# Week Overview

Week two brought the 2017 Session into full swing. The capitol campus was busy on January 19<sup>th</sup> with many people taking advantage of the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday to visit with their legislators. Student, parent, and educator groups rallied on the capitol steps with the goal of putting pressure on the Legislature to fully fund K-12 education. It was estimated that approximately 6,500 people attended.

On the same day, Attorney General Bob Ferguson announced his plan to introduce legislation that would end the death penalty in Washington State. The legislation would replace capital punishment as a sentencing option with life imprisonment without the possibility of parole.

## Priority Areas

#### Education

*Levy Cliff*: It has been announced that the House expects to run <u>SHB 1059</u>, the levy lid extension bill, on the floor on January  $23^{rd}$ .

*Early Learning*: Sen. Billig (D) introduced <u>SB 5107</u>, which would create a local pathway for local government, school districts, and nonprofit organizations to provide more high quality early learning opportunities by reducing barriers and increasing efficiency. The bill received a public hearing on January 19<sup>th</sup>.

#### **Public Safety**

*Death Penalty*: On Monday, Attorney General Bob Ferguson (D), Governor Inslee (D), and former Attorney General Rob McKenna (R) announced a bipartisan bill (<u>SB 5354</u>) to abolish the state's death penalty. This comes following a 2014 moratorium on the death penalty that the governor instituted.

*Use of Deadly* Force: The use of deadly force task force meet over the interim to review laws, practices, and training programs regarding use of deadly force and recommend best practices to reduce the number of violent interaction between law enforcement and members of the public. The task force was required to submit a final report to the Legislature and Governor by December 1, 2016. Sen. Frockt (D) and Rep. Ryu (D) introduced <u>SB 5073/HB 1529</u> reflecting the recommendations of the joint task force. Rep. Doglio (D) and Sen. McCoy (D) introduced <u>HB 1000/SB 5000</u>, which proposes changes to the use of deadly force statute.

*Sexual Assault Forensic Exams*: <u>HB 1109</u>, which creates a pilot project to create and train multidisciplinary community response teams, and creates a funding account using a fee levied on adult entertainment establishments, was passed out of committee on Thursday, January 19<sup>th</sup>. <u>HB 1111</u>, which creates procedural improvements to the collection and processingof DNA, is scheduled for a public hearing on January 23<sup>rd</sup> in House Public Safety Committee.

*Human Trafficking*: Bipartisan legislation to strengthen current Washington State human trafficking laws was introduced this week. The "Human Trafficking Protection Order Bill" (HB 1079/SB 5029) protects victims by creating a protection order or no-contact order. HB 1078/SB 5030 extends the statute of limitations for human trafficking crimes from three to ten years. Neither bill has a financial impact on the state. Both House bills (HB 1079/HB 1078) were passed out of the House Public Safety Committee and the Senate bills (SB 5029/SB 5030) had a public hearing in the Senate Law and Justice Committee on January 17<sup>th</sup>.

*Gun Responsibility*: This week, Rep. Jinkins (D) introduced <u>HB 1387</u>, Enhanced Assault Weapon Background Checks, which raises the legal age of possession to 21 and requires an indepth background check and safety training in order to purchase an assault weapon. This bill and legislation banning the sales of assault-style rifles (<u>SB 5050/HB 1134</u>), have not been scheduled for public hearings. In addition, <u>HB 1122</u>, dangerous access prevention, creates criminal liability if a child or anyone prohibited from possessing firearms accesses an unsecured firearm and uses it to hurt themselves or others, has not been scheduled for a public hearing.

*Police Citizenship*: <u>HB 1182</u>, sponsored by Rep. Stokesbary (R), addresses civil service qualifications by expanding who can apply for a position of any kind under civil service to include a lawful permanent resident. The bill has been scheduled for a public hearing in the House Labor and Workforce Standards on January 24<sup>th</sup>. The companion bill, <u>SB 5389</u>, sponsored by Sen. Miloscia (R), has not yet been scheduled for any action in the Senate.

*Marijuana*: <u>HB 1065</u>, concerning penalties for marijuana offenses, received a public hearing in the House Commerce and Gaming Committee on January 17<sup>th</sup>. This bill would reduce the penalties for possession and transfer of marijuana products outside of the I-502 system in certain circumstances and authorize the noncommercial transfer (gift) of marijuana products in amounts

equal to half of the current possession limits by a person 21 years of age or older to another person(s) 21 years of age or older. David Mendoza (OPI) and Kelly Harris (Law) came down to Olympia to testify on this bill. In addition, <u>HB 1260</u>, sponsored by Rep. Fitzgibbon (D), would require a court to vacate misdemeanor marijuana possession convictions on request of a qualifying applicant. The bill has been scheduled for a public hearing in the House Public Safety Committee on January 23<sup>rd</sup>.

*Ban the Box*: <u>HB 1298</u>, sponsored by Rep. Ortiz-Self (D), would prohibit employers from asking about arrests or convictions before an applicant is determined otherwise qualified for a position. The bill has been scheduled for a public hearing on January 24<sup>th</sup> and executive action on January 26<sup>th</sup> in the House Labor & Workplace Standards Committee. <u>SB 5312</u>, sponsored by Sen. Baumgartner (R), is a similar bill in the Senate that has not yet been scheduled for any action.

*Public Records*: On January 17<sup>th</sup>, Rep. McBride (D) and Rep. Nealey (R) introduced <u>HB 1317</u>, concerning the public disclosure of global positioning system data corresponding to residential addresses of public employees and volunteers. We expect to see new pieces of legislation regarding public records in the upcoming days.

