Mural Purpose and Summary

The Down Under Shops, while a unique and charming part of Pike Place Market, struggle to draw foot traffic, particularly from visitors unfamiliar with the area. To raise awareness of the lower-level shops and drive more visitors to this hidden gem, we plan to capitalize on the nearby Gum Wall attraction by installing a photo-op Love in the Market-themed installation, including a permanent mural on the landing outside the south entrance to the lower-level shops. Local artist and Pike Place Market gallery owner, Brooke Westlund has designed the "Love in the Market" mural, and if approved, she will be the artist to paint the mural on the exterior wall of the Leland, turning the space into a vibrant backdrop for photos, perfect for sharing on social media platforms like Instagram, which will promote the market and further build awareness around the downunder shops.

In addition to the mural, we propose "love locks"—padlocks that visitors can purchase from downunder businesses to attach to the surrounding chain-link fence. This installation will tap into a global tradition of other love lock installations seen on bridges and monuments all over the world; from Paris' Pont des Arts to Ponte Milvio in Rome, to the Brooklyn Bridge in New York, right here in Seattle.

Our hope is that the Mural and love lock installation not only raises awareness of the lower-level shops but also encourages visitors to enter the stores, purchase locks, take photos, share on social media, and participate in this beloved tradition. In turn, this initiative will provide shop owners with a unique opportunity to increase sales and engage with a wider audience, all while enriching the vibrant community at Pike Place Market.




Located on the exterior wall of the Leland Building below the public restrooms, on the 4th level near the south entrance to the Down Under Shops, on the landing just after the hill climb leading to the Gum Wall. Below South Public Restroom.

Immediate tenants are: Conscious Wear and House of Silver and Gold.

Proposed location.

Brooke Westlund will paint over existing paint with an outdoor satin finish paint (noted on the next slide). Although the mural is outside, it's protected by the

Sign dimensions: 8.5 x 11



Love locks are made of various materials including: steel, stainless steel, and brass.

*locks will vary in size with an average lock size like the one in the above example of: 3 x 1.5

Photo Gallery chain link fence for Love Locks and signage: 4^{th} floor landing outside 3^{rd} and 4^{th} floor downunder south locations

Chain link fences surround the 4th floor landing to the west, south, and around the stairs leading down to Western Ave














Photo Gallery Mural Location: 4^{th} floor landing outside 3^{rd} and 4^{th} floor south entrances to the downunder












1 Love Lock and Mural Location



Mural Love Lock Location

Most of the landing where the mural would be painted is bordered by chain-link fencing. The locks would be attached to this fencing. The dotted arrows indicate where the fencing is located.

<u>Signage</u>

Informational signs, like the example shown to the right, will be posted on the chain-link fencing to let patrons know that locks can be purchased in the DownUnder shops.

This aligns with the overall effort to drive foot traffic to the DownUnder businesses.



Removing Love Locks

Removal: In the event that the "Love in the Market" lock project becomes wildly successful, and we face a situation similar to the one with the Gum Wall, where over time the accumulation of gum, or in this case, locks require removal, the locks can be removed in various ways, the easiest and most efficient way is with bolt cutters, as has been done in other cities with love lock installations like the Pont des Arts and Pont de l'Archevêché bridge.

Disposal: The most effective way to dispose of large quantities of padlocks or "love locks" is to recycle them at a scrap metal facility. Many scrap metal yards, including West Seattle Recycling, will accept padlocks.

Marketing Opprtunities

The Seattle Times wants to hear the stories of anyone who has placed a "love padlock" on the pedestrian bridge headed in and out of the Seattle Ferry Terminal in downtown Seattle.


Similar to the popular "love lock" bridges found in European cities, a significant amount of padlocks hang from a small chainlink fence railing on the bridge, right in front of The Forge Lounge bar along Marion Street. We're interested in learning why those locks are there, and why people see the ferries as places of romantic connection.


