To the City Clerk,

I am writing to apply for the vacant Seattle City Council seat in District 5. As a long-time resident and active member of our community, I am deeply concerned by the lack of progress on critical issues like affordability, homelessness, addiction, and public safety. These challenges have persisted for too long, and our city deserves strong leaders who will act in the interest of working families and diverse communities. For the majority of my career, I have led state policy and budgeting for the University of Washington, which is a highly complex public institution with an \$11 billion annual budget comprising an academic core, research enterprise, police force, and auxiliary units including a large medical enterprise and student housing. My broad policy, budget, and legislative experience would be directly applicable as a placeholder member of the Seattle City Council.

I want to live in a city that:

- Recognizes that enormous wealth has been created by working people and public infrastructure, but that income inequality has grown at an unsustainable pace. The wealthiest corporations and people who have benefitted must contribute more to meeting public needs.
- Invests heavily in building and incentivizing affordable housing of all types to slow displacement and provide stability for those who need it most.
- Maintains and builds safe, clean, and healthy communities and public spaces for everyone to enjoy.
- Views policing as a public service committed to protecting all members of the community

and with meaningful accountability for actions that damage our community and public trust.

- Views chronic homelessness and addiction as societal failures, not individual ones, and implements data-driven and novel solutions rather than ineffective, outdated, and inhumane policies that have failed to yield results for decades.
- Builds resilient, future-proof infrastructure that encourages the use of public transit, nonfossil-fuel vehicles, and builds our city in a way that ensures residents can meet basic needs within a short distance of travel.
- Reverses the unfortunate reality that our safety net relies on incarceration and emergency departments, which are far more costly and damaging to our society than providing basic human services.

I would want to serve on a city council that:

- Listens to and meaningfully responds to constituents, not one that dismisses or arrests them during public comment.
- Works in genuine partnership with neighboring cities, King County, and state and federal agencies to address shared challenges like housing, homelessness, and the opioid epidemic.
- Shows up and speaks out to combat injustice whether it is in our back yard or across the globe.
- Doesn't perpetuate dishonest talking points about the value of minimum wages, unions, renter protections, and transit.
- Demonstrates collegiality, creativity, and good governance, rather than perpetuating toxicity in relationships between members, staff, and city colleagues.

Seattle stands at a crossroads. If our city government fails to act decisively and soon, we will continue down a path where only the wealthiest among us thrive while most folks struggle to meet

basic needs. We are a fast-growing city, and as climate change accelerates, more people will flock to our region. This will only put more pressure on our already strained resources. Without a much more aggressive approach to building housing, infrastructure, and public services, our city's challenges will get worse.

I am hopeful that we can work together to chart a better course for Seattle that prioritizes public resources to invest in building safe, affordable, and livable communities, and I look forward to the opportunity to contribute to our shared future in this beautiful place we all call home.
