### **FLEXIBILITY**

- Enlarged windows for improved natural light.
- Improved canopies and landscape for shading.
- Replacement of aged building systems for improved energy efficiency.

#### **COMMUNITY CONNECTION**

- A vibrant space for everyone, from Queen Anne and beyond, to gather and connect.
- Interior spaces with open connection to exterior, for active gathering.
- Transparency thoughout the facility with better views between spaces.
- Updated entries at all sides of the building.






**OUTDOOR FEATURES** 



### OUTDOOR SPACES THAT WELCOME ALL

■ The building's exterior is designed to be warm, durable, and inviting—with materials that stand up to weather, support sustainability, and reflect the character of the community



### 1 Berm

A raised, grassy area that adds natural shaping to the landscape and can be used for casual seating or play.



### 4 Ping Pong

An outdoor table that encourages fun, active play and social interaction.



7 Seatwall Planters

Seating and places to rest along the active pedestrian spaces



#### 2 Bike Rack

A secure and convenient spot for visitors to park and lock their bikes



## Porch Seating

Seating on the covered porch extends the building's community gathering spaces.





### 3 Flexible Seating

Comfortable seating options for all to enjoy a variety of activities.



### 6 Rain Garden

A landscaped area that collects and filters rainwater, supporting native plants and reducing runoff.


