

PREPARE FOR STORM SEASON

Fall is a beautiful time of year, but it's also a time when bright and sunny weather can change to dark and stormy in a flash. Inclement weather like windstorms and heavy rain can result in power outages in our area. To be ready for storm season, remember to stay prepared:

- · Assess your trees for branches that could fall in a windstorm.
- Have a kit ready that has enough food and water for at least a week. ready.gov/kit
- Keep portable generators outside so they can properly ventilate.
- Sign up for emergency notifications in your area at <u>alert.</u> seattle.gov and kingcounty.gov/ALERTKingCounty.
- Stay informed online at <u>seattle.gov/city-light/outages</u>.

PLANT A TREE THIS FALL

Fall is a great time to plant trees. It's cooler, the rain helps your water bill, and those new trees get several months to establish a healthy root system. For these reasons, the City of Seattle celebrates Arbor Day in October because this is the best time of year to plant trees in our region.

Remember to look up, down, and around when planting a tree. That evergreen sapling may grow to 80 feet tall, which could affect above and underground utilities. That said, if you have the space for a big tree, they have many benefits in the long run, such as increased stormwater uptake and shade to help cool your home. What's more, in our temperate region, deciduous trees (trees that lose their leaves in the winter) may help improve your home's energy efficiency. According to the U.S. Department of Energy, deciduous trees can maximize shade during the summer and maximize sun coverage in the winter.

So, plant a tree on your own this fall! Just remember to pick the right tree for the right place — particularly if you're planting trees near power lines. Learn more about tree planting, tree trimming, and recommended species at seattle.gov/trees.









ENROLL IN THE UTILITY DISCOUNT PROGRAM

We encourage all income-eligible residential customers to enroll in the Utility Discount Program. Customers who enroll receive an ongoing 60% discount on future City Light electricity bills. Plus, they also receive a 50% bill discount for customers who receive their water, sewer, and solid waste services from Seattle Public Utilities. To find out if you qualify, visit seattle.gov/UDP.

HEAT PUMP WATER HEATER INCENTIVES AND REBATES

City Light is here to help you lighten your load and save money. We offer incentives and rebates for Energy Star washers, heat pump dryers, heat pump water heaters, smart thermostats for electric heaters, and heat pumps, which use 50% to 80% less energy than other options. There's a theme here – heat pumps are the most efficient way to heat water, dry laundry, and stay comfortable at home. Thinking



about a new water heater? We've recently increased our rebate for a new heat pump water heater to \$750 for a limited time! Visit seattle.gov/city-light/energy-tips to see eligible models and learn more about how we can help you save on efficiency upgrades.


