**Code Issue:** When is a licensed design professional required to stamp plans where the value of non-structural alterations and repairs is less than \$75,000?

**Policy:** In most cases, Seattle Department of Construction and Inspections (SDCI) does not require a professional stamp from a licensed design professional for smaller types of projects. However, if there are significant code issues, it is appropriate for SDCI to require a seal and signature on the plans even when the value of the project is less than \$75,000.

Examples of significant code issues include:

- Projects that trigger the substantial alteration provisions of the code.
- Projects affecting the separation of mixed occupancies.
- A change of occupancy to a Group A (assembly), E(education), or H (hazardous) occupancy. (This does not include an update from previous code designations).
- Alterations affecting the overall means of egress for a building.
- When the applicant does not demonstrate a basic understanding of code requirements.