## **General Government**

*Seattle Center*: Rep. Fey (D) introduced <u>HB 1114</u>, which exempts the Seattle Center and Tacoma Dome from the leasehold excise tax. This bill has not been scheduled for a public hearing.

*Vested Rights*: <u>SB 5212</u>, sponsored by Sen. Wilson (R), concerns the scope of land use control ordinances for purposes of vesting, and has been scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Local Government Committee on January 24<sup>th</sup>.

## Environment

*Electrification of Transportation*: <u>HB 1335</u>, which seeks to allow for incentives for the installation of electrification equipment, was introduced by Rep. Tarleton (D). The bill has been narrowly drafted to apply to Seattle City Light only. We hope to have this bill scheduled for a public hearing in the next couple of weeks.

*Model Toxics Control Act*: Sen. Erickson (R) has introduced <u>SB 5170</u>, which concerns independent remedial actions under the Model Toxics Control Act (MTCA). Additionally, several work sessions were held over the week on MTCA. On January 16<sup>th</sup>, the House Environment Committee had the Department of Ecology provide presentations on the MTCA budget and project updates. The work session also included a presentation by the Washington Environmental Council on MTCA reductions and future goals. The House Capital Budget held a work session on January 17<sup>th</sup> where the Office of Financial Management went over Governor Inslee's approach to solving the MTCA problems. The Department of Ecology also provided a presentation on the MTCA budget. On the same day, the Department of Ecology gave Senate Energy, Environment, and Telecommunications Committee an overview of toxics cleanup.

#### **Homelessness & Housing**

*Homelessness*: Rep. Macri (D) and 28 other legislative members introduced <u>HB 1570</u>, access to homeless housing and assistance, which eliminates the sunset for the local homeless housing and assistance document recording fee and increases the \$40 fee to \$90. The legislation also changes the definition of private rental housing to include non-profit organizations. The bill is scheduled for a public hearing on Thursday, January 26<sup>th</sup> in the House Community Development, Housing and Tribal Affairs committee.

*Preservation Tax Exemption*: Sen. Fain (R) introduced <u>SB 5182</u>, which provides a property tax exemption for the preservation of affordable housing. This legislation is one of the recommendations from the Seattle HALA report and is scheduled for public hearing on Monday, January  $23^{rd}$ , in the Senate Human Services, Mental Health and Housing committee.

*Affordable Housing*: Rep. McBride (D) introduced <u>HB 1536</u>, local option tools for affordable housing. The bill provides multiple tools such as REET 3, the preservation tax exemption, REET 1 and 2 flexibility, and authorizing a demolition fee. In addition, an omnibus bill (<u>SB 5254</u>) that makes changes to buildable lands, zoning in urban growth areas, affordable housing, and homelessness, was introduced by Sen. Fain and is scheduled for a public hearing on Thursday, January 26<sup>th</sup> in the Senate Local Government committee.

## Safety Net

*Family & Medical Leave Insurance*: Legislators introduced two different approaches to family and medical leave. Sen. Keiser (D) and Rep. Robinson (D) introduced <u>SB 5032/HB 1116</u>, which advocates describe as a holistic, integrated system with paid leave benefits that follow the worker and allows for up to 26 weeks of family leave and 12 weeks for disability leave. Workers, advocates, and business owners testified in favor of <u>HB 1116</u> on January 19<sup>th</sup>. Sen. Fain (R) introduced <u>SB 5149</u>, which is fully employee paid, and tied to time with a particular employer and provides only 8 weeks of leave in 2020 (which increases to 12 weeks in 2023). This bill has not been scheduled for a public hearing in Senate Commerce, Labor and Sports.

*Equal Pay*: Legislators introduced several bills relating to Equal Pay for women this week. Sen. Cleveland (D) and Rep. Senn (D) introduced <u>SB 5140</u> and <u>HB 1506</u> to address work place practices to achieve gender pay equity. <u>HB 1506</u> is scheduled for a public hearing on Tuesday, January 24<sup>th</sup>, in the House Labor Committee. Sen. Fain introduced <u>SB 5344</u>, which restricts prohibitions on employee's discussing wages, but does not include restrictions on career tracking or create administrative remedies.

*Safe Injection Sites*: In 2016 the King County Heroin Crisis Task Force recommended two safe injection sites for drug users in King County. Proponents say safe injection sites could save taxpayers millions in crisis services; opponents believe it condones the practice. The King County prosecutor endorsed safe injection sites earlier this week. The King County Board of Health also voted unanimously on Thursday, January 19<sup>th</sup> to endorse the sites. Sen. Miloscia (R) introduced <u>SB 5223</u> to block cities and counties in Washington State from hosting safe injection sites.

#### Transportation

*REAL ID*: Rep. Clibborn (D) and Sen. King (R) introduced legislation aimed at facilitating compliance with the federal REAL ID Act (<u>HB 1041/SB 5008</u>). The bill would modify drivers' licenses and identification card design and fees. Both bills had a public hearing on January 19<sup>th</sup>.

*Distracted Driving*: Rep. Farrell (D) and Sen. Rivers (R) introduced legislation to prevent drivers from holding a smartphone, tablet, or communication device while driving or using a mounted device that requires more than a tap, <u>HB 1371/SB 5289</u>.

# Looking Ahead

Seattle City Council members will travel to Olympia on Thursday, January 26<sup>th</sup>, to meet with key legislators and discuss the City of Seattle legislative agenda.

The first round of cut off dates, Policy Committee Cutoff and Fiscal Committee Cutoff, are set for February 17<sup>th</sup> and February 24<sup>th</sup>. Bills need to be passed out of their policy and fiscal committees on or before that date in order to be considered this session. Exceptions to these deadlines include bills necessary to implement the budget. The House of Origin Cutoff is on March 8<sup>th</sup>.
