Core Tenants Discussion

Jason kicked off with an overview of the topic and the need to build strategic vision.

Scott provided some background on the original purpose of the Commission,

- need to look at equity, accessibility in industry.
- what do commissioners see in their professional lives that need addressing.
 - highlight and advocate for that.
 - How do we make Seattle City of Music vision reality?

Discussion items for breakout rooms – what should be 5 things that we as a body should be doing/focusing on each time we come together.

Request made to hear from OED Director Markham McIntire on what his vision is. Scott will schedule.

Breakout rooms:

Notes from In Person discussion -

- we all have knowledge of how to serve in the community and know we can't do it all. Need to focus on a smaller list that is more meaningful, build teams to do the work, culture lives on the street,
 - o idea: put artists on Third Ave (city looking to refigure the corridor)
- Advocating for affordability for creatives and workers in the industry (affordable housing on third avenue, would help improve safety, activate it.) Visibility creates safety. Don't build affordable housing through a private developer.
- Pike/Pine, Waterfront, identify open spaces and focus on activations
- City council needs to hear over and over about the vital City of music
- Need to meet with Visit Seattle and work with them on projects.
- Standing meetings with Seattle City Council members to keep abreast of issues,
- Affordability, activation, advocacy, entrepreneurship, capacity building, (need for creating jobs and sustainable wages)

Room 1 Breakout Notes from Bunnie

1. Who is Listening?

- Seems like agenda items get stuck in the meeting or no follow up
- Too many agenda items that none receive proper focus
- Little to no contact with City Council to follow up/ know how requests are being received

Proposed Solutions:

-Establish regular meeting intervals with City Council (ex: every fourth meeting)

-use bi-monthly SMC meetings to narrow down which action items we'd like to take to City Council (ex: five action items)

-establish a formal process to communicate goals to city council

2. Real World Impact for Musicians

- Need to balance overall advocacy/policy change with actual events that benefit musicians (ex: Nate's Masterclass, showcases)
- Advocate for the future of music with national events coming to the city

Proposed Solutions:

- Find specialized national events, and make sure that local musicians of all genres are represented (ex: World Cup, NHL outdoor hockey game)

-Get Seattle Sports Teams to commit to featuring local artists on different stages, and in music played at events -Establish relationship with Seattle Sports Commission, with goal to:

-Establish formal/easier process for local musicians to perform at big sporting events
