The New Citizen Program (NCP) provides free naturalization services to low-income immigrants and refugees living in Seattle/King County. Most services are bilingual and tailored to the specific needs of participants, with a focus on those who are elderly, have limited English skills, or cannot read or write. Since its inception, NCP has served over 19,000 people resulting in more than 9,500 new Americans on the path to becoming citizens. See other side for full list of NCP organizations.

Am I eligible to become a U.S. citizen?

You must be all of the below:

- · At least 18 years old.
- A permanent resident for at least 5 years (or 3 if married to a U.S. citizen).
- · A person of good moral character.
- Able to read, write, and speak basic English (or qualify for an exception).
- Have a basic understanding of U.S. history/civics (or qualify for an exception).

New Citizen Program organizations can provide these services:

- Citizenship classes and tutoring support
- N-400 citizenship application assistance
- · Fee waiver assistance
- · Disability waiver assistance
- Interview preparation
- · Interview representation

The benefits of U.S. Citizenship:

- U.S. citizenship granted to children under 18
- Sponsorship of immediate relatives
- · Right to vote
- More access to SSI, financial aid, social security, and other public benefits
- Easier travel with a U.S. passport
- Eligible for federal jobs
- · No danger of deportation or removal
- Full protection under the U.S. Constitution
- Able to take long trips outside the U.S. and live outside the U.S.
