross-referenced by CF number in the <u>Clerk Files Index</u>. Some highlights of those recently processed photos are:
