KEY POINTS

Mayor Harrell 2023

- Proposed 2023 SPD Budget: \$375,721,213
- Proposed 2024 SPD Budget: \$385,605,540
 - Proposed 2023/2024 FTEs: 1,893.55
- 3% budget cut for SPD: 80 FTEs held open.
- Reinvestment of I20 FTE salary savings back into department.
- Move Parking Enforcement Officers (PEO) to SPD
 - \$19,987,262 / 123 FTEs back to SPD.
- **\$2M** for development of police alternatives.

Solidarity 2023

- Defund SPD by 50%
- Fund community-based responses to public safety,\$20M
- No soft cops Park Rangers
- City match hiring incentives of SPD for all service providers in public safety: crisis response, homeless services, and housing.
 - **\$30k** for lateral hires and **\$7.5k** for new hires.
- "Defunding SPD also means divesting from the rest of the punishment pipeline, and ending misdemeanor criminalization as the default response to conflict, harm, and need in the City of Seattle."
- Calls for increased participatory budgeting: \$60M for 2023 + \$5M each year until PB is \$200M.

SOLIDARITY 2023

- Defund SPD by 50%:
 - Eliminate position authority and corresponding funding for "ghost positions" (empty positions SPD has no plans to fill next year).
 - Reduce funding for existing positions.
 - End funding for new hires and hiring incentives.
 - End police spending on new tech, new buildings, new weapons, and police public relations.
 - Ensure expanded public safety responses are placed outside of SPD.
 - End hiring and retention bonuses for SPD + shift this funding to compensate culturally appropriate treatment providers.
 - Remove SPD from traffic enforcement entirely, and cease officer patrols and stops for speeding and other traffic violations.
 - Remove crash responses and crash data collection from the jurisdiction of SPD.
 - Ensure that revenue from traffic ticketers is re-invested into safe street projects, not directed to the general fund.

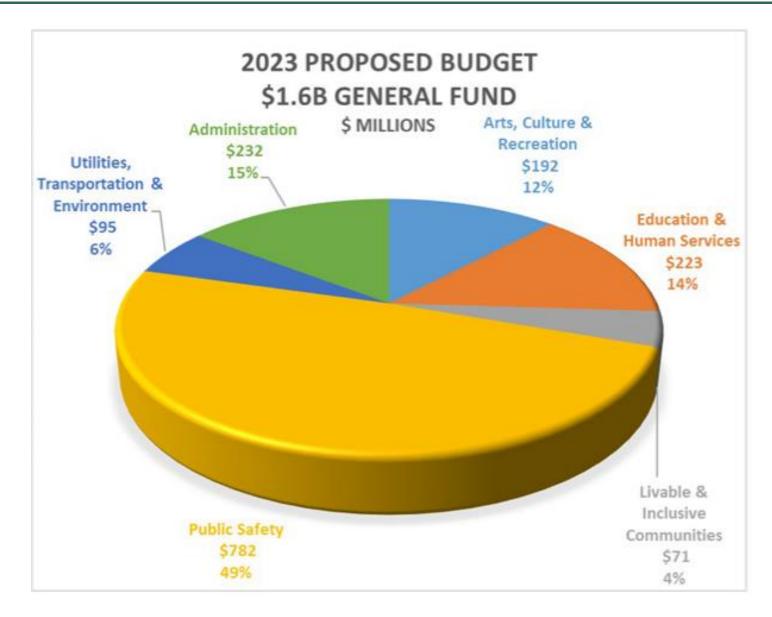

MAYOR HARRELL – ONE SEATTLE BUDGET 2023

- 2023 Proposed SPD budget: \$375,721,213
 - Total Increase of \$20,234,204 from 2022 budget.
 - Primary increase is due to transfer of Parking Enforcement Officers (PEO) back to SPD.
 - Infrastructure for PEO remained in SPD
 - transferring back saves ~\$5M in recreating support infrastructure in SDOT.
 - Move back may not be permanent.
- SPD did receive 3% budget cut due to revenue shortfall for the city resulting in 80 FTEs held vacant for duration of target period.
 - Total of \$11,448,496 in savings.
- Additionally, 120 officer positions remain vacant with salary savings of \$16,951,504
 - However, these savings are being reinvested back into SPD

CONTINUED: MAYOR HARRELL 2023

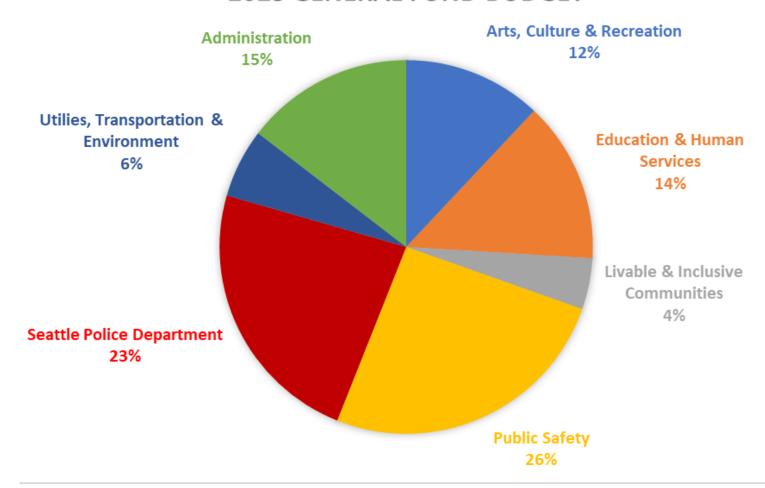
- Salary Savings Reinvestments:
 - Equipment and technology upgrades: \$2,330,000
 - \$1,330,000: funding for equipment replacement
 - service weapons
 - replacement of bullet trap at firing range
 - funding to keep up with rising cost of ammunition
 - purchase of tasers
 - \$1,000,000: funding for Gunfire Detection system ShotSpotter.
 - Recruitment and retention: \$4,252,030
 - Community safety program enhancements: \$446,143
- Proposed 2023 Budget added \$700,000 in Finance General for development of policing alternatives
 - Money added to current \$1.2M in Finance General for alternative development, resulting in ~\$2M total.
 - \$2M is only 0.05% of SPD budget to fund development policing alternatives.

IMPACT, PERCEPTIONS, AND OTHER DEVELOPMENTS

- Mixed reception around ShotSpotter deployment in Rainier Beach.
 - <u>Cathie Willmore with the Seattle Neighborhood Group:</u> "Research has shown that the effects of the shot shooter (ShotSpotter) technology are damaging to communities of color. It's unreliable and results in false alarms and conflicts within our communities".
- Trend of media coverage highlighting large investment differences between gun-and-badge policing and the development of alternatives.
- Development of a "third" public safety department in 2024 no line item in budget providing details.
