

None of our produce was wasted or lost. We saved folks on the receiving end limitless amounts of money and time by simply driving produce to their door, and connected countless people with high-quality nutrition who may NEVER have a chance to stand in line at a food bank or carry heavy produce for myriad reasons.

We also have an opportunity now to invite our neighbors in through our hospitalitybased relationship. We will be welcoming these neighbors in to garden and collaborate with us over the coming years. This strengthens our entire community network of relationships, shared experience, and proactive, health-building self-sufficiency."




Pounds Donated from Giving Garden Plots vs. Individual Gardeners' Plots
