Zero Building Energy Codes"





- U.S. DOE State and Community Energy Programs
- 17.2 Million For enhanced outreach and support; not capital funds to buildings
- 9 Years from Jan 2025 Dec 2033 with project close-out through Sept 2034
- Currently in contract negotiations with U.S. DOE

- Sub-Recipients
 - Building Potential customer support and new Building Operator Certification (BOC) BEPS curricula + scholarships
 - SEI Climate Corps 3 community support fellows – direct technical support for building owners/managers
 - Seattle 2030 District connect owners to funding via Funding Resource Liaison









Project Goals

- 1. Prioritize support for building owners most at a disadvantage* to meet the stringent Building Emissions Performance Standards (BEPS) emissions targets and to achieve net-zero emissions by 2041-2050 through programs, tools and resources tailored to their unique needs.
- 2. Foster growth and training of the diverse workforce required by BEPS, both for building facility managers/operators and for energy service providers hired by building owners.

BEPS One-Stop-Shop Concept

Use Case Examples

BEPS Customer Support Team

(CS) receives inquiry from building owner, facility / sustainability manager or service provider.

Needs BEPS question(s) answered.

Sustainability/facility manager has time capacity to learn detailed steps and process to comply.

Inquirer is struggling with compliance and is a non-profit, frontline building owner, etc.

Inquirer needs project funding to meet BEPS.

Inquirer says their building is an all-electric building.

If building owner: CS answers questions and/or provides warm hand-off. Assigns **Account Manager** for future contacts.

If service provider: CS answers questions or suggests BEPS BOC trainings, if needed. May refer to **Workforce Training Liaison**.

CS recommends **Accelerator Coaching Cohort, BOC** training/scholarship or other training.

CS recommends the **Community Support Fellows** program to help owner to complete benchmarking verification and GHG reporting.

CS offers hand-off to **City Light for incentive assistance** or the **Funding Support Liaison** for direct consult.

CS Reminds caller of BEPS Benchmarking Verification and support. Hands off to WA Dept Commerce for support.

Objectives

Budget Period 1– approx. 2025-2026

 Increase capacity for BEPS Compliance Assistance including staff hiring at City and sub-recipients, and external consultant scope development.
 Compliance Assistance program supports building owners/managers and service providers* in understanding the BEPS requirements.

Budget Period 2 – approx. 2027-2028

• Focus BEPS Compliance Assistance program on disadvantaged smaller buildings due to complete benchmarking verification and greenhouse gas (GHG) reporting by 2030.

*Workforce component: BEPS BOC trainings and BEPS Workforce Liaison position



Objectives

- Budget Period 3 –approx 2029-2030
 - Continue focus of BEPS Compliance Assistance program on disadvantaged smaller buildings due to complete benchmarking verification and greenhouse gas (GHG) reporting by 2030.
 - Focus enhanced support for disadvantaged owners of larger buildings finalizing work to meet greenhouse gas emissions intensity target (GHGIT) deadlines in 2031 and 2032.

Objectives

- Budget Period 4 approx. 2031-2032
 - Continue BEPS customer support programs, with emphasis on disadvantaged smaller buildings that are due to meet GHGITs between 2033 through 2035.
- Budget Period 5 approx. 2033-2034
 - Futureproof customer support and internal/external City capacity.
 This will likely include a needs assessment for customers to meet future GHGITs and net-zero requirements.

Growing Capacity at OSE

- Award Program Manager OSE, Early 2025
- Finance and Reporting Spec OSE, Early 2025
- Customer Support OSE, Late 2025
 - Supplements 2 existing City funded positions for the "One-Stop-Shop"
- BEPS Workforce & Training Advisor OSE, Early 2026
 - Service provider engagement & training
 - BEPS Building Operator Certification (BOC) curricula & scholarships
 - Partnerships with entities offering workforce dev. (PNW BTAC, Labor Orgs, Emerald Cities...)
 - Partner with certification entities for BEPS Qualified Persons (ASHRAE, AEE...)
 - Partner with entities offering facility manager trainings (BOMA, IFMA...)



