Vision


- Through active and passive park activation, the Park Activation Unit:

Park Concierge Program

- Support Active and Passive Programming
- Associated Recreation Council (ARC) full time benefitted entry level positions
- 6 Park locations, 6-8 hours per day
- In 2023:
 - 21,677 hours of Park Concierge presence in 6 Parks
 - 9 Naloxone administrations in emergency situations
 - **5 CPR** administrations to provide onsite emergency assistance and save lives.
 - 15,000 positive interactions
 - 300 real change resource guides distributed to Park Patrons
 - Roughly 110 work orders submitted




Park Busker Program

- Part of Center City Programming
- Active Programming 2-hour sets
- ARC Independent Contractors
- In summer, 126 hours of busking every week in parks
- Roughly 5,000 hours of busking annually!
- Performers are ethnically and racially diverse, performances include culturally relevant music, dance, acrobatics, and juggling performances in multiple languages

Panel Discussion, Key Takeaways & Next Steps

Scheduling

- User groups want SPR to create a forum where users can connect with each other
 - Bi-annual playfield user forum (twice per year)
- Limitations with only one rugby field in our system
 - Rigidity of historical use scheduling
 - Magnuson Field 12
 - Evaluating use of Field 5 particularly in fall for non-rugby use
- Concerns about user groups hoarding field time and not using it
- Process for choosing synthetic replacements, conversions, field improvements
 - Team evaluating Joint Athletic Facility Development Plan and will connect with Planning & Capital Development with updated knowledge and expertise

Seattle Public Schools

- Concerns related to potential school closures and impacts on playfield availability
 - Currently only 5 schools on list, did not specify which, as that could still change.
 - Will let users and SPR know what decisions are made in light of this.



Panel Discussion, Key Takeaways & Next Steps (continued)

Grounds Maintenance

- ❖ Is there anything more that user groups can do to help with the upkeep of the fields? With the limitations of not being able to use power equipment it makes it difficult to help efficiently, as the tasks take longer.
 - Director advised scheduling meetings between user groups and grounds leadership to discuss this.
 - Can we restart the program of soil drops prior to season starts for user groups to help?

Planning

- Any plans on turf conversion for Green Lake Cloverleaf fields?
- Question about order of synthetic turf projects.
 - Why prioritize communities that already have other fields before communities that have none? Magnolia and Queen Anne are the communities in question with none.


