Assessment Methodology – Data Collection

• Data Collection:

- Review all Consent Decree filings regarding police accountability.
- Review all published reports and website content for CPC, OIG & OPA.
- Stakeholder interviews (including CPC, OIG, OPA, City & SPD leadership & CPC in public session.)
- Review arbitration decisions & SPD terminations of officer employment.

Assessment Methodology – Data Collection

- Looking at two focal points of accountability:
 - "Front-end Accountability:" involves ensuring that officer performance is aligned with community needs and expectations before anything goes wrong. Focuses on establishing clear, transparent expectations aligned with public input and priorities that officers follow.
 - "Back-end Accountability:" involves how and whether officer misconduct is addressed; whether there are appropriate outcomes when officers fail to follow SPD policy or the law.