Hiring by Sub-Recipients

- **SEI Climate Corps** 3 Community Support Fellows annually to be placed at OSE for 10 months. Hands on support for owners virtual and in-person. *Starting in 2026*
 - They become the future climate and BEPS workforce!
- Building Potential Customer Support 2 positions *late 2025*
- **Seattle 2030 District** Decarbonization Funding Resource Liaison position at Seattle 2030 — *late 2025*
 - Includes hours block at a CPA

General Fund Revenues - Baseline Scenario Forecast

- General Fund revenues were in total revised down by \$48.6 million
 - \$6.5 million (0.4%) for 2024
 - \$42.1 million (1.1%) for the 2025-2026 biennium
- The overall change for the 2025-2026 biennium is negative in large part due to the \$32.1 million lower forecast for Sales and Use Tax and Business & Occupation Tax.
- The downward revisions for these revenue streams are driven by lower forecast for construction activity and slower projected regional employment growth, which leads to lower income and spending as well.

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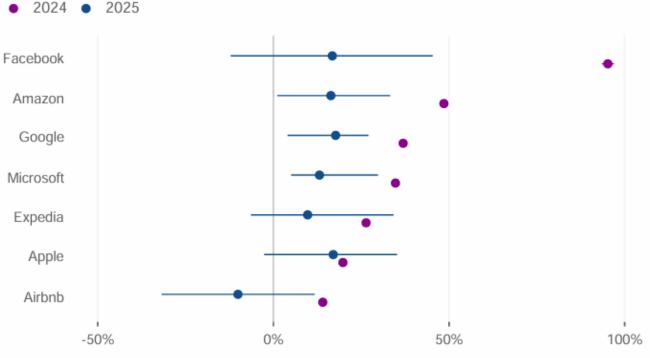


Payroll Expense Tax Forecast

- Payroll Expense Tax forecast was revised up.
- Rising stock prices of tech companies are increasing value of stock grants that are subject to the tax.
- As in past, this continues to dominate the effects of employment changes - due to layoffs since 2022, as well as the reported 17% decline in Amazon's headcount in Seattle city from its peak in 2020.
- S&P Global expects the S&P 500 index to grow 25.8% in 2024 in the baseline scenario.
 Stock market is then expected to grow only 5.4% in 2025 and decline 3.6% in 2026.
- In the pessimistic scenario the S&P 500 index grows 1.3% in 2025, declines 2.3% in 2026.

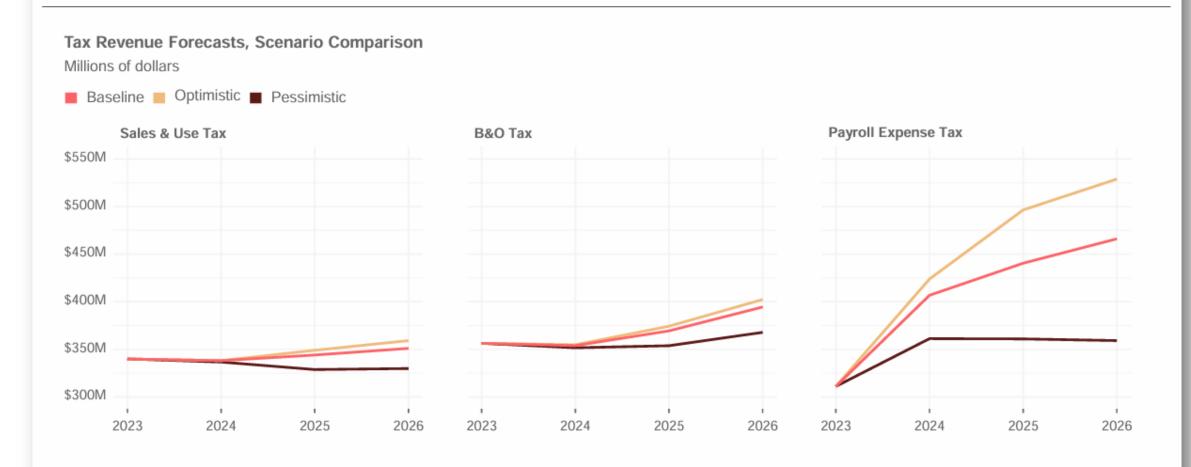
Predicted stock price changes
